This Deed, made this Sixteenth day of March in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty eight, between Norfolk S. Ind. and Dennis R. Ind. (Grantors) of the first party, Joseph B. Purvis and John J. Hendon, Trustees of the second party, and the parties herein after named and alluded to of the third party; Whiteheath; that whereas the said Norfolk S. Ind. did by Deed of gift recorded in the Clerk's office of Southampton County on the 24th day of November A. S. 1863, give and devise to his son the said Dennis R. Ind., the following property to wit; The tract of Land on which the said A. S. Ind. now resides, containing Seven hundred acres, more or less, bounded by the lands of B. C. Walker, T. T. Ridgely and the lands belonging to the Estate of Horatio Harris and John E. Briggs deceased, together with all the tenements and franchises in any manner thereunto belonging; four heads of horses and their increase, Second kind of cattle with their increase, three oxen, eleven heads of sheep, with their increase, thirty two hogs, with their increase, all corn then in hand, twenty barrels wine or up, and the crop of late Cotton, about two thousand pounds, then on hand; all the crop of fodder, four thousand pounds, two or less, then on hand, all the potatoes, Irish and Irish, then on hand, crop of peat about thirty bushels, then on hand; all the farming utensils of every description, stone and hand; big and waggon, then carts, and wheels, poles of all kinds, one carriage and harness, one buggy & turnip, then on hand; together with all other farming implements and utensils then in possession of the said Norfolk S.
