my bond is got in I wish all my Negro men to have 10 dollars given them also my Negro women
to have 5 dollars each.

I wish Dr. Wm. Thomas to have the hands in buffed to make he some frocks and 25 dollars in cash.
I wish you to examine my two letters and if there are any writings which you think will be usefull
to my children get a chest or trunk and put them up also I wish you to get the spoons that was
Benjamin's and give them to him and the spoons that was little Thomas's, and help them
what he is going.

A Writing purporting to be the Executions Will of Jane Applewhite dec. was produced in Court
and proved according to law by the oath of Benjamin Lewis and Mary A Lewis, and ordered to be recorded
as the true Executions Will of said Jane Applewhite dec. William B Goodwin, the Executor named in
said Will appeared in Court and refuses to take upon himself the burdens of the execution thereof, and on
the motion of J. B. Mason, who made oath and together with William B Goodwin and Nathaniel J. Mc
Leis his securities, entered into and acknowledged a bond in the penalty of Twenty thousand dollars, con
ditioned as the law directs, to satisfy and is granted him for obtaining letters of administration on the estate of
said Jane Applewhite dec., with her said Will annexed, in due form.
