

C. & the like party to the Plaintiff part his heirs and assigns forever, all the certain property of James Estling as being in the County of Loudoun, State of Virginia, bounded and described as by the following Survey and Notes.



Begun at a large white Oak tree standing on the back side of S. B. Estlin's lot, about  
5<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> & 6<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> miles N. of New York, about 8<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> M. N. W. Lake Champlain, about 8<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> to 10<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> Miles E. of St.  
John, about 8<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> E. of Lake Champlain & a short road or corner for this trail at Jacob's Ledge,  
about 10<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> M. N. W. Lake Champlain, about 10<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> Miles E. corner for this trail at S. B. Estlin's  
house at 10<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> M. N. W. Lake Champlain, about 10<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> Miles E. corner for this trail at S. B. Estlin's
