1st I will that my Executors hereafter named take a sufficient way of my estate and pay all my just debts together with the expense of testament and all costs of executing fully ^{my} Will

2^d I give to my daughter Elizabeth Perry my land one sheet square Corner Spain and Welsh Blanked to her my said daughter and her heirs forever

3^d I give to my grandson Stephen T Perry son of Miles Perry thirty dollars hereunto to be paid to whomever will bring said grandson shall attain this age of twenty years and to him and his heirs forever

4th I give to my daughter Sally Myrants one best spotted blanket one best checkered Counterpane one best quilt and one Dutch Blanket to her and her heirs forever

5th I give to Sally Pope Widow and relict of Joseph Pope dec^d my blue printed Quilt together with all my bed furniture or in other words my bed clothing which I have not before disposed of to her said Sally Pope and her heirs forever

6th I give the balance of my estate of every kind whatsoever to be equally divided between Sally Myrants and all the children of said Joseph Pope dec^d to them my daughter and Grandchildren and their heirs forever

Lastly: I declare that my brother Jacob Barnes Executes this my Will In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal this 16th day of June 1839.
