J. B. Wigham
Will

I, James B. Wigham of the county of Southampton and State of Virginia, do hereby make my last will
and testament in manner and form following, that is to say:

After the payment of my debts and funeral expenses, I give to my wife Rebecca Louisa
Wigham all of the negroes and their increase, which fell to me in her right from the
estate of her father the late Thomas F. Fairlie, to her and her heirs forever. I also
give to her and her heirs forever, two thousand one hundred and fifty dollars for the
land which fell to me in her right, and which land I sold to my brother Richard
A. Wigham, provided she will make him (my brother Richard A. Wigham) a good
right to aforesaid land; I further give to my wife Rebecca Louisa Wigham
eight thousand dollars to be paid to her by my executors hereafter named, as soon
after my death as it can be raised from my estate - I also give to her all of
my household and kitchen furniture, my carriage and horses, to her and her
heirs forever.

I give to Sally Wigham and M. Ada Wigham my nieces and daughters of Richard
A. Wigham, and Maria Antoinette Wigham daughter of Charles F. Wigham, the sum
of seven hundred and fifty dollars each, to them and their heirs forever. I also give to
Henry Wigham the son of Anselm B. Wigham the sum of five hundred dollars
to him and his heirs forever.

After this, I wish the balance of my estate to be kept together until my son
Whitwell H. Wigham arrives to the age of twenty one, I then wish his por-
tion to be taken from it and given to him and his heirs forever.

After this is done, I wish the residuum of my estate to be kept together, until my
son James B. Wigham reaches the age of twenty one, I then wish his portion to
be taken from it and given to him and his heirs forever.

After this is accomplished, the balance of the estate to be kept together until
Frances W. Wigham arrives to the age of twenty one, I then wish her portion
given to her and her heirs forever.

After this, I wish the balance of the estate to be kept together until my youngest
daughter Margaret W. Wigham reaches the age of twenty one, and for it then to be
given to her and her heirs forever.

Should either of my children die before he or she shall arrive to the age of
