bargained and sold, and by these presents, do grant bargain and sell unto  
 the s<sup>r</sup> Thomas Pate, and to his heirs and assigns forever, all that land or  
 parcel of land, and plantation, whereon the said John Applewhite lately  
 removed from, containing by Survey two hundred and fifty eight & a half  
 acres, be the same more or less, and is bounded as follows To wit, Be-  
 ginning at a pine, on the bank of the Plovermains swamp, near the mid-  
 dle of Thomas Applewhite's (formerly Henry Applewhite's dec<sup>d</sup>) and in the  
 line of s<sup>r</sup> Thomas Applewhite, North thirty five degrees East ninety  
 four poles through the old field to a dogwood thence north forty three  
 degrees East forty six pole to a Gum in Ciper Branch, thence down the  
 run of said branch to a Gum in said Branch, a corner, consistant of a pine  
 mentioned in the plot of said lands, between the s<sup>r</sup> John Applewhite and  
 Abraham Sug, formerly Henry Sug & Abraham Wiggins, <sup>conveyed to him by</sup> thence along  
 said <sup>Abraham Sug's</sup> line, <sup>to a highland oak a corner of s<sup>r</sup> James Pate's</sup> thence along  
 of the said Applewhite & said Wiggins, thence North forty degrees East forty  
 six pole to a maple, standing on the side of the reedy Branch, thence down  
 the run of said Branch, six and nine pole to a Gum - a corner of Thomas Pate  
 jun<sup>r</sup> (formerly Horace Ellye's), thence along said Pate's line North thirty  
 degrees East, one hundred and fifteen pole to a Hickory, a corner of People  
 Boy's land, thence along s<sup>r</sup> Boy's line, South forty nine degrees West, one hun-  
 dred and nine pole to a pine in the reedy Branch, thence up the run of said  
 branch to a white oak sapling on the south side of the s<sup>r</sup> Branch, made  
 a corner in the dividing line, between the said John Applewhite & Henry  
 Applewhite, thence along a direct line, made between the s<sup>r</sup> John & Henry  
 Applewhite, to a sweet Gum on the plowman's swamp, thence down the  
 said swamp to the beginning, at being part of the lands purchased by  
 Henry Applewhite dec<sup>d</sup> of Joseph Leake by indenture bearing date the  
 twelfth day of August, one thousand seven hundred & sixty, and said Map  
 was conveyed by deed of entailage, to the said Henry Applewhite by Sam<sup>l</sup>  
 Pate & Tho: Pate, bearing date the 25<sup>th</sup> day of May, one thousand seven  
 hundred & sixty nine, and by the last Will and Testament of the s<sup>r</sup> Henry  
 Applewhite dec<sup>d</sup> bearing date, the seventh day of May one thousand seven  
 hundred & eighty three, was devised to be equally divided between his two sons  
 John & Henry Applewhite and their heirs, but the equity of redemption in  
 the lands conveyed by the said Samuel & Tho: Pate by deed of entailage, not  
 being foreclosed in the life time of the s<sup>r</sup> Henry Applewhite, neither in  
 the life time of the s<sup>r</sup> Samuel or Tho: Pate & the fee simple having by  
 legal descent, descended to Benjamin Johnson Pate, and the said Benjamin  
 Johnson Pate, by his indenture bearing date the sixteenth day of March  
 one thousand seven hundred and ninety, hath conveyed the s<sup>r</sup> entailage  
 lands to the said John & Henry Applewhite and to their heirs, all which said  
 conveyances are recorded in the County Court of South Hampton and duly  
 had thereof, was taken up by John Applewhite & for him surveyed which  
 will appear by certificates upon the hand of Sterling Foster, or duly Surveyor  
 for Benjamin Puffin Surveyor for s<sup>r</sup> County, bearing date the twentieth day  
 of April, one thousand seven hundred and eighty five, together with all
