This Indenture made the 20th day of January in the year one thousand eight
hundred and twenty one, between Joseph A. Smith of the County of Albemarle, State of
Virginia, of the first part, and John Smith of the County of Southampton
State of Virginia, of the second part, doth shew, that the said party of the
first part, for and in consideration of the sum of Five thousand three
hundred and thirty dollars, lawfully money of the United States of America,
to him in that behalf of the said party of the second part, as at before,
the receipting and delivery of these presents, the receipt thereof is
hereby acknowledged, has granted, bargained, sold, delivered, remised,
released, conveyed and confirmed, and by these presents does grant, bargain,
sell, deliver, remise, release, convey and confirm unto the said party of the
second part, and to his heirs and assigns forever, all that portion of the
land, known as the Great Road, lying West of the Seaboard and Roanoke
Rivers, formerly belonging to the plantation known as the Rich
Creek, bounded by the line of John Whitehead's estate, and the
parting of the first and second parts, beginning at the Seaboard and
Roanoke River road, thence by the side of John Whitehead's line, to
a certain stone, thence South East of the line of the party of the first
part to a black gum growing at the line of the party of the
second part, thence about half to the said East End and parcelled
along said East End to place of Commencement, thence by
actual survey, two hundred and eighty three acres, together
with all and singular the tenements, hereditaments and appurte-
nances thereto belonging, as in any new asseverating, and
the return in and showing remainder and remainder, partly
free and partly leased, and also as the estate, right, title,
interest, property, possession, claim and demand whatsoever, as well
in law, as in equity, of the said party of the first part, of in and
