the said writing is deemed to be regarded as the true last will and  
testament of the said William Thornton deceased. And on the motion of  
W<sup>m</sup> J<sup>r</sup> Thornton the executor herein named who made oath and gave  
his according law, (without security) the will directing him to be  
should be required of him) certificate is granted him for  
obtaining a photostat of the said will in due form.

In the name of God, Amec! I, Elizabeth S. A. Williams of the County of Southampton, State of Virginia, being of sound mind and disposing memory, do make this to be my last will and testament, inform as follows:

1<sup>st</sup> It is my will and desire after the payment of all my just debts that my two sisters Virginia Britt and Cornelia Williams should have and receive the whole of my property both real and personal to them and their heirs forever and in case either one of them should die without children the portion of the one dying to go to the survivor. In the event that either or both of my said sisters shall marry, it is my further will and desire that the property and interest hereinbefore given them should be retained by them for their own proper use and benefit free from the use and control of their husband or husbands. And if both of my sisters before named should die without lawful issue the whole of the property and interest hereinbefore given, I give and bequeath to the children of my brother Anthony M. Williams. But the acceptance of one or both of my said sisters of this bequest is to be upon the express condition that they or either of them thus accepting shall afford to my father Sprottly Williams during his natural life a comfortable home and a decent support. And it is understood that he is to have the direction and management of the estate so far as may be practicable in order to secure to him the benefit above intended for him.

2<sup>nd</sup> - I hereby constitute and appoint my father Sprottly Williams, Esq., to this my will and testament, being under my hand and seal this 15<sup>th</sup> day of March 1833. Signed, sealed and delivered 3
