manner following. Item I stand to my loving wife Eliza all my lands containing by estimation
six hundred and fifty acres also all my slaves & stock of all kinds and their increase together with
all my house hold and Kitchen furniture and plantation utensils except one collie dog
Cane and Bottles one Gun and one pair of Fists during her natural life or widowhood
and after her death or marriage then I give the aforesaid lands to my two sons John H.
Barnes and Nathaniel Barnes and their heirs forever to be valued by three good men and
Equally divided between them the said John H Barnes and Nathaniel Barnes and the
I give my Daughter Martha P. Barnes as much out of the aforesaid lands as she shall desire
of my two sons in the aforesaid land and after her having her part in proportion to my sons then I give the
balance of the aforesaid lands of any to my two children to be equally divided between them I stand
to Henry Pitt during his natural life or widow and to Matthew Barnes one pair of fists
during his life. I give to my son John H Barnes one collie which is called his collie on Gants
hills and his heirs forever It is my desire for all my just debts to be paid I wish the money that
is due to me to be applied to that purpose and if there should not be enough due me to pay all
my just debts it is my desire that my Execution and Executor should dispose of such property as they
think proper to pay all my just debts I appoint my loving wife Elizabeth Barnes and my friend Dr
Henry Pitt and Peter Thomas my next friend of this my last Will and Testament
