William Helle

In the name of God amen I William Helle of the County of Southampton and State of Virginia  
being sick and weak in body but of sound mind and desiring memory for which I thank God,  
and call to mind the uncertainty of human life and having desirous to dispose of all such mortally  
estate as I shall please God to bless me with I do to my beloved wife Elizabeth Helle the  
whole of my estate both real and personal during her natural life or widowhood and at her death  
as of she should marry my will is that the whole of my lands should be equally divided between them  
my two sons Edward Helle Harry Helle and William Helle to them and their heirs forever  
In case my wife should get married or at her death my will is that all my slaves should  
serve my wife as apiece and none with each slave after at the age of twenty one years old  
at which time my will is that each and all of my slaves namely one negro man by the  
name of Peter Maria and his wife one negro boy by the name of Jacob one negro man  
by the name of Frank one negro by the name of Lornell and one negro boy by the name of Ned  
should be set at liberty & have their freedom If as their request and of the laws of the state  
will not admit of their being freed and stay in the state my will is of they can be  
sent to my other State within United States and to give people there my task is for them to be sent here  
and if they had rather go than to be slaves belonging to my three sons and if it is their choice to  
remain slaves here It is my will to dispose of them in the manner following to wit I give my son  
Edward Helle one negro man by the name of Peter one negro boy by the name of Maria and his woman  
to him and his heirs forever I give to my son Harry Helle one negro boy by the name of Jacob  
and one other boy by the name of Frank to him and his heirs forever I give to my son  
William Helle one negro boy by the name of Lornell one other by the name of Ned to him  
and his heirs forever I hereby name and appoint my beloved wife Elizabeth Helle my  
executrix to this my last will and testament directing all persons with whom made and to  
by these presents acknowledge this my last will and testament this 1<sup>st</sup> day of August 1823

true and lawful managing the said estate Helle together with Edward Edward Helle John Helle  
his Executrix and others interested in and action brought there bond in the sum of Three thousand dollars to stand  
as the Law directs
