This Agreement made this 19 day of April in the year 1880 between J. P. Coland of the first part and Stephen Coland of the other part both of the County of Southampton, State of Virginia: Witness as follows: Whereas, the said Stephen Coland is engaged in, or is about to engage in the cultivation of the soil, and is desirous that the said J. P. Coland shall during the present year make certain advances to the said cultivator of the soil, which the said J. P. Coland has agreed to do. Now this Agreement Witnesseth, That the said J. P. Coland does hereby promise and agree to advance and furnish to the said Stephen Coland during the present year, such money, provisions, fertilizers and other supplies (not exceeding the sum of thirty five dollars in amount) as may be needed for to enable the said Stephen Coland to cultivate and gather his crops proposed to be made the present year. And the said Stephen Coland hereby gives and grants to the said J. P. Coland a lien upon all such crops as he may make the present year, to wit: Corn, Potatoes, Hay, Hens, Cattle and all other crops, in order to secure the payment for all such supplies and advances as may be actually made, not exceeding the sum above stated. This Agreement is made in presence of an Act of the General Assembly of Virginia, approved April 2, 1873. Witness our hands this 19 day of April 1880.
