He begs leave to state that sometime in the year 1853 Maria C. Vaughan widow of Thomas Vaughan dec'd intermarried with John R. Higgins and difficulties having arisen between Leonard C. Cobb adm. of the said Thos. Vaughan dec'd and the said John R. Higgins as to what proportion of the personal estate of the said Thomas Vaughan dec'd his said widow was entitled on her subsequent marriage. The said parties agreed to submit the points of difference between them to John R. Chambliss and W. H. Whitfield Esqrs, and if they could not agree they were to call in an umpire whose award should be final and binding. The said arbitrators not being able to agree chose L^c L. Cobb as umpire.
