Be it remembered that a Court of Pleas and Quarter Sessions is this day opened and held for said County at the Court House in Jackson before the Worshipful Wm. Barron, C. Jacobs, W. J. Copeland, Jno. H. Whitaker, and Wm. M. Crocker, Esquires, Justices of said County. A paper Writing which is in the following words and signed

Thus;
In the name of God, Amen! I, Henry W. Joy, of the County of Northampton and State of North Carolina, being of sound and disposing mind and memory, but conscious of the uncertainty of my earthly existence, do make, publish and declare the following to be my last will and testament.

Item first. I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Mary the following negro slaves, viz; Fred, Leamp, Dred, Jacob, Cleary, Allen, Martha, Elijah, Margaret, and her children, Jim and Tommy, one hundred barrels of Corn, ten thousand pounds of blade fodder, four thousand pounds of pork, Carriage and Harness, forty pigs with sows, eight Cows and calves, one yoke of Oxen, five head of horses or mules and all the household and Kitchen furniture obtained by marriage with her to her and her heirs forever.

Item second, I give and bequeath unto my son William H. Joy five hundred dollars in money to him and his heirs forever.

Item third. I give, devise and bequeath to my son John C. Joy my plantation in Southampton County, Virginia, and also my plantation in Greensville County, Virginia, known as the Dodo Place, together with the crop, stock, farming utensils, household and Kitchen furniture and other perishable property on said farms, the following negro slaves, viz; Joe, Little Sam, Daniel, son, Cato, Edmund, old Chucky, George, Anthony, Phoebe, Silvey and her children, Annella, Amy, Marie, Amanda, Jim, Garrison, Lavinia, and Hester, and also the sum of five hundred dollars in money, to him and his heirs forever.

Item fourth, I give, devise and bequeath to my daughter Rebecca &c.
