

The letter from James H. Platt to Peckers and the statement
from Joseph Gregory to John Peckers & others referred to
in the deed are in the following words to wit:

March 18th 1877

Mr Peckers

Dear Sir

Rev Joseph Gregory having
informed me that the deed to seven acres (more or
less) of land near Franklin purchased from you
some years since had never been recorded, and he
having paid the purchase money for the same, I
respectfully request you to make a deed of the property
direct to Mr Gregory, he will destroy the former deed
when he receives the new one.
