 Carpenter Vaughan and James N. Cobb and M.
 L. Cobb his wife of the County of Southampton
 State of Virginia of the first part and J. B. B.
 men of the County and State aforesaid, of the
 second part. Witnesseth: that for and in con-
 sideration of the sum of Twelve Hundred dol-
 lars to them in hand paid by the said party
 of second part, the receipt whereof is hereby ac-
 knowledged, they the said parties of the first part
 do bargain, sell and convey and by these presents
 have bargained sold and conveyed with general
 warranty unto the said party of the second part
 all of their right title and interest in and to
 that certain tract of land lying in the County
 and State aforesaid formerly owned by the late
 Matthew W. Vaughan and since his death by his
 heirs at law said to contain two hundred acres
 more or less, and bounded as follows, on
 the north by the lands of Bryant Hall and
 Warren Harcome, on the south by the lands of
 Misses Bittle and Rosa Cobb on the east by
 the lands of Seymour Vaughan and on the
 west by the downer lands of Mrs M. J. Vaughan
 widow of the late Matthew W. Vaughan to have
 and to hold the aforesaid tract of land to him
