THOMAS BOON, son of NICHOLAS BOON, was born about 1648 in England. He came to America about 1663 and settled in the Isle of Wight, Virginia and died there in 1723. The name of his wife was Elizabeth. She died before 1713. (Was she the daughter of Richard Ratcliffe and his wife, Elizabeth?)

Isle of Wight was formed in 1634, one of the original shires of Virginia.

A professional genealogist says the the Isle of Wight, Southampton Counties of Virginia and the Northampton County, N. C. groups which include the Joseph Boons from Johnston County, N. C. are all the same family.

We find the following in Chowan Co., N. C. early in 1719: Thomas, Joseph, Nicholas, William and James Boon.

Ratcliffe Boon b. 1685d. 1752, m. ca 1709 wife's name unknown. Their children were Ratcliff Jr. b. 1710, James d. 1770 and Jacob d. 1790. This son of Thomas never left the Isle of Wight, Va. The story of his descendants may be found in Historical Southern Families by Boddie, Vol. #7, page 101, 102 and 103. (Mrs. Charles A. Still of Lubbock, Texas had this line worked up.)

First I give my Soul to God Who Gave it and my body to be buried According as my Exs Shall See Convenient:

- Item: I give unto my son Nicholas Boon: my now dwelling plantation and all ye Land belonging Thereunto: and a Small mare to my Son Nicholas Boon: and my Own proper gun: And ye use of ye plantation to my wife During her Life.
- Item: I give unto my Son William Boon The upper part of a neck of Land; Lying upon The Little Swamp: and a young Black Mare.
- Item: I give unto my Son Joseph Boon: The Lower part of a Neck of Land Lying upon the Little Swamp: The Land containing Three Hundred Acres: Equally to be Divided: between my Two Children: William and Joseph.
- Item: I give unto my Son Nicholas Boon; one Large Iron Pot.
- Item: I Give unto my Son William Boon one Small Iron pot.
- Item: I give unto my Son Joseph Boon one Iron Kettle for to be enjoyed After my Wifes Decease:
- Item: I give unto my Daughters Mary, Martha and Ann Boon A Bay Mare and her Increase; I say unto my Daughters Mary martha and Ann:
- Item: I Give unto my Loving Wife: Mary Boon all ye Rest of my Goods and Chattels. both within and Without. During her Life: and Afterward to be Equalely Divided among my Children: And my own proper Horse to my wife for ye use of The Plantation: And I Desire that my Sons Have freedom When Sixteen years of age. If my Wife Marrys:

The Last Will and Testament of Nicholas Boon Testator: I Appoint Execrs. my Brother Willm Boon and Thos. Boon Jun: and my Loving Wife.

JAMES (3) BOON

I commit my soul to God and my body to the earth.

Item: First, I wish all my debts and funeral expenses to be paid.

Item: I give to my son-in-law, John Early, my negro woman Rose after my wife's death, and 50 apple trees to be delivered on demand.

Item: I give to my son-in-law, John Wynns, my negro Charles after my wife's death; my cross cut saw and writing desk upon demand; half the benefit of my apple orchard which I leave in his care until his son, George Augustus Wynns comes of age; also my black walnut table after my wife's decease and one thousand feet of new plank to be delivered immediately.

Item: To my son-in-law Cullinear Sessums, my negro Adam to be delivered after my wife's death.

Item: To my grandson, George Augustus Wynns, my manor plantation and 400 acres of light woodland adjoining the plantation. If he die without heir, the same is to fall to the next heir of my daughter, Mary Wynns. In case she die without heir I will that it descend to the heirs of my daughter Elizabeth Early.

Item: Also to my grandson, George Augustus Wynns, my mare branded W and his choice of all the children of my negro Judy after the first.

Item: To my grandson, James Early, my negro Sam.

Item: To James Burke, my negro woman Moll and her son Coffee and all her future increase, 100 public bills and 21 pounds 12 shillings in gold; my great featherbed and its furniture and his choice of any beds after my wife's decease; my gray mare and a yearling filly and a young gray horse which runs in my pasture and my buckineer gun and cutlash, and my new chest and one large pot and pot hook and my wearing apparell to be made to fit him. All this I leave in care of my son-in-law John Wynns as tutor and guardian until he arrives at age 18 then said estate is to be delivered to him, but not to his disposal until age 21 without the advice and consent of said Wynns.

Item: I give to Wm. Burke my negro Judy and her increase except the one given to my grandson George Augustus Wynns; 100 pounds of Public Bills and 5 pounds in cash and twenty five pounds in bills for his education, a sorrel mare filly running in the pasture and my little gun and one iron pot and pot hook, all of which I leave intrust of my son-in-law John Wynns (reserving the service of Judy to my wife for her lifetime) Until he arrives at age of 18 years, then said estate to be delivered but not at his disposal without advice and consent of John Wynns whom I appoint his tutor and guardian until he reaches 21 years, reposing the trust of his person to my wife while she lives.

- Item: In case either of said brothers James or Wm. Burke die under age it is my will that half of the estate be delivered when due to the other brother and the other half divided equally between the sons of John Early and John Wynns.
- Item: I give to John Askew 2 cows and calves, 50 apple trees and 2 ewes and a ram to be delivered next spring and 20 pounds Current Bills on demand.
- Item: I give to my god daughter Martha Davis one mare colt to be delivered next spring.
- Item: I give to my loving wife Elizabeth Boon, my two horses, Jack and Shavers, my large sorrel mare and my new English saddle, 5 pounds cash and my great kill of lightwood, and all the remainder of my lightwood, I give to her and John Wynns.
- Item: I leave the remainder of my personal estate after my wife's decease to be divided between John Wynns and James Burke.

I appoint my loving wife, Elizabeth Boon, executrix and my trusty sons-in-law John Wynns and John Early. In witness whereof I, said James Boon, have set my hand and seal this 8th day of June 1733.

Mary Boon, daughter of James and his wife Elizabeth Bush Grimes, was the first wife of John Wynns. He was born 1708 and died in 1752 at his home Winnson in Bertie Co., N. C. The had children James Boon Wynns, Mary Ann, Watkins William, Sarah Amelia, John (should be) George Augustus and Wynney Caroline. He later married Sarah \_\_\_\_\_ had by her Benjamin and William and also probably Annie (Reason). (From Historical Southern Families by John Bennett Boddie, Vol. 2 page 269.)

We know from James Boon's will that he had three daughters, did he also have a daughter who was the mother of James and William Burke. He does not speak of them as his grandsons.

The first permanent settlement in North Carolina was established in 1653 when large numbers of settlers came south from Virginia to occupy the section North of Albemarle Sound which was called Albemarle Precinct. In 1670 Albemarle was divided into four precincts (counties) one of which was Chowan which lay on both sides of the Chowan River. In 1722 Chowan was divided and that part of the precinct lying on the east side of the river retained the name of Chowan, while that part west of the river was organized as Bertie Co. Northampton was formed from Bertie in 1741.

Ratcliffe Boon, son of Thomas Boon of Isle of Wight, remained in Va., but it seems that Joseph, Nicholas, William and James and Thomas came into North Carolina. We find them in Chowan precinct as early as 1720 and in Bertie County by 1728.

JOSEPH BOON (I)

This is the FIRST ANCESTOR of which we have absolute proof. ~~Was he the son of Nicholas, (son of Thomas) whose will without date or probate was witnessed by John Strickland, John Ford and Nathaniel Cooper? Nathaniel Cooper also witnessed Joseph Boon's will dated 19 Feb. 1728 in Chowan Precinct, N. C. Nicholas had a daughter Martha, Joseph had a sister Martha. (Some genealogists believe this Joseph to be the son of Thomas and the brother of Nicholas, but believe that it can not be proved.)~~%

This Joseph, whose date of birth is not known but probably ca 1690 and possibly in the Isle of Wight, Va. moved to North Carolina. His will is found in Edenton, Chowan Co, N. C. later Bertie Co. His wife is not named in his will but believe her name to be Elizabeth, last name unknown. (Deed dated 27 January 1727/28 in Bertie Co., Joseph and wife Elizabeth to Richard Bayley part of a patent to Joseph Boon 1 March 1719 being 200 acres on the South side Meherrin River. Witt: William Green, Nathan Cooper. (See Colonial Bertie County Abstracts of Deed Book B & C, 1725-1730. B-426)

I, Joseph Boon, being very sick and weak of body but in perfect memory do give and dispose of what worldly effects God hath been pleased to endow me with I give and dispose after the manner following:  
First, I bequeath my soul to God who gave it, and my body to be buried after a decent manner. According as my executor shall see convenient.

Item. I give unto my son James one certain tract or dividend of land granted in patent in my son James Boon's own name.

Item. I give unto my son Joseph Boon, one hundred acres of land lying upon Ochonechy Neck at Roanoke.

Item. I give unto my son Thomas Boon, one hundred and eighty acres, it being part of a tract of land containing 480 acres granted by patent bearing date ye first day of March 1719, lying on ye South Side of Mehorrin River. (Meherrin)

Item. I give unto my son Ratlif Boon, my now dwelling plantation containing 380 acres, I say unto my son Ratliff, after his mothers decease

Item. I give unto my son James my new gun.

Item. I give unto my son Joseph my old gun.

Item. I give unto my son, James, one certain grey mare, branded with a barrell of a gun and her increase ye sons each of them one.

Item. I give unto my sister Martha Bayley, a heifer and calf to (share or manage). (This may have been whether free or married. Note \*

Item. I give unto my son Thomas Boon, my sword.

Item. I give unto my son James Boon, one iron pot, a small one when he comes of age sixteen years.

## JOSEPH BOON II

This Joseph, son of Joseph Boon I was in Craven Co., N. C. in 1742, where we find him selling land which had formerly belonged to Joseph Boon in Northampton Co., N. C. patented 1 March 1719.

Craven County became Johnston County in 1746 and this is where Joseph's son Joseph III was born in 1752.

Joseph II was probably born in Chowan Precinct, date unknown but before his father's will was written. It is not known who his wife was but 1790 census of Johnston County shows him still living with one white female and two free people. He deeded land and slaves in 1793 to his son Joseph III. He is not found on the 1799 tax list so it is presumed that he died between 1793 and 1799.

He may have had other children but I have found no record of them.

His brothers, James and Ratcliff were in Craven County at the same time he was, then Ratcliff was later in Johnston County. There was also a Thomas Boon in Johnston County with land adjoining that of Joseph and Ratcliff. Was he also a brother or the son of Ratcliffe.

#27---Grant to THOMAS BOON--100 acres, 25th February, Johnston Co. on the North side of the Neuse River joining Joseph Boon and Ratcliff Boon.---copy of a photostatic copy by Dept. of Archives and History, Raleigh, N. C. 19 Nov. 1962.)

In the will of Joseph Boon III written the 29th day of May 1832, he bequeathed to his son Daniel his old plantation on the Neuse River and "including the burial grounds of my parents". So we know that Joseph II and his wife were buried in Johnston County.

## RATCLIFFE BOON

This Ratcliffe, son of Joseph (I), is first found in Northampton County deeding land in 1742, then we find him later in Johnston Co., North Carolina living near his brother Joseph Boon II. He sold part of this land in 1772 and more of in 1779, then we find him buying land in Surry County, North Carolina in 1784. He died there in Surry County in 1787. Ratcliffe Boon was born ca 1715 probably in Bertie County.

His wife's name was Ruth, last name unknown. It is not known where she was born or where she died. She was still living when Ratliff made his will.

## WILL OF RATLIFF BOON

(d: 1787)

I Ratliff Boon, being in perfect mind and sound memory do make and ordain this to be my last will and testament.

First, I give my body to the earth from whence it came to be buried in such manner as my executors hereafter named shall think proper, and as for this worlds goods which it hath pleased God to endow me with; give and bequeath in the manner and form following.

I give unto my wife Ruth Boon one negro named Ballar and one wench named Judge and one girl named Hannah together with all the personal estate I possess only what I shall give to my children hereafter named during her natural life.

I give to my daughter Rachel Girley one dollar to her and her heirs forever.

I give to my son Joseph Boon one negro fellow named Trial to him and his heirs forever.

I give to my son Thomas Boon one negro boy named Crombel to him and his heirs forever.

I give to my daughter Charity Clark one negro boy Abaraham and ten pounds in money to be raised out of my land when sold by my executors to her and her heirs forever.

I give to my son Ratliff Boon one negro fellow named Ned to him and his heirs forever.

I give to my daughter Hester Boon one negro girl named Fellice and one feather bed and a ten pound horse to be raised out of the said land when it is sold to her and her heirs forever.

I give to my daughter Mary Boon one negro girl named Hager and one feather bed and one ten pound horse to be raised out of the sale of the above said land to her and her heirs forever.

I give to my son Daniel Boon one negro girl named. Vilate and one feather bed and one gray colt which is called Prok to him and his heirs forever.

My will and desire is that the land whereon I live should be sold after my decease and the money arise from such sale I give to my son Daniel only what I have will out of it to three of my daughters . to him and his heirs forever.

My will and desire that all that I give to my wife during life that after her decease be sold and equally divided between my daughter Charity, my son Ratcliff, my son James, daughter Hester and Mary and my son Daniel except the girl Hannah which I give to my son Daniel more than the rest to them and their heirs forever. Revoking and disannulling all other wills heretofore made. This and no other to be my last will and testament; pronounce and declared, Signed, Sealed in the presence of.

I do constitute and appoint my son Ratliff to execute this my last will and testament.

Joseph was probably the oldest son since Ratcliffe sold land to him in Johnston Co., N. C. in 1772. Daniel must have been the youngest son. The deed to Joseph Boon in 1772 was witnessed by Wm. Gurley and Thomas Boon. Did Rachel marry this Wm. Gurley?

In 1800 Census, Pendleton District, South Carolina shows Charity Boon Clark, Ratliff Boon, Mary Boon McKinney and Daniel Boon living near each other.

Charity Boon ( daughter of Ratcliff and Ruth Boon) b. about 1754 married 1778 David Clark, son of Bowling and Winifred Clark of Virginia and grandson of Christopher Clark, Hanover, Va. David had brothers, Jonathon, Bowling, and Micajah, and sister, Elizabeth. David was a Revolutionary soldier, enlisting in Surry Co., N.C. in 1776. After the war they lived in Pendleton District, S. C. #

Charity and David Clark had eleven children: George, Mary, James Silas, Elizabeth, Charles, David (b. about 1792, Pendleton District), William, Susan, Harry and John Clark.

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Ratliff Boon (son of Ratliff and Ruth Boon) d. before 1822 in Pendleton District, S. C. married in Surry County, N. C. Nancy Harris, (daughter of Robert and Lucretia Brown Harris who moved from Albemarle County, Va. to Surry County, N. C. after the Revolutionary War). They had nine children: Ratliff, one of the commissioners that planned the town of Pickens, S. C.; Tyra Boon; a daughter who married William Dawson; Daniel Boon; Joseph Boon; Cadon; a daughter who m. Wm. Alexander; another daughter who married Zacharia Candler; then Hester Boon who married Thomas Harbin, son of Samuel Harbin, and had brother Jesse who married a Sarah Boon. There was also Nancy Boon b. 1829? m. John Palmer (Palmour) and another daughter who married Masten Pool. This would make eleven children instead of nine. (Note this information on Charity and Ratliff was given by Mrs. C. E. Hilliers, 101 Daniels Avenue, Rutherford, N. J. 07070.)

A Short History of the Town Of Princeton,  
North Carolina

by  
Maurice S. Toler  
1973.

The town of Princeton was first incorporated in 1861 as "BOON HILL", to honor the name of the areas first settlers. The name was changed to Princeton in February 1873 by an act of the General Assembly. The township still bears the name Boon Hill.

In 1739 Joseph Boon received a grant for a parcel of land on the "north side of the Neuse River" in Craven County (Johnston was formed from Craven in 1746). He and his brother Ratcliff moved their families from Northampton County in the early 1740s. The land on which they settled was on the north side of the Neuse River near the present road that leads to Richardson's Bridge.

Joseph Boon and his son Joseph Boon Jr. (1752-1836) acquired large tracts of land in the area from present day Princeton south to the Neuse River and east over into Wayne County. Joseph Jr. was a Colonel in the North Carolina Militia during the Revolutionary War and served three terms in the North Carolina House of Representatives (1781, 1784, 1808) and one term in the North Carolina Senate (1787).

Joseph Boon III inherited from his father about 600 acres of land on Moccasin Creek. He built a dam across the creek and established a mill there. Since the "Stage Road" from Raleigh to the east ran through his plantation, Joseph also operated a livery stable. Some years after his death in 1812, the plantation and millpond were acquired by the Holt family and today the latter is known as Holt's Pond. (This is our Joseph Boon IV)

Joseph Boon III's brother Daniel Boon (not related to the illustrious hunter and Indian fighter) had considerable land holdings in the vicinity of present day Princeton. It is believed that his land included the area known as the "Big Hill", northwest of Princeton. Daniel emigrated with his family to Mississippi about 1840.

Other Early Settlers

The Boons were followed closely by other settlers to the area. A look at the land grants issued before 1770 reveals many names which are to be found in Princeton and vicinity today--Alford, Atkinson, Ballard, Boon, Bulls, Capps, Crawford, Edwards, Gurley, Howell, Lawhorn, Lynch, Martin, Oliver, Patterson, Pierce, Raiford, Rains, Simms, Stallings, Stevens, Strickland, Talton, Tiner, Toler, Warren, and Whitley.

A postoffice was established January 15, 1829 at Whitley's (where Baker's Mill is today). Jesse Whitley was the first postmaster. When Jesse Holt became the postmaster in 1834, the postoffice was removed to the vicinity of Holt's Pond, south of Princeton.

The post office was moved into town about 1875.

When the first train passed through Boon Hill in 1854, the town's streets had already been laid out and apparently several families were living there.

The earliest deed of record in Boon Hill was for the sale of a lot by Willis Hastings to Kedar B. Whitley on May 23, 1854. Owners of lots in the town of Boon Hill, up to the time of incorporation in 1861, included: Willie Hastings, Kedar B. Whitley, William D. Holt, Zechariah Edwards, William H. Parker, Zilphia Talton, Dr. James Hays, Calvin A. Holt, Sherod W. Hamilton, B. B. Hamilton, Joseph S. Holt, Thomas Edgerton Jr., Willie Starling, John B. Parish, Josiah Edwards, Daniel Finlayson (teacher and native of England), M. A. Willoughby, J. J. Finlayson, A. J. Heath, Ransom Holt, Sophia Howell, L. P. Phillips, Henry Toler, and Charles Howell.

The first organized church in the vicinity of Boon Hill was Union Meeting House (Old Union Primitive Baptist Church) formed in 1806. Micajah Thomas served as first pastor and John Phillips as first elected Deacon.

The first church in the town of Boon Hill was probably the Methodist (Methodist Episcopal Church South). In September 1863 the church trustees purchased the land on which the present church stands. The Princeton Baptist (Missionary) Church was organized in 1889 with eight members. The church's first minister was O. C. Horton. One of its present members, Mrs. Flora Barbour, has been a member of the church for 75 years, having joined in 1898.

Prior to 1900 at least five doctors practiced medicine in Princeton and vicinity. Dr. James Hay, a native of Ireland, was in Boon Hill as early as 1858 and was still there in 1877. Dr. J. B. Strachan seems to have practiced there at two different times. He was in Princeton in 1877, was away for a few years, returned in 1883, and was still there in 1896. Dr. Roscoe Hooker was in the area from 1867-1869, maybe longer. Dr. J. H. Roberts practiced there in 1872 and Dr. E. P. Williams was practicing medicine in Princeton in 1884.

Formal education may have been available to a few Boon Hill area children as early as 1828. In the Raleigh Register (issue of May 28, 1828) Jesse Whitley advertised for a "gentleman qualified to teach the Greek and Latin Languages, ..to take charge of an academy in Johnston County....eleven miles below Smithfield." As a result of the Public School Law of 1840, school committees were appointed in four districts in the Boon Hill area. Teachers were John Holt, James M. Whitley, Dixon Phillips, Willie Holt, and William Lynch. By 1850 teachers were N. G. Holland, Thomas J. Holt, George Thorp, B. A. Woodall and Fort T. Phillips.

A number of Boon Hill area residents served in state and county government. Serving as representatives in the General Assembly were: Henry Rains (1777), Phillip Raiford (1779, 1819), Joseph Boon (1781, 1784, 1808, 1818), John Whitley (1780, 1794, 1795), John Atkinson (1818), Kedar Whitley (1830, 1835, 1836, 1842), W. A. Smith (1864), W. H. Joyner (1870, 1881), E. J. Holt (1874, 1879), and J. W. Perry (1885).

Phillip Raiford served as county sheriff in 1777 and again in 1788-1789. E. J. Holt was elected sheriff in 1872. Charles C. Massey served as Clerk of Court from 1861 to 1873, maybe longer.

One unusual position was filled by Thomas H. Atkinson during the War between the States. In May 1863 he was appointed Salt Commissioner for the County. He was "given authority to use the faith and credit of the County to purchase 6000 bushels of salt for use of the people of the County."

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The above are excerpts from an article in the Smithfield Herald, Smithfield, Johnston County, N. C. "History Section", published in August 1973 and sent to me by Mr. Toler. Mr. Toler was at one time connected with the N. C. State Department of Archives and History. He is now Archivist at N. C. State University at Raleigh and is recognized as one of the foremost historians of the State. I have corresponded with him since 1961, and in 1972 when Mary Boon Allen and I made a trip to North Carolina we had the pleasure of meeting him in person, and he was kind enough to take us to Boon Hill and show us where our BOONS lived in those long ago days. ----D. Did Joseph and Sarah Bass Boon have a son Abner. I have found this name in several lists of Joseph's children, always with a question mark. In 1814 Joseph Boon deeded land to Daniel and the deed was witnessed by Wm. J. Verell and Abner Boon. \*

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A letter from Kate S. Stokely ( Mrs. J. T.) dated 18 July 1961, Washington, D. C. in which she says "your letter came the other day and was delighted to find I had a new cousin. You are descended from Joseph and I from Sarah who married W. W. Hopkins who was my great grandfather. My grandfather Devereaux Hopkins was reared by his grandfather Joseph Boon whose wife was Sarah Bass." She says, "in one of my mothers letters to a friend she gives the names of Joseph's and Sarah's children: Daniel who m. a Boykin, William married a Southgate (should be Southall), Joseph m. ### JOSEPH BOON III

Col. Joseph Boon--A Copy of the Obituary Notice as it appears in The Biblical Recorder ( North Carolina dated 9 Novmber 1836, is as follows:-

"Departed this life on Friday, the 21st of October, Col. Joseph Boon, of Johnston Co. in the 84th year of his age. Col. Boon attained this great age on the farm where he was born, and where sleep the dust of his parents, always enjoying that greatest of all wealth, Contentment at home. Of him it is not to much to say, that he filled the measure for which man seems to have been originally designed. Industrious, without being slavish, economical without parsimony. By a steady course of prudence he had acquired a handsome competency for himself, besides for a numerous family. His hospitable roof was ever the shelter of the weary, and from his bountiful table the hungry were always fed. And the frank and hearty welcome given to his guests gave zest to the entertainment, which sweetens the most homely fair. He was chivalrous without being arrogant, dignified without austerity, with the port and bearing of a gentleman he combined the meekness and humility of a christian. He was a member of the Baptist Church, and a well founded hope bouyed him up under affliction of unparrellled severity for more than seven years, always feeling to say "the Will of the Lord be done". He waited with patience, but longed and much desired his final earthly end, and when death approached, so far from shrinking from his cold and relentless grasp, he hailed him as a kind messenger sent in mercy to disencumber his immortal spirit from the clay cottage in which it has so long been a tenant at will, to enter into a purchased possession of an inheritance in the skies. Which is undefiled and fadeth not away, reserved at the right hand of the Father in Heaven where the wicked cease to trouble, and where the weary are at rest. He has left a numerous train of relatives, and friends who mourn his departure, but they sorrow not as those who have no hope, seeing that him they mourn is only removed from the evils to come.

----"Let me die the death of the righteous, and let my last end be like his."----

I, D. B. T., received the following several years ago from Maurice Tolar who was at that time with the N. C. Department of Archives and History, at Raleigh and is now Archivist at N. C. State University:----"I spent about half a day last December in the area where the Boon family lived. I talked to a man who lives there now and he pointed out what he said was a graveyard. Although I have no proof I believe that Joseph Boon, Sr. (1752-1836) and his father and mother, and probably Joseph Boon, Jr. and other members of the family were buried there. It is a wooded "neck" of land which juts out from the woods and is surrounded on three sides by cleared land. There were some very old oak trees there and under one of them were several large rocks which probably were headstones; however there were no visible inscriptions on them." -----

## WILL OF JOSEPH BOON, III

In the name of God, Amen:--I, Joseph Boon, Sr. of the County of Johnston, and State of North Carolina, being weak in body but of perfect and sound mind and memory, Blessed be God, and knowing that it is appointed for all persons once to die, do this the twentieth day of May A. D. 1832, make publish and declare the following my last will and Testament-To-Wit:

I lend unto my beloved wife Sally Boon during her natural life the lands and plantations whereon I now live and all the lands lying on the north side of the slough adjoining the same called the piney woods, and also eight negroes:- To-Wit: named- Old Tom, Anthony, Cromwell, Letha, Suzzy, Sucky, and Clarrissy, together with their future increase, my riding carriage, and harness, four head of horses, to be chosen by my wife out of my stock, one third of all my other stock of every sort and description. All my household and kitchen furniture, one third of my plantation tools and implements of husbandry, all my blacksmith tools, and also one third of my corn fodder, oats, cotton and small grain which I may have on hand at my death.

Item #2---I give devise and bequeath to my son Daniel Boon and his heirs and assigns, forever, the residue of my lands in Johnston County adjoining the lands which I have lent to my wife, situated, lying and being on the North side of the Neuse River and said river and bounded thus:- Beginning at the causeway where the path leading from my home house to my old plantation crosses the slough, thence with my own and John Atkinson's line down the said slough to a maple and on the mill gut near Becks old ford thence down the meanders of the mill gut to Neuse River, thence up the meanders of the Neuse River to the mouth of the Bawdy Swamp, thence up the meanders of the Bawdy Swamp till it strikes the piney woods hill at the lower corner of my son Daniel Boon's own plantation thence down the slough nearly with the piney woods hill to the first station it being and including my former old plantation on the Neuse River and including the burial ground of my parents and it is my desire that my old plantation above named where I wish to be buried and which has been a burial ground for all my family should remain in my family and bear up my name. Also, I give, devise, and bequeath to my said son Daniel Boon and his heirs and assigns forever a negro man named Pompey and after the death of my wife Sally Boon, I do further devise and bequeath to my said son Daniel Boon and his heirs forever a negro man Anthony, (my blacksmith) and the lands and premises whereon I now live and the lands adjoining the same, the said lands and premises being the same which I have loaned to my wife herein for her life.

Item #3---I give and devise in trust for the separate use of my daughter Sally Cobbs during her life and after her death to be divided among such children as she may have surviving her, in trust as herein more fully declared, the following real and person property (To-Wit) Two tracts of land in Wayne County in the fork of the Neuse and Little Rivers known by the name of the Armstrong and Fellows Lands, also all the negro slaves which I have hereto loaned to my said daughter, Sally, which are now in her possession together with their future increase and the increase (if any) since she has had possession and also a mulatto girl Patience with her future increase. (cont'd next page.)

WILL OF JOSEPH BAXN III (cont'd).

The said lands and tenements, and negro slaves, I devise and bequeath to John Adkinson, Sr. to have and to hold to him and his heirs, in trust for the sole and separate use and enjoyment of my said daughter during her life, and the same may be directly possessed and enjoyed by my said daughter or rented out by the Trustee aforesaid and the proceeds paid to her for her separate use as she may choose, but in either event to be free and clear and quit of the debts or charges of her husband and upon the further trust that the said Trustee shall at the death of my said daughter, deliver over the same to such of my said daughters children as may then be living whether now or hereafter to be born, to be divided equally among them. If any child of my daughter Sally shall then be dead but have living children such grandchild or grandchildren of said Sally shall share in such division as its immediate parent would have done, if then alive and it or they make take accordingly, and I desire if the person above named shall decline to accept this trust, my executors herein after named shall nominate and appoint some competent and proper person who will act but such appointment must be made if it can be so agreeably to the wishes of my daughter, if such selection becomes necessary. I hereby declare my will that he shall be clothed with the same rights and interests as if originally appointed herein, for the comfort or advantage of my daughter and her children or for the contrroll of said slaves to sell all or any part of said property I desire it may be done under the direction of a court of equity, provided however that the proceeds of such sale be reinvested upon the same trust which I hereby declared. If in the providence of God it shall be that Sally Cobbs shall die having no child or the issue of such surviving her, in such event, I desire that she may dispose of said property as she may choose, by will or by writing in virtue of a will attested by disinterested witnesses subscribing the same and here I add in order that my motives may be known when I am gone, that the misfortunes of my son-in-law have embarrassed him, my daughters patrimony is not enough to releive him, therefore I resort to the mode of settling her property. I have a warm affection for Mr. Cobbs and the most unqualified confidence in him, let him, let none suppose I am actuated by unkindness, I am not.

Item #4---I give and bequeath unto my grandchildren, Joseph, Caroline, Elizabeth, Daniel, Julia and Thomas Ingram, the children of my deceased daughter Eliza. Ingram to be divided between them whenever the oldest becomes of age by law, all of the negro slaves which I have hereto loaned my daughter during her lifetime ( and now in the possession of Joseph Ingram) and their increase since she first had possession of them except of one girl by the name of Clarrissa, which girl I never intended for her, but was sent for a nurse until her children could do without her and was in the possession of my daughter at her death, and still remains with the children for the purpose of taking care of the small ones, and it is my will and desire that if either of my said grandchildren shall die unmarried and under the age of twentyone years that the surviving brothers and sisters of such deceased one should take, hold and have the share or portion to which the one so dieing was or should be entitled.

Item #5:---After the death of my beloved wife Sally Boon I then give and bequeath to my Granddaughter Caroline Ingram and her assigns forever one Negro girl Suckey heretofore lent to my wife for her life.

Item #6:---I give and bequeath one hundred dollars to be divided amongst the lawful heirs of my deceased son Joseph.

Item #7:---I give and bequeath to my granddaughter Polly Verrells one hundred dollars out of my estate having hereto given her what I intended.

Item #8:---I give and bequeath to my Grandson William J. D. Hopkins and his heirs forever the lots of ground in the town of Smithfield, there being two lots on which Wm. W. Hopkins formerly lived, the other one adjoining Mrs. Dee's (widow) and opposite David Thompsons, also six negroes and their increase since the seventeenth Of October 1829, To-Wit:- Abigail, Plenty, Allen, Henry, Charles and Harrison.

Item #9:---My will and desire is that my son Daniel Boon and my son-in-law Thomas Cobbs take into their hands and custody for the use, benefit and preferment of my Granddaughter Julia Boon five hundred dollars to be raised out of my estate, also the following negro slaves, (To-Wit):- Cage, Hannah, Nanny, Zilphy, Cirus, Lucinda, Dick and Quilly and with their increase since the 17th of October 1829 and the said Daniel Boon and Thos. Cobbs shall hire out said negroes annually and apply the proceeds as far as necessary for the education and better preferment of said Julia. But should said Julia die before she marries, I then bequeath said money and said slaves to be divided between my said son Daniel and my daughter Sally Cobbs or their heirs according to the terms and limitations and trust declared concerning said Sarah Cobbs other property bequeathed to her on the 3rd, 4th, and 5th pages of this will and Item #3---Whenever she marries the property is to be her absolute right and she is hereby earnestly requested if she should marry and die without children never to allow one cent of the property hereby given her to go to the children of Mr. Manney, her step-father, and I hereby require of my executors in no event to yield to any member of Daniel Southalls family the management of said bequest or any part of it.

Item #10---After the death of my wife Sally Boon it is then my will and desire that the property which I have loaned to her and which shall remain at her death (excepting the hands, Anthony and Suckey, which I have otherwise disposed of here) shall be divided between my son Daniel Boon and my daughter Sally Cobbs or their heirs and to be in Trust for my daughter Sally as the property is in trust for her in Item #3.

Item #11:---It is my will and desire that my executors shall sell as much of my perishables not herein otherwise disposed of with my houses and lots in Waynesborough as may be required to pay my just debts and the legacies of money left herein. I do lastly give and bequeath and desire all my estate and property of every

description which is not before disposed of unto my son Daniel Boon and my daughter Sally Cobb and their heirs forever. My daughter Sally's part I bequeath upon the same term and trust respectively named in the 3rd Item of this will and upon the the trust therein respectively declared for the separate use of my said daughter during her life and afterwards for her children respectively.

Item #12:---I and my son Daniel Boon for the purpose of enabling my son-in-law Thos. Cobbs to get through his difficulties became his security. Now my will is that if it should turn out that my son Daniel should have to pay money as security or there should come any claim against my estate as his security I do hereby direct that the said loss shall be reimbursed to my estate or to the said Daniel (as the case may be) out of the property bequeathed in this will to my daughter Sally Cobbs or to her use and such loss is hereby declared a charge on her portion to come out of the principal and shall be paid, and lastly I do hereby nominate and appoint my son Daniel Boon and my son-in-law Thomas Cobbs, Executors of this my last will and testament; and I do hereby revoke, annul and disannul all wills by me heretofore made, and I do publish and declare that which is written on this page and the nine pages preceeding it to be my last will and testament.

In Testimony of all which after the said sheets are attached together I have hereunto the last page subscribed my name and affixed my seal the day and year the first above written.

Memorandum of Joseph G. Boon ., Tipton County, Tenn.

Started for Texas, June 25th, 1850. Took shipment on board the Mohawk at Memphis, Tennessee. Had in American Gold---\$125.00, in Tennessee Bank Notes \$10.00, in silver \$6.75.

Sent home by Hanibal (Hannibal) in Tenn. B. notes--\$30.00, bought flour \$5.50.

July 2nd at (Pigeon)Hill on the Washita River to this point country level, timber generally pine, some good land on this side of the Saline. Washita is navigable for large class boats nearly all the year, from the last year was shipped 1700 bales of cotton. The cotton crops this far indifferent. From Washita called on Mrs. W. T. Cullen in Union County, Arkansas. Country poor but healthy, thence South through the town of Hillsboro, Arkansas to Union Parish, La. and continueing southwest crossing several small streams through Claiborne Parish to Minden where arrived in the afternoon of July 4th. Minden is the handsomest (handsomest) place I have yet seen, several good schools, the improvements of the place are good, society excellent, passed over some good country, water good, country healthy, and on the entire route thus far crops of corn good, cotton sorry and backwards.

Parting with Mr. Wimberly here at Minden and crossed lake (Bodeo) before night continuing our southwest, crossing several streams and one large lake . . reached Red River late in the afternoon eight miles above Shrevesport-staid all night at Shrevesport. Shrevesport is quite a place of business, population over 4000, situation very handsome.

July 6th, left Shrevesport and traveled southwest through Caddo Parish and entered Texas five miles from the village of Greenwood and staid at night a the Elysian Fields, a fine healthy looking farming country, water good, abundant farms, large cotton crops, sorry, corn crops sorry. Elysian fields are in Panola County, continuing SW into Harrison County and on through Rusk into Cherokee County, mostly well watered, most of the land fine, especially the red lands, fine springs and spring \_\_\_\_\_. Crossed the Saline (?) at Ramsdale, passing through the towns of Henderson and Salim-the only objection to the country is the inconvenience to market.

July 11th. Passed through the County of Cherokee and county seat called Rusk. Lands generally good, some poor, water bad, some heavy timber, in places scarce. Stayed at night a Mr. K \_\_\_\_\_ in Houston County. Passed through a corner of Anderson County. In Mr. K \_\_\_\_\_ neighborhood some fine red land, fine grass, some (prairies) and good timber. The water good and the land in the vicinity said to be good and about 20 to 25 \_\_\_\_\_ from the Trinity River. From this to Shrevesport the country is finely timbered, the pines are numerous and large. The Neches which crossed today is small, too much so for navigation and bordering the river it must be very sickly. The only bad water I have seen is in the vicinity of Neches.

July 12th, Passed through Houston County and the town of Crockett crossed several (prairies) varying from  $\frac{1}{2}$  to 2 miles wide. Staid at night at Mr. Albright's on the bank of the Trinity called Alabama, passed small bodies of very good red land, the larger portion of the country very poor, water very bad.

July 13th, crossed the Trinity a narrow but very deep stream, navigable for steam boats, carrying 800 bales of cotton about half of the year. Crossed two very large paririas (prairies) about two or three miles wide and apparently ten miles or more long, fine coated with the gamma grass, on one there were hundreds of cattle grazing. Took dinner with Mr. Chas. Hunter in Leon Co. about three miles from the county seat, the body of the land pretty fair.

July 14th- Left Hunter's, passed some good up-land, large parrias (prairies) from one to eight miles wide, some good land in the parrias, immense herds of cattle, a great many horses, water bad, timber scarce and staid at night two miles west of the Navasota a small muddy stream, land low, unfit for cultivation, except the second bottom, timber in the bottom very good.

15th--Continued Southwest crossing a number of large parriase, skirted with timber, some good land, a great many cattle, missed my road, passed over some very poor land. Crossed the Brazos at night at Mosely's ferry. The flies in the bottom very bad. Much pleased with the land in the Brazos bottom. It is certainly the richest land I have ever seen. The river large and better for navigation than I expected.

16th. Left the Brazos and Burleson County continuing SW passing over some good land and large prairies arrived at Mr. J. C. Mitchell's at night.

17th. Remained with Mr. Mitchell, this section of country pretty fair, water not very good, rather out of the way place about 30 miles from the Brazos and 45 miles from the Colorado.

18th. Left Mr. Mitchell's for Bastrop and arrived at B. about 11 o'clock at night, passed over some very poor country, water scarce.

19th. At Bastrop, the bottom land very rich. Colorado river a pretty stream, price of land from 3 to 6 per acre, left Bastrop in the evening, crossed the Colorado and went south six miles to Mr. Willie Hills, passed several good farms, better pleased with the valley of the Colorado than any other portion of the country I have seen, it is mostly prairie land and sells high but little for sale on the river, prices ranging from \$4.00 to 7.00 per acre.

20th. Left Mr. Hills and continued down the valley, rode a few miles and Mr. Fitzgerald was taken very sick, called to rest at a Mr. Stewarts eight miles from Hills. The valley land continued good, passed some fine timber valley. Timber, cedar and oak and some pine. Crops not very good, land selling from \$4.00 to \$7.00. Determined on going no farther west. In this neighborhood heard of a good deal of sickness.

21st. Still at Mr. Stewarts. Mr. F. better. Received a call from Thos. Hardeman Esq. Politely invited over to his house one mile from Mr. Stewarts and family very kind. Went late in the afternoon to Mr. Hardeman's, kindly received by him and his lady. Mr. H. has a very pretty situation on the bank of the Colorado, fine spring, well fixed, gin, sugar mill etc., and is living very comfortable.

22nds. Left Mr. H's. Mr. F. better, rode through extensive prairies, intend cross the Colorado at the town of La Grange in Lafayette County. Crops continue about as they have been for several \_\_\_\_\_. Ranging from \$4.00 to \$7.00.

The above was found in an old leather memorandum book which had belonged to Joseph Green Boon, now in the possession of Dorothy Boone Tryon. Great grand father could not spell prairie, it was written differently each time.

De Sota, March 30, 1849

My dear son:

Yours of the 17th and 20th reached us last evening, the previous one was on the way over a month and had not Mr. Young received one in the interim from you \_\_\_\_\_ anxiety as it was \_\_\_\_\_ was very solicitous \_\_\_\_\_ my last as you may well suppose \_\_\_\_\_ I, my dear boy, trust you manifest the Christian spirit under great provocations. I suppose, however the consciousness of short comings in many things enabled you to bear better the false accusations. I have suffered my child on your account. I could not believe you so regardless of character as to morality or Christianity and yet hard to believe you gave some cause for all this censure from H's letter. \_\_\_\_\_ you judge something of the spirit of mine. I was indeed \_\_\_\_\_ with her but not half as much so as I should have been had not your Pa prevented me to say the least. \_\_\_\_\_ her conduct to you manifests great ingratitude to me, \_\_\_\_\_ and surely as she lives she will yet feel it in some way or other. \_\_\_\_\_ baseness of ingratitude never goes unpunished in this life. From your letter Mr. Morrison's family seems to have circulated all the news about you. Cullen appears to place more confidence in their truth than yours, I am thankful that I have never had cause to doubt your word and trust I never shall and when H went up after Cullen your Pa directed him to bring his books and clothes home. Was not Mr. Hall rather too late to write by him to us, that he preferred his boarding elsewhere, we had resolved that he never should go back there and H. is more opposed than we, he feels deeply their conduct to you, he has decided on working this summer and as Mr. Rousseau will be here the latter part of the summer I hope we shall be able to keep him at school, his education has been sadly neglected and greatly do I lament it. Your Pa. and I are both pleased with your determination of trying to do something this vacation. 'Tis true that if your health could have sustained you in study and you could have studied to advantage we would have preferred it. I rather think, however, that relaxation from study for awhile will enable you to commence with more mental and corporeal vigour next spring and I trust I shall hear that you are doing far better than you may have yet. I hope \_\_\_\_\_ of your progress after the examination \_\_\_\_\_ you felt this deep interest in your own \_\_\_\_\_ that your parents do, I am sure you would be ahead always instead of lagging behind, or even keeping up with the others. Nothing can be done to perfection without much patient labour and a good degree of go-ahead-iliiviness and without the blessings of God and man these will fail. Are you in the habit of daily asking the blessings of God upon your studies and do you strive to act as to obey his commands. "Six days shall thou labor and the seventh rest". How anxious I am to have your education finished and to see you a useful occupant in the Lord's vineyard. O'shall your Mother be disappointed-my faith is strong Joseph. I yet believe you will be a useful man. \_\_\_\_\_ life be spared and \_\_\_\_\_ I live I shall be amply repaid for all the toil and anxiety I have endured for you. Say, my son, if not prevented by the Providence of God shall it not be so.

Have you read Mr. Baker's letter to the young men of Princeton and other seminaries in the Herald. If not try to procure a paper and read it. The date 22 March. This reminds me of the communication signed C from Hanover respecting the \_\_\_\_\_ at the church door on the Sabbath. I trust you are not of that number. Do you read this paper regularly, I am anxious you should. Well let this communication be the last respecting H's letter. I wish the subject dropped, let it be among the things only remembered by you to make you more circumspect, and by your parents that it has been a blessing to you \_\_\_\_\_ by your future consistent walk and conversation.

Since I last wrote I have seen none of the family but Dr. Jeter, he brought Sarah and Anna to see me for my \_\_\_\_\_. Poor man his has been a severe trial. I hope I may be the means of saving his \_\_\_\_\_. I believe that the relations are generally well and doing well. I saw a letter from Helen a short time since. She writes very well and I think she bids fair to beat her cousins Catherine and Lou. I never thought C smart.

(one complete paragraph here not decipherable)

My school is small have but eight scholars but expect more shortly, would have been larger but I had declined teaching I thought and the girls west elsewhere. I am doing my best to help your Pa and you along. I hope yet to see the time when he will be free from his great encumbrances. He has shortly to pay \$300.00 to Mr. Boarch at Hernando for Augustus but through the kindness of E. H. Foster at Nashville has compromised the large security debt for Augustus to about half, the whole was \$1000.00, it is eight now payable in one, two and three years, this gives me some hope of seeing an end, but I don't know when to embarrassments. There are still heavy debts and making but little, the prospect is sorry. Your Pa has given up his land and I am glad he is released from this heavy debt. I suppose it will be (sold) next fall. We are to stay on until it is sold. I do not know where our lot will be cast. You see, my son, the great need of economy on the part of us all. We do not wish you to be picayunish nor to deprive you of every enjoyment but wish you to deny yourself expense you can \_\_\_\_\_ do.

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HANNIBAL HONESTUS BOON Sr. was born at Mountain Academy, a Presbyterian settlement in Tipton County., Tenn. He began his education there under the Rev. Mr. Holmes, it was continued under Professor John A. Rousseau after the family moved to De Sota Co., Miss. in 1842. Professor Rousseau was the brother of the Federal General of that name. Hannibal H. Boon came to Texas with his father Joseph Green Boon and his brother Joseph in 1852 from Hernando De Sota Co., Miss. They settled in Austin County, Texas. Austin County is now Waller County.

After coming to Texas, Hannibal H. Boon studied at Austin College, Huntsville, Texas under the direction of Rev. Daniel Bacon, the distinguished Texas Pioneer Presbyterian Minister and teacher. While in Austin College, he took up the study of law, first under Judge W. A. Lee and afterward under Colonel Henderson Yoakum, the historian and Judge Royal T. Wheeler of the Supreme Court of Texas. After obtaining his license to practice law, he managed his father's plantation until 1859 when he began to practice law in Hempstead, Texas.

In February 1861, he enlisted as a private in Col. John S. "Old Rip" Ford's regiment, served six months on the Rio Grande, then six months under Capt. McDade, he was then detailed as a recruiting officer to assist Major Edwin Waller in raising a calvary battalion. Five companies from lower Brazos country were raised and on 4 July 1862 left for Louisiana with Waller as Lieutenant Colonel and Boon as Major. They were attached to Sibley's, afterwards Greene's brigade and Major Boone saw service until 29 September 1863 when he was wounded at Fordoche, La. losing his right arm and two fingers and the thumb from his left hand.

It was while he was still recovering from his injuries that he married Sue Hunt Gordon of Washington, St. Landrys Parish, La. He was assigned for duty at different points and remained in the service until the surrender.

After the war Major Boone (It was he who added the e to the Boon name) removed from Hempstead to Anderson in Grimes County where he resumed the practice of law until 1876 when he became Attorney General of the State of Texas and served one term. On the expiration of his term of office he moved to Navasota, Texas, Grimes County, where he practiced law until his death.

Waller's Regiment Texas Cavalry was first organized as the 13th, or Waller's, Battalion Texas Cavalry with five companies, A. to E. Company F was enlisted in Louisiana 27 August 1863. An unidentified company, Captain Menard's, Captain Goode's and Captain Dunn's companies Texas Cavalry were added from time to time to complete the regiment. Captain Smith's company, 25th Regiment Texas Cavalry, was transferred to this organization in exchange for Captain Goode's Company by S. O. No 87 Hdqrs. District of Texas., New Mexico, and Arizona, dated 28 March 1865.

STATEMENT OF CONFEDERATE SERVICE

H. H. Boone, private, enlisted on 1 June 1861, in the Hempstead Light Guards, Austin County, 23rd Brigade, Texas State Troops.

Captain W. O. G. Wilson was the Commanding Officer. There is one roll of this company on file at the Texas State Archives, Austin, Texas--- signed Dorman H. Winfrey--State Archivist. 16 September 1958

(According to the Handbook of Texas (W. P. Webb and H. Bailey Carroll (eds) Vol. 1, page 188 "At the outbreak of the Civil War, Boone joined John S. Ford's regiment and served throughout the war.")

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H. H. Boone, Sr. was chiefly instrumental in organizing the first camp of Confederate veterans at Navasota, Texas, the camp being named for him but afterwards changed at his suggestion to "Camp W. G. Post" in honor of the memory of one of its deceased members. At the general reunion of the Confederate Veterans of the United States, at Houston in May 1895, he was elected Commander of the Division of Texas.

I, Brigadier General Thomas Green at the same time ordered Major H. H. Boone with two sections of battery and the 7th Regiment to move rapidly down the road to the bridge (Fordoche) all of which was done. Majors Boone and Rountree made a dashing charge upon the enemy's cavalry, drawn up in line of battle near Mr. Norwood's house and scattered them with such effect that they were not seen afterward, having retreated. During these transactions, the firing from the rear had continued with slight interruption and Major Boone was ordered to take his own command and Rountree's battalion and charge the enemy at Mrs. Stirling's which he did most gallantly, charging the enemy's battery and receiving two severe wounds. This charge closed the fight, the enemy surrendering in detachments as they retreated and were overtaken by our troops.

Many of our men had never been under heavy fire before but moved like veterans up to the enemy under fire and succeeded in driving them from the house to house up to the levee when Major H. H. Doone's charge was made. The charges made by Major Doone and L. C. Rountree stand forth to be recorded in the annals of history.

CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION

The Constitutional Convention met in the fall of 1875. The State Democratic convention was held in Galveston, January, 1876. Governor Coke and Lt. Governor Hubbard were renominated. George P. Finley of Galveston, said, in substance, the time had come to reward brave Confederate Soldiers. Candidates were Hon. W. M. "Duck" Walton, Mr. W. B. Brack, and Mr. Jones.

Hon. J. C. Hutcheson a delegate from Harris Co., nominated Major Hannibal H. Boone from Grimes Co.

Major Boone had won his title by gallant service in the Confederate Army.---Ref:- GOVERNORS WHO HAD BEEN AND OTHER PUBLIC MEN OF TEXAS, by Norman G. Kittrell, Dealy-Adey-Elgin Co. Publishers-1921.

Major Boone entered office as Attorney-General of the State of Texas 16 April 1876 and held, as did all officers elected that year, until the end of 1878, when he moved his family and went back to his home in Navasota, and practiced his profession there until his death, nearly twenty years later.

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In the TEXAS room of the Confederate Museum (formerly the White House of the Confederacy) there may be found a picture of Major Boone.

EULOGY OF A NAVASOTIAN  
(Newspaper Clipping)

Recently Major F. Charles Hume, of Houston, delivered an address to the Alumni, faculty and students of Austin College, at Sherman. Of his old schoolmates he recalled a few and spoke of them; among them was the late Major Hannibal H. Boone and of this worthy citizen of Navasota he said: "It was Boone's enviable fortune to achieve both the fame of the lawyer and the glory of the soldier. In either character he was superb. He, too, had improved the advantage of Judge Wheeler's thorough and scholarly instruction, and studied the books of the law with fidelity and understanding. Located at Navasota, his private practice was varied and extensive and for a term he served the state as attorney-general. He engaged his adversary with the strength of a gladiator and the courtesy of Sir Launcelot. When war was waged upon the Southern States there was for Boone but one post of duty, and that was where the battle joined. A major in the Confederate army, he led a well nigh hopeless charge on a desperate field and fell from wounds so fearful that even to think of them is torture. The care and ministrations of a gentle woman, who afterwards became his wife, won him from the grasp of death, and within the mutilated body still dwelt the unconquerable soul. When the war ended he resumed, with characteristic courage, the labors of his profession. His right arm had been torn away and upon his left hand remained only the fourth and fifth fingers; yet, with spirit undismayed, he rapidly recovered his practice--pursuing and enlarging it till God called him, full of fruited years and honors that can not die. I bow in tears and reverence when this hero's name is spoken. He is of the immortals."

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LETTERS WRITTEN BY H. H. BOONE SR. TO HIS DAUGHTER EVELYN BOONE.

The 1st page of this letter was lost, and date not known but before April 20, 1893.

"I had a letter of inquiry from a new cousin of whose existence I was ignorant, in Memphis, Tenn. I replied to her letter and have her second letter, which I enclose, as she writes well and it will perhaps interest you. She is a granddaughter of Uncle Frank Latham, mother's only brother, who was founder and Editor of the old Memphis Eagle and for years Editor of the Consolidated Memphis Eagle and Enquirer and was a brilliant writer and editor. Her mother was Imogene Latham whom I remember as a little light haired blue eyed girl of whom Louise reminds me.

I have answered this letter giving her all the information she asked about our small family. Take care of her letter and return it to me. I sent her one of my photos taken here in order to get a wood cut to stamp the \_\_\_\_\_ to be worn at our approaching reunion at Houston. You have, of course heard of the honor conferred on me by naming the camp for me. I appreciate it but did not desire it. Tried to prevent it in every way I decently could. Well, I hope it won't hurt the camp, if it doesn't I reckon I can stand it.

I supposed you have also noticed I am to be one of the speakers for the occasion. I dread it. Haven't time to prepare a speech and am afraid I cannot come up to expectations--that I can't grace the occasion, won't make a failure. The older I get the more I shrink from such things.

It is late and I am tired. Goodbye and may God bless you and save you.

My old soldier, Mr. Henry Wood(ward) and his wife stopped over with me and will remain until Saturday. We enjoy their visits very much. He was one of the Mier prisoners and in the Army of the Republic, of Texas, as well as with me in our late war, is 78 years old and full of reminiscences and stories.

I was so hurried getting ready for my trip that I forgot to send your money and had just gotten the check for \$20.00 (instead of \$15.00) when I received yours of yesterday.

His entire life was spent in this section save for a short residence in Austin where he lived with his father when the Senior Boone held the office of Attorney General for the State of Texas. On November 30th, 1890 he and Miss Emma Brown were united in marriage and he is now survived by his life companion. The wedding was in the Wallace Prairie where the bride then lived. Since that time this couple spent their days in Grimes County and about twenty two years they have been residents of Navasota. To this union several children were born, four of whom are now living; One son, Daniel Baylor Boone of Amarillo; three daughters, Miss Dorothy Boone of Amarillo, Miss Mary Boone who has been in Amarillo for the past eighteen months but who has come back to be with her mother, and Miss Sarah Boone of Navasota. Only two of the daughters and the mother were at home when the husband and father departed. Miss Mary Boone having reached here last Saturday. Daniel Boone and his sister, Miss Dorothy, arrived Wednesday afternoon.

## GORDON-HUNTLY

I was told when I was a child that we were descended from a DUCHESS, "THE DUCHESS OF GORDON". I have not been able to prove this---

However when Aunt Evy died I was given some old papers, among which is what seems to be a picture or a frontispiece of a book, showing the Arms of Her Grace--HENRIETTA- Duchess of Gordon.

I figured out the Dexter (Left) Half which was as follows:

- Quarterly--1st az. three boars heads couped or. for Gordon;
- 2nd or. three lions heads erased gu. for Badenoch;
- 3rd or. three crescents with a double tressure gu. for Seton.
- 4th az. three cinquefoils ar. for Frazer.

I wrote to a gentleman in Scotland and sent him a copy of this coat of arms and a letter asking for help on it. He was kind enough to take it to Mr. D. M. Hunter, Curator of Falkirk Museum and he sent me the following:---

### HENRIETTA, DUCHESS OF GORDON

"The title of Duke was conferred in 1684 on George 4th Marquis of HUNTLY. It is now extinct.

The second Duke, Alexander (date of birth unknown) was 'out' in the '15. He married in 1706, Lady Henrietta Mordaunt daughter of Charles, Earl of Peterborough. He died in 1728 and she lived until 1760; their children were brought up as Protestants, despite the traditional allegiance of the family; the sons differed in their political allegiance and a younger son, Lord Lewis Gordon, was one of the Jacobite commanders of the '45--the 'Lewie Gordon' of the song.

The Earl of Peterborough, 1658-1735, was descended from Sir John Mordaunt of Turvey, whose family claimed to have received their original grant of lands in Bedfordshire from the Conqueror. As a young man he distinguished himself as a naval officer. In politics he was a strong opponent of James VII and a supporter of William of Orange; in later life his diplomatic and military career (he commanded an expeditionary force in Spain 1705-7) was stormy and controversial. I have been unable to find what armorial bearings he used--this branch of the family is now extinct - but the present senior branch carries Argent, a chevron between three estoiles sable. This would appear to differ little if at all, from those in your illustration." ---Sources:- 'The Scottish Nation'; Burkes Peerage; Encycl. Britt (13th Ed.; Dict. Nat. Biogr.

On the death of the fifth duke in 1836, the dukedom became extinct and the marquessate of Huntley passed to his kinsman, the Earl of Aboyne. The armor was quartered exactly as given in the Dexter Half above.

Peter Gordon of Trenton, Merchant was appointed by Governor Richard Howell to be guardian of one William Voorheis, and infant of fourteen years and upwards, son of Daniel Voorheis, late of Middlesex, dec'd. Elijah H. Gordon, also a merchant of Trenton, went on his bond, which was filed at Burlington, 9 Feb. 1795 and is recorded in Liber 36 of Wills. Secretary of State's Office, page 170.

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From Mrs. Bradford's "History of Geneva," printed in the village directory for 1862, page 20-21.

"Elijah H. Gordon removed from Trenton, N. J. in the year 1797, and was for many years engaged in Mercantile business in Geneva, filling at the same time offices of trust and honor. At an early period he was one of the judges of the County Court of Ontario and the second Post Master appointed for this village. Judge Gordon died in the year 1854 universally respected and esteemed, and with a calm and assured hope. The different members of his once large and happy family have one by one, nearly all followed him, till now but one daughter, and the widow of a son remain in the old homestead". (This would be Susan Hunt Gordon and perhaps Sarah Woods Gordon both of whom are buried in the Pulteney-in-Glenwood Cemetery, no date for Sarah Woods Gordon (perhaps the wife of Charles Gordon.)

Turner's History of the Phelps and Gorham Purchase which was published in 1851 has this paragraph:

"Elijah H. Gordon is one of the three or four survivors of all who were residents of Geneva previous to 1798. His goods came in early years from Schenectady, via the usual water route, costing for transportation generally about \$3.00 per cwt. Barter trade, in furs especially, constituted his principal early business; potash and ginseng was added after a few years. Mr. Gordon was a Judge of Ontario County Courts in early years; and the second postmaster in Geneva. His two sons, John H. and William reside in Washington, La."

with his company, by General Heard, on a tour of duty to Long Island and was in service about one month, in 1776 in the Spring he was with his company on a tour of duty to Staten Island about three weeks, and in June was appointed one of the Captains of the Five months service, in General Heard's Brigade, went to New York and a few days after his arrival there with the Brigade was appointed Brigade Major to said Brigade, was stationed at Brooklyn, under command of Gen'l. Sullivan until he was taken prisoner and afterwards under General Green, continued in said service for the Five Months --when the American Army retreated across New Jersey to Pennsylvania he stopped at home a few days to arrange his domestic affairs, joined the army again near Trenton and went to Pennsylvania, then raised a company of Volunteers, returned to New Jersey and continued near Princeton to protect our friends and their property as much as possible from foraging parties and continued in that service about two months. That in 1777 Gen'l Heard's Brigade was in Service, and when Gen'l. Lincoln was stationed at Bound Brook, Heard's Brigade of Militia was stationed across the Raritan River about three miles where they continued during the campaign, that he was in service during the campaign as Brigade Major and was in actual service between five and six months, during said campaign was at the request of Gen'l. Lincoln permitted to reside in his family a short time and was employed during that time in reconnoitering and showing the country to Gen'l. Lincoln. That in 1778 he was again in service as Brigade Major with Gen'l. Heard's Brigade, was for a time stationed at Somerset Court House, ordered from thence to Pompton and Paramus in Bergen County, New Jersey where the Brigade continued during the campaign, does not recollect at what time they were discharged but it must have been in the winter?, as he was late in the fall or the beginning of winter sent from Pompton by Gen'l. Heard to General Washington's headquarters near Morristown with dispatches, was in the service this year not less than five months and probably six months but cannot say positively. That in the year following 1779 the Brigade was again in the field and he was with Gen'l Heard as Brigade Major but cannot give a clear account of the duties performed or any particulars as to their operation but recollects that when the enemy moved from New Brunswick, the Continental Army moved to what is called the Short Hills. Gen'l. Heard's Brigade was stationed there and was discharged the day previous to the action of Short Hills, and was probably Four months in service. That on various occasions when not on duty as an officer he volunteered with the army as a private on short tours of duty. Afterwards was stationed at Trenton about two years as a deputy Quarter Master to the Army, and on the whole he gave up business altogether and was continually on duty one way or another during the war or at least until the Army returned from the capture of Cornwallis; that he has no documentary evidence of his service, his orderly Book, Commission and other papers have been destroyed or lost as he supposes at the time of his removal, in consequence of which he is not now enabled to give a perfectly clear and detailed account as he otherwise could; and that from age and the great variety of Public employments he has been engaged in his memory is somewhat impaired and confused. That he knows of no person whose testimony he can procure except that of Peter Kinnan which is hereto annexed. (Was not with papers I received)

JESSIE GORDON BRICKER

Our Aunt Sallie Gordon Miller lived at the corner of Jackson Avenue and Chestnut, a hugh place. I never did see all of the rooms I am sure. Though I use to roam the entire house, there were many rooms which had the doors locked. But downstairs there was a large vestibule entry, almost a room itself, opening into a very wide hall, with a lovely staircase leading to the second floor. The staircase lead- from the second to the third floor was not so handsome. On the newel post, was an electrified Bronze Statue of a fairly large size, holding an umbrella and therein was the lamp. Aunt Sallie was one of the first to have her home wired for electricity. On one side of this hallway, on the right as you went in, was a large music room, and drawing room with the sliding doors, that could convert it into a rather large room for giving receptions or a ball. Opposite these rooms, was a parlor, for the daily use or when ladies had their special afternoon "at home". Back of that was a large dining room, again there were folding doors, separating the two rooms, and there were fireplaces in all of these rooms, with handsome marble mantels and side pieces and hearths, usually a fine picture hung over the mantel, or an elaborate mirror. Back of the dining room was a smaller room, known as the breakfast room, though rarely used, adjoining it was the butler's pantry, with floor to ceiling closets with glass doors, wherein was kept all of the various dinner sets, in different place sizes, and breakfast and luncheon sets. All of the cutglass, punch bowls and cups, all of the crystal stem wear and tumblers. Drawers lined with velvet for the table silver, ever so many different sets, and amounts, depending no doubt, as did the dinner sets, as to how many place settings one was going to use. In this room were two side by side copper sinks, where only the fine china, glass ware and silver was washed, and there was one old colored man and a younger one he was training, who spent the greater part of their time polishing the silver trays, goblets, vases, bowls and sundry other items. The older man whose name I have forgotten, but think it may have been Job, acted as butler, when the downstairs maid was busy elsewhere, or perhaps on her day off.

Adjoining this was a fairly large conservatory, with tropical plants and beautiful macaws, noisy they were too. But their coloring was brilliant and while they were anchored to their perches, set into large pans on the floor, the light chain they wore on an anklet attached to one leg gave them sufficient to go down to the floor and back up to their perch, and there was one kept in a cage, why I never knew. But I kept my distance for their bills or nebs seemed so large sharp and capable of inflicting a bad cut. Everyone else petted them and scratched their heads but I would not. That is the only time I ever remember being afraid of a bird or animal of any sort.

There was a hall off this room thst led to the side yard, which was always lovely green velvety looking, mowed to perfection like a golf green, there were walks bordering flower beds, in front a wrought iron picket fence.

The butler's pantry led directly into the kitchen, a long room and rather wide. Along one side of the wall on the right hand side, as one entered the room, hung copper boilers, kettles, sauce pans, skillets of all sizes imaginable, plus pudding and salad molds. I loved this part of the house. There were at least three women at work in this kitchen, one who did only cooking and directing, one did vegetables, fruits, etc., and one only the cleaning chores.

The house was "L" shaped, only in reverse of this "L" shape, and the long part of the house was built directly to the brick sidewalk and the front was not set too far back from the banquets as we used to call them. The second floor consisted of two large bedrooms, with bath between, that were above the music room downstairs, a wide hall and a suite of rooms, sitting room, two bed rooms separated by a bath. The hall narrowed toward the back of the house with the staircase going to the third floor, and another room and bath. At the end of the hall there was a door, which led to the stairs going down into a hall, across from the conservatory, which the servants used.

The hall upstairs continued, and here were the rooms and bath for the servants who lived in, the upstairs maid, the elderly negro and his wife, who did mending and sewing for the family, the cook and her husband, who took care of the carriage horses and kept the equipage in beautiful condition. The stable boys, gardeners and other kitchen help lived at home. I believe the man who tended the hothouse had a little room in back for himself, but ate with the other help.

I forgot to mention that the conservatory roof was domed with beautiful stained glass, and when the sun was at a certain angle, the entire room took on the appearance of a rainbow (almost). There was a small tinkling fountain, with gold fish in the conservatory also, and a large one in the side yard.

I did not mention that the reception rooms and music rooms were covered with satin damask in the same shade of red with white or silver fleur-de-lys. The rooms on the opposite side of the hall were done in blue, more light than dark and again the fleur-de-lys. It was a showplace inside, outside it was rather drab and plain, usually painted a sort of tan, not a lot of gingerbread work however, though I think the roof bore a cupola, which I think was blown off during a hurricane.

Mary and I were in New Orleans in 1970 and were pleased to find the old home in good repair. It was painted an attractive yellow and is now an apartment house. It no longer has a vestibule and I am sure that the stairway that is there is not the one that Jessie thought so beautiful. Mary and I admired the parquet floors in the hallway.

This John Moore was the father of Lydia Elizabeth Moore Gordon and the grandfather of Sue Hunt Gordon Boone. Not too much is known about him except that he was born in Ireland about 1776, came to Louisiana and then on to Texas. Mary and I went into the Daughters of the Republic of Texas on him. My number is 8140 and Mary's is 8141.

Austin Colony Pioneers by Worth S. Ray gives the following: "This John Moore, who located in that part of Washington County that is now Grimes and obtained land between the town of Washington on the Brazos and the present site of NAVASOTA, was fifty-four years old and a widower with one son and two daughters, when he came to Austins Colony in 1830. He became associated with his son-in-law Captain King in the operation of two steam boats on the Brazos. The two daughters of this John Moore - one became the wife of Captain King, and the other married Charles Peter Gordon" (should be John Hunt Gordon). (I do not rely too much on Mr. Ray as I have found him inaccurate several times. DBT.) \*

In as much as John Moore has been received as a colonist in the colonization enterprise contracted with the Government of the State of Coahuila and Texas by the Promoter Stephen F. Austin, the fourth of June 1825, as is recorded on page 1007 of this registry, and the said John Moore having established that he is a widower, and there being met in his person the requirements called for by the State colonization law of March 24, 1825; in conformity with said law, and with instructions of September 4, 1827, and the additional article of April 25, 1830, which govern me, and in the name of the State, I do grant, confer, and place in the real and personal possession of the aforementioned John Moore a site of land whose terrain has been measured by the land surveyor Horacio Chreisman, previously named for the purpose, with the following location and limits:

The Negroes in the Mary G. Boon Lot was delivered to Mary G. Green Boon By her Father Joseph Green dec'd in his lifetime, it was therefore thought proper to allow her to keep them at their value without drawing. They were therefore valued by us the Committee as above stated and allotted to her.

One of the Negroes in Lot No. 3 was not present(Hall valued at £ 125) But was said to be sick, it was therefore thought just and reasonable that if said negro should be dead before the close of this division that each Heir should lose his rateable part of the value. The above decision was made on the 14th day of February 1807. The parties concerned were all present and the drawing closed about Sunset on the same day by a child not ten years old.---Wm. Here the early settlers landed but the ground was low and marshy and many of them did not survive the first year. Peter Knight received a grant for Basse's Choice in 1640. (Peter Knight married Nathaniel's daughter Genevieve).

Nathaniel Basse represented his plantation called "Basse's Choice" in the House of Burgesses in 1629. The last account of him in the Virginia records is that he went to New England in 1631 (I believe that he probably returned to England at that time, or possibly before since his wife died in England in 1630.)

## WHITING LETTERS

I have not been able to trace our WHITING Family. I know that Sarah Whiting who married Elijah Hunt Gordon, was the daughter of William and Sarah Whiting. This information is given in the D. A. R. Cemetery Records, Vol. 48 page 118--"Bulteney in Glenwood Cemetery"-Geneva, Ontario County, N. Y.

I have in my possession three very old letters written by William Whiting whom I presume to be Sarah's father. I am copying them to the best of my ability, for they are brittle and many words are gone, perhaps they will be of interest to you.

Salisbury, 4 June 1782

Honoured Sir: (To Stephen Whiting, Boston, Mass.)

Your letter of March 12 is now with me. I have had the satisfaction of hearing from you by persons who have come from Boston and Joseph in particular when he was here last. (It gives) me joy to hear that you still live and are \_\_\_\_\_ of the comforts of life which, to you, I think yield greater pleasure than leading your \_\_\_\_\_ continual contemplation of that all \_\_\_\_\_ from which they are all derived and I have to think that your trust in him will \_\_\_\_\_ under all the exercises of Bodily infirmity in His wisdom He has suffered you to be.

Temptation to neglect the proper thoughts \_\_\_\_\_ and better state that I have at times \_\_\_\_\_ impatient to be set free from this \_\_\_\_\_ but I know it is my duty to submit to his will, praying I may be preserved from temptation and \_\_\_\_\_ through every scene that is well pleasing.

I have taken a late hour at night to write this letter and must refer you to Brother \_\_\_\_\_ for many particulars which I have not \_\_\_\_\_ to write. I expect he will see Boston soon. I hope he will find you and the rest of the family enjoying the blessings of Health and \_\_\_\_\_. My Family are by Gods goodness in Health.

I am here now, to see Mr. Richard Smith who is in a fair way of getting his estate restored by the assembly now setting in this town. Joseph was married last Tuesday evening to Col. Sheldon's daughter Polly at the Col's. house. I wish them the blessings of heaven and of their parents.

I have now (God be thanked) got through with my contract for shot and shells, all but three tons of shot, which I have liberty to get at any other furnace.

The furnace is blown out and if it is God's will that I should be relieved from any further connections with furnaces, I think it will be in mercy to me.

I left my family well, all but little Nancy who (had a) swelling under her cheek and ear. \_\_\_\_\_ like the things evil. I expect to return(home) this day. I wish you with the New Year the enjoyment of health, peace and competence. My kind regard to Samuel, Hannah and all friends. (McCandy)sic I suppose has called upon since he left Salisbury, pray give my respects to him.

Dear Sir (Mr. Hart)

As I have not involved myself in Debt by any business that I have done in England, so it is my wish not to be brought into debt by a connection in any other part of Europe, but I am sanguine in my hopes of the success of the trade that I have mentioned to you, that I would sell a number of my land Warrants that I have left, at a lower rate than what I think they would fetch me, when I return to America. My motive for this would be, to lay out the money in articles of Tea where it could be had cheapest. Or if any person, you may be acquainted with, who might be depended on, would enter into a connection with us in the trade, and take the warrants for security, and supply the Tea upon good terms, in this case I should rather not sell the lands, for I have the greatest \_\_\_\_\_ of having them laid out in a certain place, within the boundary of Virginia, where they would sell for a guinea an Acre, after the survey is made.

I can afford to sell the warrants for much less- I tried some of them at Public Sale in London but as no one bid 11 pr tere I would not suffer them to go so low. I have no doubt of making some hundred percent more by carrying them back to America as I know them to be genuine and well endorsed; if anything can be done with them to establish a good connection in the Tea Trade I should be willing to part with some of them or leave them in France or Holland as a security. I shall deliver you two Fragments of the printed Advertisement which happened to be left after I had the warrants put up for sale here, they may adjust your memory in describing the particulars. If anything worth communicating on the Business turns you will please to favor me with a line, and if not, I shall be happy to hear from, direct to be left at the Post Office for Dear Sir-Your Friend and Humble Servant.
