I lend unto my beloved Wife Maryon Whitehead, all my lands that I now possess with the Crops thereon and all my plantation stands of every description during her life or widowhood, bales land unto my wife Maryon all the other property that I now possess consisting of stock of all kinds, household and kitchen furniture &c. During her life or widowhood, except my slaves & with them to be liberated at any time when my wife thinks proper, if the Law of the Land will in case of their being liberated, I do wish any wife Maryon intermarries after my death, I wish all my property that is then remaining to be disposed of among my wife and then surviving Children as the Law of the Land now in force doth direct. I do wish all my property to be sold with to sell each of my personal property as she thinks proper to pay my debts, and to my Children at the death of my wife without savings. I wish all my property to be liquidated amongst my then surviving children as the Law of the Land now in force directs my hand and seal this 29<sup>th</sup> day of August 1753

Recited therein named proved by the oath of James Powell one of the Witnesses therein and continued for further proof and on the motion of the said Reciter who made oath according to Law? Certificate is granted her for obtaining a probate thereof in due form in his quire place and security whereupon the said Maryon Whitehead with Lamb. A. Bynpin and James Powell her Secretary entered into and acknowledged their bond in the penalty of new Hundred Dollars conditioned as the said indenture and as aforesaid held for the said County of Southampton on the 15<sup>th</sup> day of January 1754 of this will was taken proved by the oath of Cliche Atkinson another witness thereto and ordered to be read

In the name of God Amen, I Elizabeth Dols of Southampton County State of Virginia being of perfect mind and memory do make and declare this my last Will and testament. In the manner and form following to wit: In the first place, I give and bequeath to my daughter Rebecca Dols all my lands household and kitchen furniture except one Bed and furniture which I shall hereafter dispose of; one negro boy New two cows and pigs two Swine and Hawks two crows and calves all of which Property above named I give to her and her heirs forever. 2<sup>d</sup> I give and bequeath to Edward Dols, Children to be equally divided amongst them one negro boy Dick. I give to them and their heirs forever. 3<sup>d</sup> I give and bequeath to Robert Dols son of Patrick Dols one negro boy George Parker. I give to him and his heirs forever. 4<sup>th</sup> I give and bequeath to my daughter Mary a Sumner all one Bed and furniture one negro woman Abby which property above named I give to her and her heirs forever. 5<sup>th</sup> It is my will and desire that my man Cliche should be free if he will accept of it by complying with the Law on this subject - it is to give him his freedom and if he does not think proper to accept of it on this condition it is my will and desire that he may make choice which of my Children he will serve. 6<sup>th</sup> After the payment of all my just debts I wish the remainder of my Estate to be equally divided between my 2 sons Patrick and Edward Dols Patrick during his life and at his death I give and bequeath the same to his children to them and their heirs forever. 7<sup>th</sup> I constitute and appoint my son Patrick Dols my whole and sole Executor to this my last will and testament hereby revoking all other
