his wife my negro man Tom and my saddle horse known by the name of Fiddle to him
his heirs forever as also I give my feather bed and furniture to my Sister Catharine
Harpers to her and her heirs forever. In the last clause and fourth of this my last will
and testament I have substituted and appointed my friend Thomas Allen and Henry
Moore to settle my Estate and to liquidate out of my estate for their trouble acting

in Court by Henry Moore one of the Executors therein named of Thomas Moore the other Executor
single qualified proved and ordered to be recorded And on the motion of the said Henry Moore
who made oath according to Law Certificate is granted him for obtaining a probate thereof
due form on his giving bond and Security whereupon the said Henry Moore together with
Benjamin Turner and John C. Turner his deacons entered into and acknowledged their
bonds the penalty of fifteen hundred dollars conditioned as the law directs

George White Memorandum We the subscribers went to Mr Benjamin White on Tuesday morning last and
conspired him found him very ill to ill that he said he wanted to make a will and sent for Mr. Little for that
purpose but he did not come until it was too late, during which time he called us to take
notice that his will was that his wife should have all his Estate of every description whatever
to dispose of in any way she might think proper except where she had wished to leave free at her
death, if the law would permit him to stay here and to free but if not he wished her to have
him and dispose of him also in any manner she might think proper he advised that the
witness why he wished to make a will was that if he did not his relations would come in and destroy
his wife's peace under an hour this 7th day of Oct. 1824 signed and sworn to before me by
Geo. Branch and Edg. Branch this 7th day of Oct. 1824
