To the County Court of Southampton County:

Your Commissioner reports to you that Harrison S. Pope the Executor of Stephen Ellsworth dec'd has exhibited before him a statement of all money owing by the said Executor or with which he had become chargeable or held during the period embraced in the foregoing account together with the sum in support of the disbursements. That he finds a balance of \$1000 and fifty four Dollars and Twenty nine cents to be due by the said Testator to the said Executor on the 31<sup>st</sup> day of December 1857 with interest thereon from that day. That the said account is supported by satisfactory vouchers and that the said Executor has given such as the law requires, the penalty whereof (and the securities thereto sufficient and) unobjectionable in the opinion of the Commissioner. The Commissioner did not charge the executor with interest on the small balance of \$3<sup>d</sup> July 1<sup>st</sup> 1857, as he paid the same out on a very short and agreeable deal more.

That the said Harrison S. Pope was embezzled in the last of December past at the front door of the Court House of Southampton County on the first day of June Court last, and was on this day (the day having elapsed since the same was there posted up) the foregoing account is made up and completed.
