John J. Beyer

John A. Beyer made the 2d day of January and received eight hundred and twenty four dollars to Ferguson Jr. and John J. Beyer and Josephine J. his wife of the County of Loudoun and State of Virginia, of the sum paid, and John A. Beyer caused a bill of exchange drawn on him by Ferguson Jr. and John J. Beyer and Josephine J. his wife to stand, with general economy, until the 1st day of April, 1847, to R. Kelly, trustee, as aforesaid, in the following purfety & to bear of the interest, from the date of this instrument, two hundred & fifty one dollars, by which sum a bill, being part of the land known as "Eliza's Bearer," and recently purchased by John A. Beyer, and which was encumbered to said Ferguson & Beyer by Adams Reddish, Esq., Esq., dated the 17th day of March 1847, was duly recorded, and which land is bounded north by the County road leading from Jeffersonville to Mineral Spring, East by Potowomoy River back by the line of Orange, L. Hospital and Eliz. and west by the County road leading from Jeffersonville to the Hines Bridge, and which land is subject to a contract made by said Ferguson & Beyer with R. E. Kelly, related to cutting certain timber, as far agreement made at D. January 1847, and recd. also all services of laborers at the building of the said farm and having also agreed, and that it was assessed such total fifty five and one half acres and the day sold to Abel Brackenby fifty half, together with all and singular the appurtenances belonging to the same. It trust to serve to Abel Brackenby his heirs, executors, administrators or assigns, the sum of thirty four hundred dollars (\$3500) with interest at the rate of twelve percent per annum, drawn from this day till paid, and which debt is further secured by a bond dated the day and month and day above written with power to the said John A. Beyer, trustee as aforesaid, to make sale of the said land and appurtenances, at the law costs, and after paying all expenses attending said sale, including a Commission of five percent on all sales, then pay the said debt and all debts at the same, and the residue pay as the law directs.
