 Southampton, do make and constitute this my last will of Testament,
 touching and things hereunto made by me, do hereby Command my body to,
 the to the Executors of my said to, almighty God, from whom I came,
 and to be buried in such Manner as my Executors or Administrators
 shall may direct; First, after all my just debts and paid my
 be disposed of in the following Manner, to wit, I leave the property to
 my wife for my Mother Mary Fletcher, to be supported from my estate
 those years I shall she live at home, I leave the second, after my death
 I give to my Chappell the sum of twelve dollars in cash
 I leave the third, and lastly I give unto Deborah Tild all the residue of
 my property of all kind to begin of his share from this my last will of
 Testament made this last day of March one thousand eight hundred
 and forty seven.

At a Court held for the County of Southampton, on the 17th day of
 November A.D. 1847. Of writing bearing date the 17th day of March
 1847, purporting to be the last will of Testament of Solomon Fletcher did
 was this day produced in Court in Order to be proved.

And it appearing to the Court that the Subscribing witnesses
 to the said writing are dead, Chas. J. Stephenson & Arthur W. Hol-
 lenman, being sworn solemnly depose of said test and again
 acquainted with the handwriting of C. J. Stephenson, and of the
 Subscribing witnesses thereof & truly believe that the signature
 of said C. J. Stephenson therein is in the proper handwriting
 of said C. J. Stephenson & thereupon it is ordered that the
 said writing be continued until further proof.

And at a Court held for the said County on the 18th day of
 May 1847. Of writing bearing date the 17th day of March
 1847, purporting to be the last will and Testament of Solomon
 Fletcher did. Was this day again produced in Court, and
 Arthur W. Hollenman, one of the Subscribing witnesses
 thereof, being dead, John P. Spafford, being duly sworn
 & examined, declared in Court, that he is well ac-
 quainted with the handwriting of the said Arthur W.
 Hollenman did, and truly believe that the name of the
 said Arthur W. Hollenman to the said writing
 subscribed as a witness, is the same handwriting of the
 said Arthur W. Hollenman. Whereupon it is ordered
 that the said writing be recorded as and for the last
 last will and Testament of the said Solomon Fletcher did.
