Dear Aunt July 12<sup>th</sup> 1862.

It is with great pleasure I take my dear Aunt under my little  
pen to write you and Uncle John again to inform you where I am, and how my  
health is, and also to hear how you all are. This letter leaves me quite fuddled though I  
and in hopes my health will improve shortly. I wrote to you and Uncle John  
a Month ago, and I can't think the cause of my not getting an answer from  
you. Though I presumed you did not get it. I have since heard from  
you that letter for I have been till a few days ago hunting the Gander's both night  
and day, through thickets and Swamps. Shooting us from behind trees, logs and bushes.  
Though last Tuesday week we drove them from in about three or four miles of Richmond,  
back to their gun boats about twenty miles. They had thrown up entrenchments all  
the way along, but we did not have to charge but one, and we charge that twice  
but without success though they left it that night and pushed for their gun boats and  
we were after them, this battery had sixty guns constantly firing in upon our men.  
We had a heavy loss there and they did also, we lay in the woods all day Monday  
and they burned us all day. We had to lay as flat as we could and not then  
they killed and wounded a good many. Sometimes the horses would take off a  
Man's head or his head and sometimes his leg. This was awful sure. I will  
now stop this and inform where I am. I left Thursday eight miles above Richmond  
and we are now Station on Petersburg side of the James River in Drury's farm  
in a boat three miles of Drury's bluff. till Uncle John please to take care of what  
I have left behind and if I never come back he may have it, give my love to  
all the Children, for I want to see them all. Uncle John you will please write me  
if you will please to and give me a substitute for I can't stand service, please  
write as soon as you get this letter. I must now close my letter. I remain  
your obedient Nephew until death.

At a Monthly Term of the County Court of Southampton County, held on the  
21<sup>st</sup> day of October 1867. Ina sitting one bearing date 10<sup>th</sup> day of  
June 1859, and the other bearing 12<sup>th</sup> July 1862, purporting to be the  
last will and Testament of Geo. F. Jolliffe or Geo. F. Jolliffe, was  
produced to the Court for probate, and there being no subscribing
