In the name of God, amen, I, George Camp of the County of Southampton, State of
Virginia, do hereby state my last will and testament, hereby revoking all other wills
by me at any time made.

I do hereby give unto my wife Sarah during her natural life the farm on which I
live, also the farm known as the Piney Woods farm and adjoining the farm of
Ben Cobb, Patrick Mine and others, to be used as she may wish for her support and
comfort.

Second. After the death of my wife, I give the farm on which I live unto my
son, George L. Camp and to his heirs forever. I also give him my entire Chattel Estate,
consisting of Cows, Hogs, Household and Kitchen Furniture, farming utensils, Carts &c. &c.
unto him and his heirs forever.

Third. The farm above referred to known as the Piney Woods farm, at the death
of my wife Sarah, I direct to be sold out the proceeds to be divided equally
between my children John L. Williams, A. Paul J. Benjamin, J. Sarah Virginia, the
wife of Nathaniel Norfolk, Robert J. Mary Eliza the wife of John Williams, the
children of Martha Larkins wife and the wife of William Larkins, said children
to receive One Share Stafford the son of my son George L. Camp, the wife of
James Bruster, the wife of George Wiggintoff, each One of my children
sharing alike in the ground children to receive the proportion which would
if their parents were alive, belong to said parent.
