W. A. Myrick, Alva R. Myrick, Julian D. Myrick, Belle A. Moore, formerly Myrick, Herbert A. Myrick, Walter E. Myrick, Stonewall J. Myrick, Samuel S. Myrick, Eunice D. Myrick, Carrie J. Barnes, William B. Barnes and Sallie B. Barnes, the last six infants, who dying by W. J. Sebrall Their Guardian ad litem.

Upon the motion of the plaintiff to admit to probate, a certain writing bearing date the 21st day of January 1895, as the last Will and Testament of Joseph H. Myrick, deceased.

This day Came the parties by their Attorneys, and W. J. Sebrall Guardian ad litem of the infant defendants, filed his answer, to which the plaintiff replied generally. Thereupon, none of the persons interested asking for a jury, and submitting the issue involved to the Court, the Court proceeded to decide the question of probate; whereupon a writing purporting to be the last Will and Testament of Joseph H. Myrick deceased was this day produced in Court by Rosena A. Nicholson, and there being no subscribing witnesses thereto, William A. Myrick and Joseph B. Barnes were sworn, and severally depose that they are well acquainted with the Testator's handwriting, and verily believe the said writing, and the name thereto subscribed, to be wholly written by the Testator's own hand. Whereupon the said writing is ordered to be recorded as the true last Will and Testament of the said Joseph H. Myrick dead. And there being no Executor named in the said will, on the motion of James L. Lomax, who made oath, and together with Joseph B. Prince and William S. Holland as his witnesses, who justified on oath as to their sufficiency, entered into and acknowledged a bond in the penalty of Seven Thousand Dollars, conditioned
