 R. Kello \$88.60, to A. B. Burgess \$7.78, to J. B. Dick \$2.62, to Matthew D.  
 Davis \$22.50, to J. J. Davis \$1.44, to A. C. Cook \$20.80, to Matthew  
 J. Davis \$14.03, to W. J. Kello \$13.52, to W. R. Stephenson \$11.74, to Madison  
 J. Davis \$4.33, to Kello & Stephenson \$7.11, to Robert M. Dolan \$2.20,  
 and to Alfred S. Thomas \$58.34, being the respective amounts appertaining  
 him in the said account with interest on the said respective amounts from the 15<sup>th</sup>  
 October 1855, till paid.

In the name of God, Amen: I, Nathaniel Bowdoin, of the County of Southampton and State  
 of Virginia, being of sound mind & memory and considering the uncertainty of this frail  
 and transitory life do therefore make, ordain, publish and declare this to be my last  
 will and Testament, that is to say: First, After all my lawfull debts unpaid  
 and discharge, the residue of my estate real and personal I bequeath and dispose  
 of as follows, To wit: To my beloved wife one feather bed that was hers and one  
 trunk, to my daughter Polly W. Bowdoin one feather bed, to my daughter  
 Sarah E. Turner by marriage one dollar only. And all my estate both  
 personal and chattels to be sold and the money after paying all my just debts  
 to be equally divided between my wife Isbell and my daughter Polly and also my  
 negro man John to be sold as my other property.  
 I hereby make, constitute and appoint my friend Geo. W. Sperry to be Executor  
 of this my last will and testament, hereby revoking all former wills made by me. And  
 witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and affix my seal this thirty first day  
 of December in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty five.
