This Agreement made the 22d day of June in the year 1882 between
 O. C. Williams of the first part and Jacob Councill of the
 other part, both of the County of Southampton, State of
 Virginia: Witnesseth as follows: Whereas the said Jacob
 Councill is engaged in, or is about to engage in the cultivation
 of the soil and is desirous that the said O. C. Williams
 shall during the present year make certain advances to the said
 cultivator of the soil, which the said O. C. Williams has agreed
 to do. Now this Agreement witnesseth, That the said
 O. C. Williams does hereby promise and agree to advance
 and furnish to the said Jacob Councill, during the
 present year, such articles, provisions, fertilizers and
 other supplies, (not exceeding the sum of One Hundred
 Dollars in amount) as may be needed to enable the
 said Jacob Councill to cultivate and gather his crops
 proposed to be made the present year. And the said
 Councill hereby agrees and grants to the said Williams, a
 license upon all such crops as he may raise the present
 year, to wit: corn, Goden Peas, Peanuts, cotton and all
 other crops, in order to secure the payment for all such
 supplies and advances as may be actually made,
 not exceeding the sum above stated. This Agreement
 is made in pursuance of an Act of the General
 Assembly of Virginia, approved April 2nd, 1870.

Whereas Lawson Beale and Martha, his wife, died by and
 dated March 19th 1874 convey unto George E. Triville of the
 city of Portsmouth (Deaster), the following property to wit:
 all of that tract or parcels of Land upon which the said
 grantors now reside, lying in said County and is supposed
 to contain Seventy six acres by the same more or less, it
 being the same tract which was granted to the said
 Beale by Anthony Morris in the year 1852, bounded and
 described as follows: on the North by the lands of
 Nathan Thomas deceased East by Augustus Smith, on the South
 by the lands of St. A. Joyner. All that tract of land
 which was owned by James Jackson in his life time
 for which he resided, containing Seven hundred
