This Indenture made the . . . day of . . . in the fourth
year of the reign of our sovereign lord George the third now King of Great
Britain and so forth and in the year of our lord Christ one thousand seven
hundred and sixty four, Between Daniel Fisher of the parish of Notoway
in the county of Southampton gentleman of the one part and Peter Buttr,
William Simmons, Thomas Williamson, Benjamin Clement, Benj^r Clement jr^r,
Albington Jones, Richard Kells, Charles Briggs, John Boykin, Charles Simmons
and Kenehan Taylor gentlemen vestrymen of the said parish of Notoway of the
other part Where forth that as well for an consideration of the sum of two
hundred pounds current Money of Virg^a to be paid at upon the . . . day of
which will be in the year of our lord Christ 1764 as also for an consideration
of 5^p by the said Peter Buttr, William Simmons, Thomas Williamson, Benj^r
Clement, Benj^r Clement jr^r, Albington Jones, Richard Kells, Charles
Briggs John Boykin, Charles Simmons & Kenehan Taylor; to the said Daniel
Fisher in hand paid at or before the sealing and delivery of these presents,
the receipt whereof the said Daniel Fisher doth hereby acknowledge, Have
granted bargained and sold aliened released and confirmed and by these presents
do grant bargain sell released and confirmed unto the said Peter Buttr,
William Simmons, Thomas Williamson, Benj^r Clement, Benj^r Clement jr^r,
Albington Jones, Richard Kells, Charles Briggs, John Boykin, Charles
Simmons & Kenehan Taylor, of the parish aforesaid and to their successors
the vestrymen of the said parish for the term being all that plantation
tract or piece of land situate lying and being in the aforesaid parish and
County and on the north side Notoway never lately belonging to Thomas Gray
and by him conveyed to Daniel Fisher partly to these presents by indenture
of record bearing date the fourth day of November one thousand seven
hundred and sixty one, bounded as followeth (to wit) beginning at a gum on the
southwest side of a small Branch of Coshunkoan swamp then south degrees
west one hundred and twenty four poles to a black oak, then northwest sixty poles
to a red oak then north by east one hundred and forty four poles to a small
Hickory, then north thirty seven degrees east seventy poles to a white oak on
the farther side of the branch begun upon, then north sixty degrees east one
hundred & twenty eight poles to a white oak, then south forty three degrees
east eighty six poles to a red oak, then south seven degrees east twenty eight
poles to a red oak and Hickory then south fifty eight degrees west sixty one poles
to a red oak, then south seventeen degrees west sixty nine poles to a Hickory
then south fifty one degrees west twenty five poles to a gum on the end of the
branch begun on and down the various courses of the end of the said branch
the beginning containing two hundred and seventy acres or thereabouts
