Whereas W. W. Briggs and E. C. Ferguson, were appointed Commissioners by a Order of the County Board, of Southwestern, made at December Term 1869, to sell the Tracts of Land belonging to the Estate of James G. Worrell decd. - which was assigned as Deed to his widow Margaret Worrell, containing Sixty acres, and by the direction of said Order, the said W. W. Briggs & E. C. Ferguson (Commissioners as aforesaid), did advertise said Tracts of Land, and sell the same, to the highest bidder, at J. J. Worrell's Sale, on the 15<sup>th</sup> day of January 1870, and at the Sale so made, Elizabeth Seed, wife of Lewis P. Seed, became the purchaser, by bidding therefor the sum of Seven Hundred dollars, which was the highest bid made for the same. Now this Deed was made this 27<sup>th</sup> day of February 1870, between W. W. Briggs and E. C. Ferguson (Commissioners of the first part, and Elizabeth Seed wife of Lewis P. Seed of the second part. - Witness that the said W. W. Briggs and E. C. Ferguson, Commissioners, for and in Consideration of Seven Hundred dollars to them in Hand paid by the said Elizabeth Seed, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, did grant, bargain and sell unto the said Elizabeth Seed, the Tracts of Land above described, known as the Tract of Land which was assigned to Margaret Worrell, widow of James G. Worrell, as Deed, containing Sixty acres, more or less, the exact boundaries of said Land was to found by reference to the Commissioners Report, in dividing the Land of said James G. Worrell among his heirs, and the said W. W. Briggs
