that is in the Shropshire County to be her full share
of my hole estate and not to come in for any share of my
movable estate other wise I desire my Movable estate
may be divided as the law directs. It is my will
and desire that if either of my four children Dies
without heir there land shall be divided between
their Brothers that are living and I do further appoint
Thomas Carrall and John Russell my sole Executors
of this my last will and Testament and do hereby
revoke and make void all former wills by me made
or made and I do establish this to be my last will
& Testament In Witness whereof I have hereunto set
my hand & seal this 29th day of July 1769
