This Indenture made this eighteenth day of January, in the year of our Lord Christ one thousand eight hundred and ^{hundred} Between John Morris and Ann Morris his wife of the County of Southampton of the part and Thomas Gray of the County aforesaid of the other part, Witnesseth That the said John Morris for and in consideration of the sum of one hundred and five dollars in hand paid by the said Thomas Gray the receipt whereof the said John Morris doth hereby acknowledge, and him self fully satisfied and paid the said John Morris hath granted bargained and sold, aliened, enfeoffed and confirmed and by these presents doth grant, bargain and sell, alien enfeoff and confirm unto the said Thomas Gray his heirs and assigns forever, one certain plantation, tract, or parcel of land, lying and being situate in the County of Southampton adjoining the Lands of Anselm Jones, containing by Estimation one hundred Acres, be the same more or less and a late property of Nicholas Morris deceased being the same which the said Nicholas Morris purchased of Samuel Sebrill, Daniel ^{Sebrill} and David Sebrill, and bounded as follows, to wit, Beginning at a Pine, a corner tree in Anselm Jones's line thence North West by North eighty four poles to a Maple, thence along the said line one hundred and sixty two poles to a Pine a corner tree on the line formerly of the said Nicholas Morris thence from the said pine South thirty six poles East to a live Oak in the line formerly of Daniel Sebrill thence East by North along the said line to a pine, thence
