Sharp, the wife of Richard F. Horris acknowledged, that, foregoes and sold and does sell and convey to the said Richard A. Sharp, that tract of land lying in the County of Loudoun, State of Virginia and bounded as follows: on the North and South by the bounds of David Gandy's land to the said Richard A.
