Will

In the name of God, amen. I Nicholas Bell of Southampton County & State of Virginia, being sick and weak in body but of perfect mind and memory, thanks to the Almighty God for the same, and calling to mind it is appropriate for all men to die, do make and ordain this my last will and testament. First of all, I give for my just debts and funeral charges to be paid out of my small estate. Secondly, I leave my loving wife Mason left one third of my real and personal estate, her son, also life or widowhood.

Thirdly, I give and bequeath unto my four sons, Alfred, John R. Bell, Nicholas C. Bell my lands, now given to be equally divided among the four boys before named to them and their heirs forever.

Fourthly, I give & bequeath unto my son, Alfred Bell one horse called Duke to him and his heirs forever.

Fifthly, I give & bequeath unto my son, Alfred Bell one silly called Jenny, to have and to hold
