Ordered to be recorded.

In the Name of God, amen I Nathan Johnson being of Sound and disposing
Mind and body, do Make this to be my last will and Testament as follows: (that
is to say,) I desire that my body be buried at the direction of my Executors
as herein after named, and I desire that all my just debts be paid out of
my Estate, as soon after my decease as may be convenient. First I leave
to my dear and beloved wife Lucy all of my Estate both real and
personal during her Natural life, or so long as she is my widow, excepting
a part of the Hark tract commencing at the Light House Swamp and running
a straight line of marked trees to the Mill branch, estimated to contain
two hundred and twenty five acres, which I wish my Daughter Martha
James or her heirs to take possession of at my death, and the Branch
Tract supposed to contain two hundred acres, I give and request
to my Daughter Victoria Virginia, when she arrives to the age of
twenty one or married. At the death of my wife, I give to my
son Alexander Coindexter my home plantation supposed to contain
two hundred and fifty acres, with stock, mill and fixtures.
I give to my Daughter Victoria Virginia, two hundred and fifty acres
when she arrives at the age of twenty one or married, and at
the death of my wife one Bureau. I give to my son
Alexander Coindexter at the death of my wife two hundred
and fifty acres and my Gold Watch. At the death of my wife
I desire that all of my Estate not herein disposed of or may be
accumulated by her, or the premises, be sold by my Executors and
equally divided between my children, namely: Martha James,
Victoria Virginia, and Alexander Coindexter.
I do hereby appoint my son Alexander Coindexter and Edwin
H. Raiford, to be my Executors, and request of the Court that
they require Security of them as such. Given Under my hand and
Seal this 22nd day of January 1869.
