 given, granted, bargained, sold, let, conveyed, and sold to the said John W. Garrison of the
 second part, and his heirs forever, a certain tract or parcel of land, situate
 above & above recited, containing of about two hundred acres, & in
 part the same containing except the dwelling house upon it and
 recited, with the out houses is and about the yard, and about ten
 acres of land attached, which has been situated off the said land
 is bounded north by Henry Bayne, West by the said John W. Garrison,
