Upon the motion of the plaintiff to admit to probate, a certain writing bearing date the 21st day of January 1895, as the last Will and Testament of Joseph H. Myrick, deceased,

This day came the parties by their Attorneys, and W. F. Sabrell Guardian ad litem of the infant defendants, filed his answer, to which the plaintiff replied general.
