And all, to whom these presents shall come, knowlege, that I William Hart, of the County of Southampton, for the love good will and affection, that I bear, unto my son Edwin Gray Hart, of the County of Southampton, have given granted, and confirmed, and by this present writing, do fully, freely and absolutely give, Grant, Convey, unto my said son Edwin Gray Hart, his heirs and assigns, a certain tract or parcel of Land, lying and being in the County of Southampton aforesaid on the south side of Halloway River, containing four hundred and Seventy two Acres, being part of a Patent, bearing date 1798 and then renewed to me, and granted the above mentioned four hundred and seventy five Acres, by patent bearing date 1790, and bounded as follows to wit Beginning, a pine in the County line, a corner of Lethro Davens Land, formerly Elsho Davens Corner, thence along the said Lethro Davens line North three hundred and fifty six poles to a pine by the side of the said Kings Road, a corner of Isaac Williamses Land thence along his line North fifty eight Degrees West one hundred and thirty one poles to a live oak, thence North thirty three degrees west twenty six poles to a dead oak, thence North fifty degrees West fifty poles to a Hickory, thence South forty two degrees West one hundred and thirty seven poles, to a pine, a corner of George Williamses Land
