I John E. Nicholson of the County of Southampton and state of Virginia being
in possession of all my natural abilities to make and ordain the following writing to be my
last Will and Testament I give my best to Ann Brown, my old maid George and
one thousand dollars to her and her heirs forever. I give my new maid
my daughter Martha and two thousand dollars to her and her heirs forever I give my
niece Julia Briggs a negro girl named Patience and two thousand dollars to her and her
heirs forever. I give my nephew John E. Nicholson my land and place of my ma-
turity lying and being in the County of Suffolk called and known by the name of Belton
containing acres more or less my negro man Edward Birrell and Isaac and a woman
named Rachel together with every article of value found and belonging in the house or out
I atom also my riding horse called Charles with my single Bridle and Harness to him
and his heirs forever I give my nephew William E. Nicholson the house and land
whereon I now live contained in the following bounded & described Beginning in Horse
road and running in the northerly road due south to a pine on Hudson Pepe's line then
to a red oak in Elijah St. Eri's line then along his line to the big post
thence along said post to the main run of the Mill Pond thence up said pond
to a small bridge on a narrow way near the gate thence due north to Marion's
post and down said road to the beginning containing
more or less together with the following slaves and property to wit one negro
man named Jack one named Isaac women my maid Mary my house
Bob and little Peter my household and Kitchen furniture of every description
and my Monday & Tuesday Dishes & Utensils belonging to the dwelling to him &
his heirs forever I give my nephew George and Robert Nicholson the tract of
Land lying on the east side of the main road containing seven hundred and eighty
six acres to be equally divided between them to them and their heirs forever
I give to Edwin Brille a piece of land lying on the north side of Marion's road containing
forty five acres more or less to him and his heirs forever I give to my nephew
William Briggs my negro man Tom his wife Mary and child to him and his
heirs forever The balance of my Land together with my Mill I give to my Esopus
divided between my nephews Charles & William Joseph & John Robert Briggs
to them and their heirs forever My Will and desire is that my negro man Tom
his wife Mary and all his children together with my crop of every kind stock of
Every kind not given away to sell and apply to the payment of Bills of Lading
should that prove insufficient my heirs here after naming are authorized to sell
such negroes so effect that purpose as the payment of my debts
