This Deed made the 20th day of January 1874 between Richard L. Bryant and
Maria L. Bryant his wife Anna H. Hill and Henry L. Hill of the first part and
John S. Everett and Coraile M. Everett his wife of the second part Whereas Henry L.
Hill School Everett and Coraile M. Everett his wife, Richard L. Bryant and Maria L.
Bryant his wife and Samuel H. Hill and themselves in a certain tract of land lying in Suffolk,
County bounded to the west 1190 acres and whereof Henry L. Hill died single and left behind him
whereof the said Everett during a partition of the same have agreed that the said land
shall be valued at four thousand dollars and divided into two lots numbered one and two and John
S. Everett and Coraile M. Everett draw lot number one and pay Henry L. Hill one thousand dollars
as full interest in the said lands all the other parties relinquishing their interest in the said lot
number one and Samuel H. Hill draws lot number two and Richard L. Bryant and Maria L.
Bryant and themselves deliver their full interest in the said lands to number two all the other
parties relinquishing their instant interest. Wherefore the said Edwards that Richard L. Bryant
