This Indenture made and entered into this 13th day of December 1860 between Richard
C. Gray, Edwin R. Gray, George L. Pope, and Pope & Woodard, all of the County of
Southampton and State of Virginia, Witnesses; that he the said Richard C.
Gray in order to secure the said George L. Pope the payment of thirty eight
dollars and seventy cents, which debt is justly due the said Pope appearing
by bond bearing date the 1st day of January 1860, and likewise to secure
Pope & Woodard the payment of one hundred and eighty four and 5/8c dollars
which debt is justly due the said Pope & Woodard, also appearing by bond
dated 1st day of January 1860, and also to secure to them the interest
which shall accrue on their claims, and all reasonable cost of carrying
this indenture into effect, and for the further consideration of one dollar then
said Gray in hand paid by the said Edwin R. Gray at or before the
sealing and delivery of these presents, the receipt of which is hereby
acknowledged, the said Richard C. Gray hath bargained and sold the following
by these presents doth bargain, grant and sell to the said Gray the following
property to wit; One brown mare and bidun increase, Two cows and
calves and their future increase, Two sows and pigs and their future
increase, Thirty barrels Corn, Three thousand pounds of Potatoes,
