 to Law, which bond having a Stamp of the Internal revenue of  
 the amount of One dollar affixed thereto, is ordered to be recorded.  
 Certificate is granted the said Wm L. Stephenson for obtaining a  
 probate of the said Will in due form. Stamps of the Internal Revenue  
 of the United States of the amount of Two dollars being affixed thereto.

 that age, I give it to him. Should he not live to be that age, I give  
 it to the three youngest Nancy, Anna, & Patty.

All of my Chattle Estate sold with the exception of Six Barrels Corn, and  
 what Bacon can be found and every thing else sold should they not be  
 enough to pay all my just debts, I wish for the Land wherein I live  
 sold, but if there is enough without the Land I lend it to my daughter,  
 Anna Ann Crumpeter, until her Son John becomes of age, and give  
 it to him, now I conclude and finish my Will. —
