

At a Court held for the County of Southampton the 13<sup>th</sup> day of June 1782 This Will was presented in Court by Elizabeth Hutchings the executrix therein named proved by the oaths of Ann Miller one of the witnesses thereto and continued for further proof And on the motion of the said executrix who made oath according to law certificate is granted her for obtaining a probate thereof in due form giving security whereupon &c. And at a Court held for the County of Southampton the 15<sup>th</sup> day of July 1782 Alexander Guthrie offered as a witness to prove the hand writing of the said Daniel Hutchings died. who being sworn deposed that he served the said Hutchings ten years as a captain of a packet from Norfolk to Bournemouth Ferry that he was well acquainted with the said Hutchings hand writing and that he truly believes the will to be the Will of the said Daniel Hutchings proven at the last Court was wholly written and subscribed by the said Hutchings and that a letter now filed to prove the verities of hands was also wholly written and subscribed by the said Daniel Hutchings together with the postscript and further oath not And at a Court held for the said County of Southampton the 15<sup>th</sup> day of July 1782 This Will having been before proved by the oath of one of the witnesses thereto and the verities of hands writing by the deposition of Alexander Guthrie is ordered to be recorded And on the motion of William James who made oath according to law certificate is granted for obtaining letters of administration of all the goods and chattels of the said decedent unadministered by Elizabeth Hutchings died the former executrix with the said will annexed giving security whereupon &c.
