

This Indenture made this 15th day of December 1850 between Samuel T. Rollings of the first part W^m. B. Shands trustee of the second part and James S. Bryant and William Prince of the third part: Whereas James S. Bryant and William Prince have become the securities of William Beantley to a certain bail bond for two hundred dollars conditioned for his appearance at the next circuit court of Southampton and to a certain bond for one hundred and fifty dollars conditioned for his keeping the peace and whereas the said Samuel Rollings is willing and desirous to secure the said Bryant and Prince against all loss by reason of the said securities. Now therefore this indenture witnesseth that for and in consideration of the premises and the further consideration of one dollar to the said Samuel T. Rollings in hand paid by the said W^m. B. Shands lat and before the sealing and delivery of these presents, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, he the said Samuel T. Rollings has bargained and sold and by these presents does bargain and sell to the said William B. Shands, a trust of land lying in Southampton County, containing by estimation one hundred and sixty acres and a negro woman named Fanny and child: to have and to hold unto him the said W^m. B. Shands and his heirs forever, upon trust nevertheless that the said Samuel T. Rollings shall be permitted to remain in quiet possession of the said property, both personal and real until the said securities shall have suffered damage by reason of the breach of the said bonds, then upon request made by either Bryant or Prince to the said W^m. B. Shands he shall after having given ten days notice of the time and place of sale by public advertisement proceed to sell the said personal and real estate at public auction to the highest bidder for cash and pay to the said William Prince and James S. Bryant all monies which they may have paid by reason of the breach of the said bonds, and the balance, if any pay over to the said Samuel T. Rollings.
