At a Court held for the County of Southampton on the 25<sup>th</sup> December 1824. This court and process were issued by John Hunt Richard Cook and Benjamin Blunt Esq the execution and recording thereon made (when Richard Cook and Benjamin Blunt refusing to take upon themselves any part of the burden of the execution thereof) issued by the oaths of Colens W. Burnard and James Bay as two of the witnesses thereto and also the record of the same was made by the oaths of Elizabeth William B. Tipt and Francis Bourge the witnesses thereto and ordered to be recorded and on the motion of the said Justice who made oath according to an certificate so granted here for obtaining a probate thereof in due form on his going to and returning from the said Town Hunt together with William G. Cooke Richard H. Edwards and Benjamin Blunt his executors and trustees endorsed unto and acknowledged their bond in the sum of twenty thousand dollars and damages as her last account.
