This Inde made between George W. Dick, Boyd S. Gray and William J. Gray, grantees, of the one party, and Jacob Williams of the other party, Whereas by a decree of the County Court of Southampton of the November Term 1867, George W. Dick, sold the Lands of James Gray and Whereas by a decree of the same Court entered at the December Term 1868, the said George W. Dick, was bound to make the purchasers there upon the payment of their Rent, and Whereas Boyd S. Gray purchased 304 acres of the said Land from the said G. W. Dick, and exceeded his Rent for the same for the sum of \$390, and Whereas the said Boyd S. Gray has paid the same, and Whereas the said Boyd S. Gray did on the 18th of November 1868, by Inde of Trust to William D. Gray, all his interest in the said Land to Secure debts due William J. Gray, and Whereas the said Boyd S. Gray has since sold the said Land to Jacob Williams, and he and William J. Gray, the beneficiaries, in the said Inde of Trust and among them George W. Dick stands among the said directly to Jacob Williams, which they hereby signify by signing and sealing this present Inde and therefore the said W. D. Gray, in consideration of the sum of One Hundred Dollars in Silver, paid by Jacob Williams to Boyd S. Gray, the said George W. Dick, doth grant and Jacob Williams, a certain tract of Land, lying in Southampton County, containing 304 acres, formerly owned by James Gray and sold by him to George Williams and bounded by the lands of John Sharp, East & South of the lands of P. Blane and Jacob Williams, and West by the lands of William Bryant and James Gray, and the said George W. Dick, doth warrant specially to Jacob Williams such title to the said tract of Land as is desired in view of the decree aforesaid, and the said Boyd
