desiring mind and memory and being desirous of disposing of such Estate as it hath pleased God to  
bestow upon me & to ordain this writing to be my last Will and Testament

I give to my beloved wife Caroline Phillips all the property that I am now, or which I may be here  
after entitled to from her further estate by intermarriage with her also my secretary my Bag  
harp, one Linen and one feather bed of her choice all of which I give to her husband Benjamin for ever  
I give to my beloved wife Caroline Phillips fifty dollars per annum to be paid to her by my executors hereafter named &  
during her widowhood

I give to my beloved wife Caroline Phillips one third part of all the lands which I am now entitled to until my son  
William Phillips arrives to the age of twenty one years and no longer

I give to my daughter in law Elizabeth W. Bay, thirty dollars which I give to her during her widowhood

I give to my son William Andrew Phillips the residue of my estate both real and personal which I now have or  
may be hereafter entitled to which I give to him his heirs & assigns forever but should my son William Andrew  
die before he arrives to the age of twenty one years or without leaving living lawful issue of his body then I desire  
that all the estate given to my said son William Phillips be divided into three portions one of which I give to my beloved  
wife Caroline Phillips another portion to my daughter Elizabeth W. Bay and the remaining moiety I give to my nephews  
William Phillips son of my brother Henry Phillips which I give to them themselves and a legacy respectively to  
Samuel and apprentice friends William H. Bay and John & Robert Edwards to them my last will and testament  
giving writing other and former Wills made by me. In witness whereof I have countersigned my Hand and affixed  
my seal this day of 1819 signed written published and declared as and for the last Will and  
testament of William Phillips in presence of

At a Court held for the County of Southampton on the 15<sup>th</sup> December 1823 The Wills and Testaments were read by William T.  
Elliott Esq and I, John Barnes Esq, who, referring to quality, persons and establishes the facts to carry personally  
and publicly to be recorded and on the motion of Christopher Mason Esq administration with the usual annual Certificate  
is granted him for drawing a pedigree therefrom and giving security whereupon the said Christopher  
Mason together with William H. Bay & James Foyard his securities entered into a bond and sealed their bond  
in the penalty of Fifty thousand dollars conditioned as the Law directs.
