

In the Name of God amen I William Vaughn of Southampton County being sick and weak of body but of perfect mind and Memory and calling to mind the Mortality of man & knowing that it is ordained for all men once to die, do make and ordain this my last will and Testament in manner and form following first of all I Recommend my soul into the hands of God that gave it and my Body to the earth to be Buried in a decent and Christian manner & as touching such worldly goods as it hath Pleased God to bestow on me with I give and Dispose in the manner & form following

Item I give and to my son William Vaughn my Plantation - containing two hundred & ten Acres to him and his heirs forever and one feather bed & furniture two cows & calves and two sows and pigs ewes and lambs one chest & one gun

Item I give and bequeath unto my Daughter Hannah Sharpe five Shillings

Item I give and bequeath unto my Son Ephraim Vaughn five Shillings

Item I give and bequeath unto my Daughter Lucy Taylor five Shillings

Item my will and Desire is that my wife Sarah Vaughn shall hold in Possession my land above mentioned and all the remainder of my estate undivided During of her life or widowhood and then to be sold at Publick Sale and the Money Equally Divided betwixt my five Daughters Mary Fathemy Dorcas & Elizabeth, and I do Appoint my wife Sarah Vaughn and my son in law Nathan Turner Executors of this my last will and Testament as witness my hand and seal this thirtieth day of May 1769 -

At a Court held for the County of Southampton Newway the 12 day of Oct^r 1769 - This will was presented in Court by Sarah Vaughn the executrix therein named proved by the oaths of John Muddell & Thomas Francis two of the witnesses thereto & ordered to be recorded and on the Motion of the said executrix who made oath according to law Certificate is granted her for obtaining a probat thereof in due form - giving security whereupon &c

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In the name of God amen I Arthur Burdell of y^e County of Southampton in Virginia being sick and weak but of sound mind and perfect Memory do make ordain this my last will and Testament in manner and form as followeth I give to my son John Cansell one hundred and fifty Acres of land lying on the south side of my Plantation divided by a line beginning & ending at the west end of my Patent near
