Thomas Fitzhugh
Wills

I Thomas Fitzhugh of Southampton County do hereby make my last will and
Testament in manner and form following that is to say,

Imprimis, I lend to my wife Priscilla Fitzhugh, my Tract of Land whereon I now
live containing Three hundred and fifty six acres, with my Mills on the same,
during her natural life -

Item, I lend to my said wife during his life, as much of my stock of all
kinds, plantation utensils, household, and kitchen furniture, as she may think
necessary for her use, and the balance, if any, to be sold by my executors
to be hereafter named, upon this Condition, that she furnish my son Hewit
with a Bed and furniture, and at the death of my wife, if any of the
stock plantation utensils, household or kitchen furniture should remain
I desire they may be sold and the money arising thereupon to be equally
divided amongst all my Children,

Item, I lend to my wife during her life, the following Slaves viz^t Glasgow
Monday, Chinas, and Pleasant -

Item, I lend to my daughter Rebecca Parker, during her life, the following
Slaves, viz^t Jack, Fanny, and Preston, and at my said daughters death,
I give the said Slaves to be equally divided amongst her living Children
to them and their heirs forever -

Item, I give to my son John Fitzhugh all my Tract of Land lying on the
South Side of the road leading from the late residence of Willis Holladay,
(now owned by Henry Barrow) to Southampton Court house to him and
his heirs forever, I also give to my son John, the following Slaves viz^t Harry
Daphne, Anise, Anthony, and Pink, to him and his heirs forever -

Item, I lend to my wife my negro woman Daphne during her life and
at her death, I give the said negro woman Daphne, to my son John, to
gether with her increase, to him and his heirs forever -

Item, I give all my Land, lying on the north side of the road leading from
the late residence of Willis Holladay, to Southampton Courthouse, and called the
Puckhorn Land, to be equally divided between my sons John Thomas & Hewit,
to them and their heirs forever -

Item, I give to my son Thomas Fitzhugh to him and his heirs forever, my tract
of Land whereon Thomas now lives, containing nineteen and one half
acres be the same more or less, and bounded as follows, beginning at
the old Indian line, thence along, sth line to Col Thomas Ridleys line
