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### INTRODUCTION

his work on the Person(s) family is a genealogy solely of the descendants of John Person(s) (circa 1630-1707), who came from England to the Virginia colony as early as 1638.

An adequate study of this family in England will require an entire volume, but it may be mentioned that its members flourished in Somerset,<sup>2</sup> and later removed to the adjoining county of Gloucester. When it was found that they were associated with many of the same families in England as those with whom they were associated in Virginia—the Bennetts, the Blunts, the Partridges and others—the picture became more vivid. One can imagine an immigrant who had been living in Virginia for a number of years welcoming a new arrival whom he had known in the mother country or greeting another by telling him that he had known his father well.

During the Colonial period, the status or profession of individuals was designated following their names in legal documents. The only ones ever found for John Person(s) and his descendants were gentleman and planter. The word gentleman in documents of that period was not a term of politeness, but indicated that the individual halves of the status of the period was not a term of politeness.

Elizabeth shortly after the defeat of the Spanish Armada, and is that of the Gloucestershire family. It is recorded at the College of Arms, and is described as follows:

Arms: Argent two chevrons sable on a canton of the second an eagle displayed of the first.

Crest: Out of a ducal coronet or: an ostrich's head and neck sable between

two feathers argent.

During the Colonial and Revolutionary periods, the name Person(s) was pronounced as though it were spelled Parson(s), just as Derby was pronounced Darby and Berkeley Barkeley. As a result (especially since orthographic rules were not so rigidly fixed and people at that time spelled phonetically more often than they do today), the name was frequently spelled Parson(s) and occasionally Passons. The name was also written indifferently either with or without the final s even in documents pertaining to the same individual. Numerous examples from the early records could be given, but the practice occasionally continued even into the nineteenth century. For example, the will of John A. Person of Southampton County, Virginia, dated December 22, 1863, refers to some of the children with the spelling Person and to others with the spelling Persons.3 One of the most extreme examples in this respect is the will of Ann Person, dated March 11, 1819, and proved April 23, 1821, in Surry County, Virginia. Her signature is written Ann Person, while in the body of the will her name is written Anna Parsons. Other names appearing in the will are James H. Parsons and Burwell Parsons, but in later records of the estate the latter name is written Burwell Person. Names of the witnesses are written Jacob Person and Mary Person. Other examples of these differences will be noted throughout the book. Similarly, in the early records of the Cook(e) family, one finds more than one spelling. Thus the book may have apparent inconsistencies even from one line to the next, since the spelling in the original document has been preserved in each case.

The principal purpose of the book is to trace down to the year 1800 as many as possible of the descendants of the immigrant, John Person(s) (circa 1630-1707). Thus is it probable that any descendant who can trace his own line back to an ancestor who appears of record prior to 1800 will readily be able to trace the line to

1630.

A secondary purpose is to trace down to the present the descendants of John (circa 1730-1786) and Prudence (Jones) Persons. Hundreds of descendants of the period of 1800 to 1950 are included in the book, but the realization that the quest for records of the widely-scattered descendants of this period could continue beyond the normal life-span caused the compiler to be willing to publish the book without attempting to include all of them. In this way, descendants will be able to make use of the records without a further delay of many years, and a second volume can list those descendants whose lines were not connected in the present one.

The compiler has been careful to base his findings on primary sources, and except for an occasional reference to a work of unquestionable authenticity and to some sources mentioned only for whatever interest they may have, he has been wary of including any material found in published works. Long and repeated periods were spent in Washington, D. C., Virginia, North Carolina and Georgia, in order that original records might be accessible. All of the early land patents, wills, administrations, deeds, marriage records, and miscellaneous documents of the Person(s) family were abstracted, but most of them were copied in their entirety, in order that the compiler might be able to study them carefully at his leisure. Old Bible records and family records were copied, and photostats of them were made, when they could be secured. Old

cemeteries were visited and tombstone records were transcribed. Census records were a valuable source of information, and old church records yielded some data. Hundreds of letters of inquiry were addressed to persons who might conceivably be able to furnish information. Facts contributed by these correspondents concerning their own parents and grandparents, their own uncles and aunts, their own brothers and sisters, their own children and grandchildren, were accepted without further verification.

Abstracts of all the wills are contained in the book, but the abstracts of the deeds amount to many hundreds and would, therefore, be too numerous to include. However, these are included when they prove some significant fact. In many cases, an effort has been made to trace the ownership of a tract of land over a period of generations and to identify the neighbors of the owners, when this information would appear to be of value.

Dates obtained from census records are deduced according to logic and listed as such for the sake of simplicity. However, the reader will have to understand that there may be a difference of one year in the actual year and the apparent year of a person's birth. For example, if a child was born on June 15, 1848, and the censustaker recorded the child's age on March 15, 1850, he would probably list the child as one year old, since the latter would not have reached his second birthday. A person examining the records later would, therefore, conclude that the child was born in 1849.

A system of numbering and indentation has been used which seemed to clarify relationships. An individual's children are listed with Arabic numerals, his grandchildren with Arabic numerals in parentheses, his great-grandchildren with Roman numerals in parentheses. When the individual's parentage is stated after his name, the numbering begins anew. Thus persons of the same generation may have different types of numbers. This system is used because numbers seem better suited to genealogies than letters, and because it reduces to a minimum the use of Roman numerals, which are more cumbersome than the Arabic. Roman numerals are aligned from the left rather than the usual right, so that the numeral will always be directly aligned with the name of the child's parent.

Although the children of an individual are listed with consecutive numbers, it does not always necessarily follow that they are listed in order of birth. Every effort has been made, however, to determine the probable relative ages of the children, so that this could be achieved as nearly as possible. When the exact date of birth, death or marriage has been unavailable, an estimate has frequently been made from extant records, in order that the reader may be able to fix the period during which the individual lived.

Throughout the greater part of the book, biographical data are given in the following order: (1) date and place of birth and death, (2) remaining biographical facts, except marriage, in chronological order, (3) marriage, (4) biographical facts about wife or husband. A telegraphic style has been used for most of the material, and both prepositions and punctuation marks have been omitted before dates, except when such an omission would result in too awkward a sentence. However, when such a style would lessen interest in an episode, a deviation from it has been made.

Italics have been used for long quotations and published works, but not for unpublished sources, such as deed books and other records.

Genealogical charts of the early generations are given at the end of the book, but the huge number of later descendants would make it impractical to give charts for more recent periods.

With the exception of only two or three items, all the documents dating from 1630 to 1800 and all the genealogical compilations of the same period represent the compiler's own research, but for the later periods many descendants furnished in-

formation about their immediate families. For the period of 1800 to 1950 the documentation is almost exclusively the compiler's own, except in Chapters VIII and XIV, where, in each case, only approximately the first page contains his own documentation. The compiler appreciates all the material that was furnished, but feels particularly indebted to several of the descendants, whose contributions appear in portions of certain chapers and are summarized below:

#### Chapter VII

Miss Christine Davidson Brown of Sharon, Georgia, furnished the priceless manuscript of Captain Edward Norphlet Brown (born 1830) quoted in Chapter VII. (See also acknowledgments for Chapter XI.)

#### Chapter VIII

Mr. Laurence B. Gardiner of Memphis, Tennessee, contributed all of the information on the two brothers, John Barnes Person (1789-1854) and Turner Person (1790-1851), and their descendants. This includes all the material in the entire chapter except that pertaining to the father of the two brothers and the connection with the earlier generations. (Mr. Gardiner also supplied several items on descendants of William Person, 1765-1857, who settled in Shelby County, Tennessee.)

#### Chapter IX

Mrs. Arthur St. Charles Dunstan (née Loula Pauline Persons) of Auburn, Alabama, contributed about ten pages of descendants of Jones Persons as compiled by her aunt, Miss Anna Rebecca Persons. (See also acknowledgments for Chapter XII.)

Mrs. George Willis Cole (née Eva Persons) of Atlanta, Georgia, gave valuable information concerning several branches of the family.

Mrs. William Herbert Knowles (née Alma Grace Fuller) of Richmond, Virginia, sent miscellaneous data.

#### Chapter XI

Miss Christine Davidson Brown compiled the complete genealogy and biographical data of the descendants of Dr. Washington Hardaway Brown and his wife, Cynthia Walker (1799-1834); located the graves of the Revolutionary soldier, Joel Walker, and his wife, Holly Berry Persons; and was most co-operative in her correspondence, through which she furnished miscellaneous facts concerning other branches of the Persons family.

#### Chapter XII

During 1890 and many years following, Miss Anna Rebecca Persons (1845-1919) traced a huge number of the descendants of her grandfather, Turner Persons (1766-1827), and collected many family records of Turner's brothers and sisters, particularly those of his brother, Jones. Collaborating with her was her sister, Eliza Pauline Persons (1842-1897). Miss Persons' notebooks descended to her niece, Mrs. Arthur St. Charles Dunstan, who continued to supplement them with reference to later generations and who has been most generous in sharing her information with all those who have requested it. Besides the material on Jones Persons mentioned above, the notebooks contain about twelve pages on descendants of Turner Persons, a few details about the immediate families of Holly Berry (Persons) Walker and Obedience (Persons) Bass, and a brief mention of Josiah Persons.

Mrs. Robert Ogden Persons of Forsyth, Georgia, contributed much information concerning George Washington Persons (1804-1879) and his descendants, furnished many valuable miscellaneous items on other branches of the Persons family, and has stimulated interest among descendants. The portrait of George Washington Persons, now owned by his great-grandson, Mr. Robert Ogden Persons, is reproduced in this book through the latter's courtesy.

#### Chapter XIV

Mrs. Warren G. Knox (née Barbara Jeanne Roach) of Fort Worth, Texas, did the entire research and contributed all the data for the chapter on Amos Persons (circa 1771-1815) and his descendants, with the exception of the records of Amos Persons himself in North Carolina and Georgia and his connection with the earlier generations.

Toward all those who had a part in the preparation of the book the compiler has a warm feeling of gratitude for their generous co-operation, and is glad to have an opportunity of expressing it here.

The compiler has found the pursuit of information about the Persons family to be stimulating and at times exciting, and he has found it interesting to follow their personal history along with that of our country. In the first chapter, events in Virginia history already well known to the reader are briefly recounted, in order that one may recapture more vividly the circumstances in which the first members of the family in America found themselves.

Only those who have a deep affection for revealing old documents can appreciate the thrill of discovery which comes when, for example, a long-elusive document is unearthed in which a parent not only made a deed of gift to a child but with one stroke of the pen gave to his descendants a knowledge of their heritage for generations.

If we are to believe Anatole France, however, documents do not always inspire enthusiasm in all those who are supposedly interested in a subject. In the introduction to his masterpiece of irony, Penguin Island, France warns any historian that if he would have his work well received, he must not dare to present anything new to the reader. And most especially must he not shock the reader by disproving old theories, no matter how irrefutable his findings may be. He tells us that this will irk the reader, and that the latter will say that he had always heard the account differently. The present volume does all of the things against which Anatole France advises. However, erroneous information concerning the Persons genealogy has become so widely disseminated that it cannot be ignored. Yet the compiler preferred to have a positive rather than a negative approach to this work. He has, for this reason, written a separate book called An Examination of Popular Misconceptions about the Persons Genealogy. It seeks to disprove what is untrue, while the present work seeks to prove what is true. If the reader of this book has a different conception of the genealogy of any branch of the Persons family for the period of 1630 to 1800, he has only to refer to the other volume, and he will almost certainly find discussed in detail the particular question in which he is interested. To mention only a few examples: There are some Persons descendants who have believed themselves to be descended from General Thomas Person (who died without issue), others who have believed themselves to be descended from his brother, Joseph, (although he did not have a brother named Joseph), and still others who have erroneously believed themselves to be descended from his brother, William, (who does, however, have some living descendants). All of the descendants to whom proof of these errors has been presented have shown the utmost intellectual honesty and have been delighted to have the age-old mistakes corrected. However, the compiler has not, of course, had an opportunity to discuss these questions with all the descendants, and it remains to be seen whether or not any will fulfill the prediction of Anatole France.





CHAPTER ONE

### WILLIAM COOK(E)

(1615-1679)

Immigrant to America

Landed Proprietor of Virginia

and

# JOHN PERSON(S)

(circa 1630-1707) Immigrant to America Planter of Virginia

WILLIAM COOKE was born in England in 1615 in the twelfth year of the reign of James I. On July 4, 1635, he sailed from London on the *Transport*, and the record of his passage states he was twenty years old and a member of the Church of England. The Virginia colony was now twenty-eight years old, had about eight thousand inhabitants, and was well established. At this time, the Virginia tobacco was bringing high prices on the European market, so that the planters made it their principal crop.

William Cook(e) settled in Isle of Wight County, where he owned lands on the Blackwater River, and married (probably about the year 1638) Mary (Miles?). If we make an effort to visualize the life of William and Mary Cook on their tobacco plantation during this period, a picture of the Virginia of 1642 given by one historian<sup>2</sup> may be of interest:

The wives and daughters of the well-to-do planters wore dresses of silk and satin, trimmed with lace imported from England and of the latest London styles. . . . Food was abundant and in great variety. Beef, pork and mutton were at hand from the plantation stock. Venison called only for a gun. Wild geese, ducks and turkeys crowded the swampland. The rivers were full of fish of many kinds. Sugar, spices and other delicacies came in with every ship, as did also wines, brandy and rum.

Consternation, however, briefly interrupted this abundant life in April, 1644, when Opechancanough, Chief of the Powhatan Confederacy, plotted the massacre of every white in Virginia. In plan, the massacre was similar to that which he had carried out in 1622, when between three hundred and four hundred colonists were killed. The Indians became unduly friendly with the colonists over a long period of time, so that there would be no suspicion of their plot. Then, simultaneously they made their attack along a hundred-mile front. The Indians were repulsed, but about four hundred colonists had been slain.

Life, however, returned to normal, and became more peaceful than that

in England, where civil war was raging between Puritan and royalist.

John Person, who was born about 1630, sailed from England to Virginia as early as 1648,3 and settled in Isle of Wight County. This was the year before the beheading of Charles I, and it was not possible for a colonist to be indifferent to the

struggle in England.

John Person's plantation was on the Blackwater River, and he was probably a neighbor of William and Mary Cook, whose daughter Frances he married about the year 1658. She was born about 1640. John and Frances (Cook) Person were the parents of only one child, John Person, Jr., who was born about 1660, the year when the monarchy was restored in England.

In 1651 the colonists were subjected to the Navigation Acts, and in 1660 and 1663 these Acts were renewed and extended to give British manufacturers a sales monopoly. As a result, in 1664 the price of tobacco, the principal crop of the colon-

ists, sank to a new low level.

For having paid the passage of twenty-two persons from England to the Virginia colony, William Cook, Sr., received (jointly with William Miles) a patent of 1,100 acres of land "on the second branch of the Blackwater River at the upper corner of John Oliver's land and running down to Mr. England's." The patent was

granted on September 29, 1664, during the reign of Charles II.4

On April 10, 1665, a part of this land was presented through a deed of gift by William and Mary Cook (jointly with William Miles) to John Person, Jr., at that time about five years old. The stipulation was made that the property was to remain in the possession of John Person, Jr.'s parents, John Person the elder and his wife Frances, "until ye said John Person their sonne be of full age." The land was on the Blackwater River adjoining that of John Oliver.5

On June 17, 1667, William Cook, Sr., secured 850 additional acres of land by purchasing the rights of four persons who had paid the passage of seventeen

colonists.6

On November 6, 1667, William Miles conveyed 450 acres of land to William Cook.7

On May 26, 1668, William Cook gave power of attorney to his wife, Mary, against Thomas Ward "whom I have arrested in action of debt."8

On August 9, 1669, William Cook and Mary, his wife, sold to Thomas

Carter, Jr., 400 acres of their land in Isle of Wight, "it being the land that I the said Cook and Mary my wife lately lived upon before our removal into Surry County."

On October 9, 1670, William Cook received another patent, this time for 800 acres on the Blackwater River, adjoining the land of Captain Baker, for having paid the passage of sixteen persons from England to Virginia.<sup>10</sup>

For sixteen years preceding Bacon's Rebellion in 1676, the colonial government was guilty of a number of abuses. One of the most serious of these, however, was its failure to protect the colonists from Indian raids or even to permit them to retaliate by making expeditions against the Indians. Those who lived along the frontier were particularly vulnerable. Some few of the planters (including, it is believed, the governor himself) were carrying on a profitable business with the Indians, and feared that any expeditions against them would put an end to their trading. Among the principal articles of exchange offered by these individuals were firearms, and these were, of course, used in turn by the Indians against the colonists.

Finally, indignation reached such a point that armed rebellion arose under the colorful leadership of Nathaniel Bacon, and the Governor, Sir William Berkeley, fled to the Eastern Shore. Bacon's initial success was tremendous, and he marched upon the capital city of Jamestown, which he burned. However, his rebellion was suppressed, despite the fact that many of the colonists were sympathetic with his cause. When the Governor regained control, he dealt ruthlessly with the followers of Bacon, and executed a number of them. Although Charles II officially had to support the position of a royal governor in the face of armed rebellion, privately he condemned Berkeley's judgment.

During the height of the rebellion, *The Young Prince*, one of the king's ships, was anchored in Waryascoat Bay, and its commander, Robert Morris, kept a journal, which reveals significant and frequently dramatic events in Isle of Wight. He mentions among the rebels William West, who headed a force marching to surprise a fort. The latter was captured on January 16, 1677, but managed to escape.

William Cooke was one of a number of residents of Isle of Wight who supported Bacon's cause and petitioned the Commissioners for West's release. The petition, dated October, 1677, is as follows:

Petition of His Majesties most loyal and obedient subjects of Isle of Wight to His Majesties Commissioners, in behalf of William West, a rebel absconding, who took up arms against the Indians by whom his father had been most barbarously murdered, was taken prisoner and carried aboard a ship, from hence to prison and was condemned to death, but has made his escape and as yet has not been found. We pray for his life and the restitution of his estate to his wife and children.<sup>13</sup>

In March of the same year another petition was signed by certain colonists, in which they declared their loyalty to the king, but at the same time called

attention to their grievances.14 Among the signers was John Person, whose original signature is here reproduced:

John Docton

In the will of Captain Francis England of Blackwater in Isle of Wight, dated May 13, 1677, John Person was designated as overseer of the execution of the will.15 This is the same England to whom reference was made in the patent granted to William Cook in 1664, and he was among those active in Bacon's Rebellion.16

On January 9, 1679, John Persons purchased from Thomas Carter and Magdalen, his wife, a part of the land which the latter had acquired from William Cooke.17

Several references are made to John Person's bridge in descriptions of

property by individuals who were probably his neighbors.
On November 10, 1679, Robert Lacy of Lawne's Creek Parish in Surry County and Mary, his wife, sold to George Loether land "on Beaver dam Branch near Jno. Parson's bridge . . . being part of a patent of eleven hundred acres formerly granted to William Miles and Wm. Cook late of Surry County deced."18

On March 3, 1687, John Person witnessed the will of Thomas Wombwell.<sup>19</sup> His name appears on the Rent Roll (a list of land-owners subject to tax-

ation) for Isle of Wight County in 1704.20

He left a will in Isle of Wight County dated October 2, 1707.21 The only devisees were those mentioned in the following paragraph: "I give and bequeath my whole estate real and personal to be equally divided between my loving wife Frances and my only son John." Executrix was his wife, Frances. Witnesses were H. W. Baker, John Whetstone, Thomas Ward, and John Mangum.

John Person's widow, Frances (Cook) Person, continued to live on the plantation in Isle of Wight until her death about 1721. Reference is made to this fact in the will of her son, John Person of Surry County.<sup>22</sup>

CHAPTER TWO

# JOHN PERSON(S)II

(circa 1660-1738) Vestryman Landed Proprietor of Virginia

JOHN PERSON II, son of John and Frances (Cook) Person, was born in Isle of Wight County, Virginia, about the year 1660. The earliest record of him is contained in a deed, dated April 10, 1665, by which William and Mary Cook (jointly with William Miles) gave to him land on the Blackwater River. This land was part of an 1,100-acre patent granted in 1664 to William Cook and William Miles.<sup>2</sup>

Over a period of years, John Person received seven land patents from the British Crown.

The first of these was granted on April 20, 1684, during the reign of Charles II and was signed by Francis, Lord Howard, Governor. It was for 290 acres of land in the lower part of Surry County on the head of Blackwater Branch, adjoining the land of Thomas Land, Robert Ruffin, Mr. Binford, and Mr. Richard Bennett, and was granted to him for having paid the passage of six persons from England to Virginia. The fact that the patent refers to him as "Jr." precludes the possibility of its referring to his father, who was still living.

The second patent<sup>5</sup> bears the same date as the first, was for 740 acres

He is believed to have been a distant relative of John Person, the immigrant. From the English records, it appears that the latter was descended from this same Bennett family on the maternal side.

on the southwest side of the Johnchehaucon Swamp in Surry County at the mouth of the Great Branch in or near Mr. Owen's line, and was granted to him for having

paid the passage of fifteen persons. He is also called "Jr." in this patent.

The third patent<sup>6</sup> was granted on December 17, 1717, by George I "to John Persons of Surry County for services performed towards making the new settlement for the Saponi Indians at Christanna," and was for 76 acres on the north side of the Meherrin River in Isle of Wight County, "being part of a tract whereon said Indians lately dwelt."

The fourth patent' was granted on February 18, 1722, by George I for

130 acres in Isle of Wight County on the south side of the Meherrin River.

The fifth patent<sup>8</sup> bears the same date as the fourth, and was for 100 acres on the south side of the Meherrin River and on the north side of Fountain's Creek in Isle of Wight County.

The sixth patent was granted by George II on February 27, 1734, and was for 330 acres on the south side of the Meherrin River on Fountain's Creek in

Brunswick County.10

The seventh patent<sup>11</sup> was granted by George II on June 5, 1736, for 1,375 acres in Surry County on the north side of the Blackwater Swamp and on Johnchehaucon Swamp adjoining the land of Richard Wiggins, Benjamin Rix, John Justice, William Cooper, Thomas Washington, Edward Scarborough, and Richard Proctor.

John Person(s) is also mentioned in three other patents<sup>12</sup> which were not his own. In all three of these reference is made to him as being deceased, and in the first two, reference is made to him as the father of John Person. These are dated

January 30, 1741, July 10, 1745, and July 24, 1752.

His name is listed on the Rent Roll of Surry County for the year 1704.13

English records show that the ancestors of John Person were members of the Church of England, Virginia records show that he himself was a vestryman in the same church, and later records show that his children belonged to this church; yet the Quaker Records<sup>14</sup> give the following record of his marriage: "John Person, son of John Person of Isle of Wight County, and Mary Partridge, daughter of Thomas Partridge of Surry County. 10 day of 1st mo. 1692."

John Person's first wife, Mary Partridge, was born about 1670 and died before 1721.16 His second wife, Sarah, made a renunciation of her husband's will

on September 20, 1738.17

John Person was a vestryman in Isle of Wight County, and his name is listed among those for the Old Brick Church. If one judges by the dates given for

the other vestrymen on the same list, it appears that he held this office between 1724 and 1738.

The will of John Person, dated August 8, 1721, was proved March 21, 1738.18 Devisees were his wife, Sarah; son, John, ("ye plantation whereon he now lives"); son, Thomas, (certain slaves and "ye plantation at Fountain's Creek whereon he now lives"); son, Francis, (certain slaves and "ye plantation in Isle of Wight County whereon my mother now lives"); son, Joseph, (certain slaves and land "on the East side of the Second Swamp of the main Blackwater commonly called Dykesesses"); son, Benjamin, (certain slaves and land "on the South Side of Fountain's Creek on a branch of ye: said Creek called Cattayle Creek with money out of my estate to pay for ye survey"); son, Samuel, (certain slaves, land "at Meherrin below my son John's" and money from the estate to pay surveying charges); son, William, (certain slaves and land "being part of the Divident whereon I live . . . beginning at a branch called ye Mountain Branch at the mouth of ye: same so up yt branch keeping ye South Valley"); son, Jacob, (certain slaves and "ye plantation whereon I now live"); grandson, Joseph Tuke, (money to be paid to him at the age of twenty-one); the latter's sister, Avarelah Tuke, (money to be paid to her "when she shall be capable to receive it"); daughter, Mary, ("one large black trunk"); daughter, Elizabeth, ("one small black trunk wherein I keep my papers"). Reference is made to the fact that some of the children are under eighteen years of age. Executor was his son Thomas. Witnesses were William Crips, Sampson Lanier, John Glover, and Robert Jordan. Under the signature of the testator are the words: Sealed with red wax.

Issue of John and Mary (Partridge) Person:

1. John Person III: born circa 1693. (See Chapter III.)

2. Thomas Person: died in Southampton County. His estate was appraised in 1754 first by John Person and later by Thomas Clifton, Joseph Claud, and William Westbrook.<sup>19</sup>

3. Francis Person: born circa 1697. (See Chapter IV.)

4. Joseph Person

5. William Person: born 1700. (See Chapter XV.)

6. Benjamin Person

7. Samuel Person: born circa 1704. His will, dated February 17, 1753, was proved October 3, 1754.20 Devisees were his "cousins" (a term used in this case in the sense of "nephews and nieces"), Samuel, Jesse, Joseph, Mary, Henry, William, James, Jacob, and John Person, (all of whom are referred to in the will as being the children of Francis Person); his "cousin," George Glover, son of John Glover; his "cousin," Benjamin Hargrave, son of Jesse Hargrave; Samuel Pretlow and his brother, John Pretlow, (relationship to the testator not stated); his "cousin," John Person, son of Henry Person; his "cousin," Samuel Hargrave, son of Samuel Hargrave, deceased; his sister, Mary Glover; his "cousin," Absolom Hollowell's daughter (under eighteen years of age); his "cousins," Elizabeth Glover and Sarah Glover; his "cousin," Sarah Person. The bequests consisted mostly of slaves, cattle, household furniture, and "the plantation that I now live on," of which the last men-

tioned was bequeathed to "my cousin Henry Person, son of Francis Person." Executors were Jordan Thomas and Thomas Pretlow. Witnesses were Joseph Mangum, Henry Mangum, Samuel Person, and Constant Mangum.

  9. Mary Person: was probably one of the older children, since her husband, John Glover, was born in 1688.22 Her children were George, Elizabeth, and Sarah Glover.

CHAPTER THREE

### JOHN PERSON III

(circa 1693-1752)
Sheriff of Isle of Wight County
Justice of Southampton County
Landed Proprietor of Virginia
AND HIS DESCENDANTS

OHN PERSON, III, son of John and Mary (Partridge) Person, was born about 1693 in Isle of Wight County, Virginia.

Under the terms of his father's will, he received certain slaves and "ye plantation whereon he now lives," which his father had already given to him.

He received seven land patents from the British Crown.

The first<sup>2</sup> of these was granted on June 11, 1733, by George II "to John Persons, Jr. of Isle of Wight," and was for 350 acres of land on the north side of the Meherrin River in Isle of Wight County.

The second patent<sup>3</sup> was granted on June 20, 1733, by George II "to John Persons Jr. of Isle of Wight." It was for 120 acres in Isle of Wight County on the north side of the Meherrin River adjoining the lands of Francis Sharp and Richard Norwood.

The third patent was granted on July 10, 1745, by George II and consisted of four parts:

(1) 855 acres of land in Isle of Wight County on the northeast side of the Meherrin River adjoining the lands of Allen Howard, "76 acres being part of a tract formerly granted John Person, deceased, father of said John Person, by date December 17, 1717."

(2) 132 acres formerly granted to Francis West on October 17, 1717.

(3) 100 acres "being part of a patent for 390 acres formerly granted John Gilliam, December 17, 1717.

(4) "All three parts now vested in said John Person plus 557 acres never

before granted."

The fourth patent<sup>5</sup> was granted on August 1, 1745, by George II and was for 400 acres of land in Isle of Wight County on the north side of the Meherrin

River adjoining the lands of Edward Jacquelin and Thomas Clark.

The fifth patent<sup>6</sup> was granted on February 12, 1750, by George II. It was originally granted to John Mundall on August 20, 1745, and was for 300 acres in Isle of Wight County on the north side of the Meherrin River, adjoining the lands of James Ramsey and William Read. The right to this land later became vested in John Blair, the elder, Esquire, then in John Blair, Jr., then in John Person.

The sixth patent<sup>8</sup> was granted on July 24, 1751, by George II and was for 1,421 acres in Surry County, adjoining the "old land of John Persons, de-

ceased."

He owned numerous plantations in Virginia, North Carolina and South Carolina, and in 1741 was Sheriff<sup>9</sup> of Isle of Wight County, Virginia. Later, in

John Person's will, dated August 31, 1751, was proved February 13, 1752, in Southampton County. Devisees were his son, John, (certain slaves, stock, household goods, and three plantations: the plantation "whereon he now lives," the land purchased of John Blair, Esquire,14 and the plantation in Northampton County, North Carolina, "whereon Benjamin Person now lives"); son, Henry, (certain slaves, stock, household goods, and "one plantation in Granville County in North Carolina that I bought of John Lyle, 15 also an entry of three hundred acres thereunto adjoining that I bought of Daniel Flugunion"); son, Thomas, (certain slaves household goods, and "the lower part of my land whereon he now lives"... and the land "recovered in the General Court from the executors of Edward Jacquelin");16 son, William, (certain slaves, household goods, money, and the "upper part of my land whereon I now live"); daughter, Hannah, (certain slaves and money); daughter,

During the Colonial period, the office of sheriff was one of the most coveted of all offices, and was normally held by a person of the highest position.

Priscilla, (certain slaves and money); daughters, Sarah, Mary, Rebecca, and Elizabeth; his grandson, John Person, son of John and Dorcas Person, (certain slaves). In addition to the legacies mentioned, the following were also made: "I leave all my land in Surry County on Chonchalarkin and one tract of land at the mouth of Fountain's Creek and two hundred acres joining William Person's plantation in Granville County in North Carolina and four hundred acres in Granville County aforesaid which I purchased from John Ledbetter17 and all the rest of my estate to be sold by my executors and after my just debts and the aforesaid legacies are paid the remainder to be equally divided among my ten children: Sarah, Mary, Rebecca, Elizabeth, John, Henry, Thomas, Hannah, William and Priscilla." Executors were his sons, John and Henry Person. Witnesses were Amos Garris, Francis Sharp, John Inman, Sr., and William Bowers.

Records of Granville County, North Carolina,18 show that John and Henry Person, executors of the estate of John Person, deceased, of Isle of Wight County, Virginia, deeded 244 acres in Granville County to Thomas Turner of

Edgecombe County, North Carolina, on March 3, 1752.

On March 27, 1752, John and Henry Person, executors of the last will and testament of John Person, deceased, of Southampton County, Virginia, deeded to William Person 200 acres in Granville County. Thus, it is evident that John Person III was identified simultaneously with both Isle of Wight and Southampton Counties.

John Person IV, son of John Person III, was born about 1715. Under the terms of his father's will, he received certain slaves, stock, household goods, and three plantations. He married Dorcas Turner,<sup>21</sup> and their son, John Person V, received a legacy of certain slaves from his grandfather, John III.

On July 4, 1759, John Person (IV) received from George II three royal

The first<sup>22</sup> of these was for eleven acres on the north side of the Meherrin River, adjoining the lands of William Persons and Colonel John Ruffin.

The second<sup>23</sup> was for 400 acres on the south side of Flatt Swamp bounded by Powell's Branch and the lands of Edward Windham, Francis Sharp, William Persons, John Blanks, Ambrose Grizzard, and Benjamin Harris.

The third<sup>24</sup> was for 118 acres on the north side of the Meherrin River bounded by Goose Pond Swamp and the lands of William Harrison, John Ruffin, and William Persons.

On September 22, 1766, he received a fourth patent<sup>25</sup> in Southampton County. It was granted by George III and was for 240 acres on the south side of the three creeks bounded by the lands of Henry Rowe, Joshua Nicholson, James Ridley, and Edward Harris. This land was originally granted on March 10, 1756, to Timothy Sharp, who left a will naming as his heirs William Person and Peterson Sharp.

On April 4, 1761, John Person of Southampton sold to Simonon Shell of Surry land on the south side of Johnchehaucon Swamp in Surry.26

In November, 1766, John Person sold to John Stewart of Surry land on the west side of Johnchehaucon Swamp, which was originally part of a royal patent granted by Charles II to his great-grandfather, John Person II, on April 20, 1684.27

In 1765 an act was passed to oblige the vestry of the Parish of Nottoway in Southampton County to refund to the Parish of St. Luke their proportion of money and tobacco raised for repairing the churches in the said Parish of Nottoway. In October of the same year "John Person, Gentleman," and three others were appointed commissioners "to examine, state and settle the accounts of the tobacco and money due to the said Parish of Nottoway."<sup>28</sup>

> John Person (IV) was Captain of Militia in Virginia.29 He left a will in Southampton County, Virginia, dated February 10, 1767,

dated July 7, 1761, and proved December 10, 1762. The will is quite detailed and disposes of lands in Southampton and Brunswick Counties, Virginia, and Johnston County, North Carolina. Among the other devisees were Turner Person (a son of John and Dorcas Person) and Lucy Person (a daughter of Francis and Mary Person). Executors were John Person and Simon Turner. and proved April 9, 1767.30 Devisees were his wife, Dorcas, (the use of the manor plantation and certain other lands during her life); son, Presley, ("all the remainder of my lands in Southhampton County"); sons, Philip, Collin, and Turner, ("all the lands belonging to me in North and South Carolina to be equally divided among them when my son, Turner, comes to the age of twenty-one years"). The will provided that all slaves were to remain on the manor plantation until the youngest child should reach the age of twenty-one. Executors were his wife, Dorcas, his brother, William, and his cousin, Benjamin Person, of Bute County, North Carolina. Witnesses were Allen Jones and Willie Jones.

Issue of John and Dorcas (Turner) Person:

1. John Person V: born about 1737. His will, dated July 20, 1773, was proved September 9, 1773, in Southampton County, Virginia.<sup>31</sup> Sole devisee was William Blunt, Senior, to whom were left all stock of horses, cattle, hogs, and sheep, a long list of slaves, and several plantations, including two in Orange and Granville Counties, North Carolina, on the north side of Tar River, containing 2,100 acres; two additional plantations in Granville;32 one plantation in Southampton County, Virginia, "whereon William Morgan now lives," and one in Brunswick County. Executors were William Blunt, Senior, and John Blunt. Witnesses were Henry Harris, William Wommock, and Priscilla Blunt.

2. Presley Person

3. Philip Person: married on January 26, 1772, Temperance Thorpe. 33 His will, dated August 25, 1781, was proved May 9, 1782.84 Devisees were his brother, Turner; wife, Temperance, (the manor plantation "whereon I now live" during her natural life); daughter Patsey, (the manor plantation after wife's decease); son, Timothy, (not yet twenty-one years old); son, Turner. 35 Executrix was his wife, Temperance Person, and executor was his friend, William Andrews. Witnesses were John Turner, Richard Clifton, and John Westbrook.

4. Collin Person: left a will dated November 18, 1780, and proved May 9, 1782.36 Devisees were his wife, Elizabeth, and his daughter, Nancy Person (not yet fifteen years old). Executrix was his wife, Elizabeth, and executor was his brother, Philip. Witnesses were Thomas Turner, Dacas Clifton, and John Main.
5. Turner Person: was a devisee in the will of his grandfather, Simon

Turner.

Priscilla Person, daughter of John Person III, was born about 1717. She married Benjamin Blunt (died 1752 in Southampton County, Virginia), son of Richard (died 1747 in Surry) and Ann Blunt, grandson of Thomas Blunt (died 1709 in Surry), who married first the daughter of Henry (died 1681) and Margerie Briggs, and secondly Priscilla, daughter of Colonel William Browne (died 1704) of

The will of Benjamin Blunt, dated July 4, 1751, was proved May 14, 1752, in Southampton County, Virginia. Devisees were his son, William, under twenty-one years of age, (his proportionate share of the slaves, "the plantation where-on I now live," "265 acres bought of Samuel Davis," "70 acres of land adjoining that whereon I now live," "an entry of land lying in the Meadow," that part of the "land I bought of Benjamin Clifton . . . on the south side of Powells branch," and the lower one-third of "my part of a survey of land taken up with Samuel Davis lying on the Meherrin River"); son, Benjamin, (his proportionate share of the slaves, "all my land . . . in North Carolina," and the upper one-third of the land taken up with Samuel Davis); son, John, (his proportionate share of the slaves, and the middle one-third of the land taken up with Samuel Davis); any future son (money); his wife (one-half of his personal estate, "the use of my plantation whereon I now live during her natural life," and the use of certain slaves. The slaves were to be equally divided "among all my children," and the division was to be made "according to the judgment of my brothers, Henry Blunt and Henry, Thomas and John Person." Executrix was his wife (not mentioned by name in the will, but called Priscilla Blunt in the probate of the will). Witnesses were John Person, Edward Windham, Elias Foster, and Alexander Watson.

The will of Priscilla Blunt, dated February 25, 1778, was proved September 12, 1782, in Southampton County, Virginia. Devisees were her son, John Blunt, ("the land I bought of Alexander Watson," certain slaves, and the residue of the estate "not hereafter mentioned"); grandson, James Turner, son of Jacob, (certain slaves); grandson, John Blunt, son of John, (the aforementioned slaves, if the other grandson should die without an heir); son, William Blunt, (money); daughter, Priscilla Turner, (money, clothes, and riding saddle); grandson, Edmund Turner, (one feather bed and furniture); granddaughter, Martha Turner, (money); granddaughter, Temperance Turner, (money); granddaughter, Elizabeth Turner, (money). Executor was her son, John Blunt. Witnesses were Savory Atkins, Nathan Bryant, and Celia Bryant.

Thomas Person, son of John Person III, was born about 1733 in Isle of Wight County, Virginia. He lived in Southampton County and removed to Greensville County, where he died. CHAPTER FOUR

### FRANCIS PERSON(S)

(circa 1697-1758)

Planter of Virginia

AND HIS DESCENDANTS

RANCIS PERSON, son of John and Mary (Partridge) Person, was born about 1697 in Isle of Wight County, Virginia, and was probably named for his grandmother, Frances (Cook) Person. Under the terms of his father's will, he received certain slaves, stock, household goods, and "ye plantation in Isle of Wight County whereon my mother now lives with the land thereunto belonging." John Person distributed numerous plantations in his will, and the fact that he gave this particular plantation to his son Francis might indicate that Francis was more closely associated with his grandmother (whose name he bore) than were any of the other children. This plantation was the one deeded to John Person II, when he was about five years old, by William and Mary Cook. William Cook had originally received it as a part of a royal patent in 1664.

The deposition of John Glover in connection with the will of John Person states that he was at the latter's dwelling on his plantation about a week after his death, that John Person's sons, Thomas, Francis, Jacob, and Samuel, were present, and that Francis Person brought out a trunk, which contained his father's papers, that they examined these, and that among them was the will.<sup>3</sup>

Francis Person had land in both Surry (where his father died) and in Isle of Wight (where his grandparents died), and seems to have been closely identified with both counties.

On May 1, 1750, Francis Person of Surry County, Virginia, purchased

from James Saintsing of Granville County, North Carolina, land on the north side of Fishing Creek.4 The land was in that part of Granville County which in 1764 became Bute. When Bute was abolished in 1779, and Franklin and Warren Counties were formed from it, this property was in Warren near the dividing line of the two counties. The deed was witnessed by William Person and Joseph Person.

The children of Francis Person were the principal heirs of his brother, Samuel Person, who died in 1754.5 Ten of his twelve children were devisees in the latter's will. These were Samuel, Jesse, Joseph, Mary, Henry, William, James, Jacob, John, and Sarah, and with the exception of Sarah, all are identified in the will as

children of Francis.

The inventory and appraisement of the estate of Francis Person were made on February 18, 1758, in Surry County, Virginia, by Richard Gray, Robert

Hunnicutt, and James Clark.

Francis Person was survived by his widow, Mary (Turner?) Person, who spent her last years in North Carolina. Her will, dated May 20, 1761, was proved August 11, 1761, in Granville County, North Carolina.8 Devisees were her son, Jesse Person; her daughter, Lucy Person, (these two were to receive "my household goods that I have in Carolina"); daughter, Martha Person, ("the household goods that I left in Virginia"); daughter, Sarah Jones. Reference was made to her son, John Person, and to her son, Joseph Person, but they were not among the devisees. Executor was her son, Joseph Person. Witnesses were John Person, Elizabeth Langston, and Elizabeth Cooper.

Among the deeds listed in his name is one dated March 3, 1755, in which Joseph Person purchased land on Fishing Creek in that part of Granville County which later became Bute. 15 This land was in the same area as that purchased in 1750 by his father, Francis Person. On April 30, 1765, Joseph Person of Bute County bought land on Indian Cabin Branch. 16 On December 8, 1780, this land was sold by his sons, Henry and William Person, to Isaac Smith. Witness was Jesse Person.<sup>17</sup> On April 20, 1767, Joseph Person purchased from Philip Alston, both of Bute County, land on Fishing Creek. (This land was also in the same area as that purchased in 1750 by his father, Francis Person.) Witnesses were Thomas Person and John Person. The will of Joseph Person, dated November 22, 1771, was proved in February, 1772. Devisees were his sons, Henry Person and William Person, ("a certain tract of land purchased of John Bennett"); a son, Samuel Person, ("a certain tract of land purchased of Benjamin Cooper"); son, Harrison Person, ("a certain tract of land lying between the manor plantation and Philip Alston's land"); son, Peterson Person, (the manor plantation with all the land to be enjoyed by him "after the decease of my wife"); loving wife, Nanny, (certain slaves);

CHAPTER FIVE

## JOHN PERSON(S)

(circa 1730-1786) Soldier of the French and Indian War Planter of Virginia and North Carolina

JOHN PERSON(s), son of Francis and Mary (Turner?) Per-

son(s), was born in Isle of Wight County, Virginia, about the year 1730.

He was a devisee in the will of his uncle, Samuel Person, dated February 17, 1753, and proved October 3, 1754, from whose estate he received certain household goods and money. In this will, reference is made to him as "John Person, son of Francis Person."2

He married about 1756 Prudence Jones, daughter of Samuel<sup>3</sup> (circa 1705-1771) and Sarah Jones, and granddaughter of Richard (1666-1721) and

For the benefit of any one who may wish to do research on the ancestry of Sarah, wife of Samuel Jones, Sr., it may be mentioned that it seems possible that her maiden name was Sarah Shaw, and that she might have been a daughter of Mathew and Elizabeth (Pitt?) Shaw, (the latter of whom died in 1753), and a grandElizabeth Jones<sup>6</sup> (died 1749) of Isle of Wight County, Virginia. His brother, Joseph Person(s), married Ann Jones, a sister of his wife, Prudence Jones, and it is altogether probable that the Jones whom his sister, Sarah, married was a brother of his wife, Prudence Jones.

John Person(s) removed to North Carolina, and as early as 1752 was living in the area between Sandy Creek and Fishing Creek in that part of Granville County which in 1764 became Bute. He made three purchases of land in this area before Bute County was formed. The property was in the same vicinity as that

purchased by his father, Francis Person(s), in 1750.

Although the Seven Years' War did not begin in Europe until 1756, the French and Indian War, with which it is usually associated, began in America in 1754. John Person, along with his brother, Joseph Person, served in the Colonial Militia of North Carolina. He was a member of Captain Daniel Harris's Company, Granville County Regiment under the command of Colonel William Eaton. Other officers of the regiment were Lt. Colonel William Person (his uncle) and Major James Paine. His name appears on a muster roll of the regiment taken October 8, 1754.

John Person (along with Joseph Person) is named on the State Treasurer's Tax List for Granville County in 1755. His property was near that of Joseph, and he seems to have been more closely associated with him than with any of his other brothers.

On May 20, 1761, John Person was a witness of the will of his mother, Mary Person, and is mentioned in the will, but was not one of the devisees.<sup>10</sup>

In 1765 John Person signed a bond in Bute County.<sup>11</sup>

He owned lands in both Franklin and Warren Counties (formed in 1779

from Bute), and the records show clearly that these were north of Sandy Creek near the dividing line of the two counties. There can be no doubt that John Person was closely associated with the following individuals, since they are named in deeds either as owners of adjoining property or as witnesses of an instrument: Joseph Person, his brother; Philip Wilhite, whose daughter, Rachel, married John Person's son, Josiah; Reverend William Walker, whose son, Joel, married John Person's daughter, Holly Berry.

When William Walker purchased land in Bute on April 13, 1765, John Person was one of the witnesses,<sup>12</sup> and when John Person made a purchase of land in Bute County on August 9, 1774, William Walker was one of the witnesses.<sup>13</sup>

Many of the early records of Franklin County have been destroyed, but in the deeds of Warren County, John Person is listed seven times as a grantee<sup>14</sup> and three times as a grantor.15

Among the purchasers at the sale of the estate of Peter Walker on February 24, 1778, were William Walker, John Persons, James Walker, and Theophilus Bass.16

An instrument, dated June 19, 1786, signed by Green Hill, Clerk of the Court of Franklin County, North Carolina, and addressed to the Sheriff of the county, directs that the latter "make known to Josiah Persons and Francis Persons, executors of John Persons, decd., that they . . . show cause . . . why execution shall not issue againt them for the costs of the suit John Persons decd. vs. Jesse Bowers, which said suit abated by the death of the plaintiff."17

Between 1786 and 1789 Prudence (Jones) Persons married secondly as his last wife Jacob Bass, Sr., whose estate was settled in Franklin County, North Carolina, 1792-1796. Since both of them had children by previous marriages, her deeds of property and slaves to her children were probably made in order to protect their interests, should the second husband attempt to assert any rights over her property.

On September 22, 1789, Prudence Bass deeded to "my son Amos Persons" a plantation on the north side of Sandy Creek and several slaves with the provision that Amos Persons was "to have no authority power or possession of either land or negroes till after my decease." Witnesses were Francis Person and Jones Person.18

On September 22, 1789, Prudence Bass "for the natural love and good

will I have" deeded to "my son Turner Persons" a two-year-old slave named James.

Witnesses were Jones Person and Francis Person. 19

An original manuscript, so important that the genealogical part of it is quoted in its entirety in a later chapter, tells of the migration of Turner Persons from North Carolina to Georgia, and names those of his brothers and sisters who also settled in Georgia: Jones Persons, Josiah Persons, Holly Berry (Persons) Walker, and Obedience (Persons) Bass.

Records of all the brothers show the surname to be be spelled both with and without the final s. However, descendants of all the brothers except Francis re-

tained the s.

Prudence Bass was living as late as 1795, for in that year she witnessed a receipt in Franklin County, North Carolina, from Reddick Bass to Theophilus Bass

for his share of the estate of Jacob Bass, Sr.

Jones Persons obviously received his given name from the maiden name of his mother, Prudence (Jones) Persons. Turner named one of his daughters Prudence, so there can be little doubt that she was named for his mother. Rebecca (Walker) Brantley, a granddaughter of Prudence (Jones) Persons, named one of her daughters Prudence Jones Brantley, so again the source of the name is obvious.

Of the sons of John Persons each of the following named a son John: Francis, Jones, Turner, and Josiah. These grandchildren were probably his name-

sake.

A family record<sup>20</sup> preserved by Miss Anna Persons, a granddaughter of Turner Persons, gives the following data concerning the brothers and sisters who settled in Georgia:

Jones Persons, born 1760, died 1850, married 1790 Diana Neal, died July, 1859.

Holly Berry Persons, born 1765, died 1846, married 1780 Joel Walker, born 1756, died 1800.

Turner Persons, born 1766, died 1827, married 1796 Sarah Williams, born 1774, died 1861.

Obedience Persons, born 1767, married Reddick Bass. Josiah Persons.

CHAPTER SIX

#### PETER BAYES

(died 1730)
Planter of Virginia

and

#### WILLIAM WALKER

(1717-1784) Minister of the Gospel Soldier of the French and Indian War Landed Proprietor of North Carolina

PETER BAYES¹ lived in that part of Henrico County, Virginia, which in 1727/8 became Goochland.

On March 16, 1723, George I granted to "Peter Baze of Henrico County" a patent of 400 acres of land on the north side of the James River and on Beaver Dam Creek, adjoining the lands of Thomas Christian, in Henrico County. When Goochland was formed from Henrico, this land was then located in Goochland.

The will of "Peter Bayes of St. James Parish," dated October 31, 1729, was proved February 17, 1729, in Goochland County, Virginia. Devisees were his eldest son, Peter Bayes, ("my land and plantation I now live upon," a gun, certain furniture, and certain slaves, with reversion to son William if Peter should die without heirs); son, William Bayes, under fourteen years of age, (a gun and "two hundred acres of land joyning upon Richard Oglesby's line and Thomas Christian's son's line"); daughter, Sarah Bayes, not of age, (certain slaves and cattle); daughter, Elizabeth Bayes, ("a young horse and one thousand pounds of tobacco"); daugh-

ters, Jane Bayes, Judith Bayes, and Mary Bayes, (two thousand pounds of tobacco each); wife, Sarah Bayes,6 ("all the rest and residue of my monies, goods and chattles, and negroes and personal estate whatsoever"). Executrix was his wife, Sarah Bayes. Witnesses were Elizabeth Bybe, John Bybe, and Edward White. Children of Peter and Sarah (Bibb?) Bayes:

1. Peter Bayes: received on August 16, 1756, from George II a patent of 250 acres of land on the south side of the Appomattox River in Amelia County, Virginia.8 His name appears on a list of persons renouncing allegiance to Great Britain and swearing allegiance to the Commonwealth of Virginia. The list was certified by Robert Hairston on January 1, 1779, and refers to those who had taken the oath prior to that date."

2. William Bayes: under fourteen years of age in 1729.

- Sarah Bayes Elizabeth Bayes
- Jane Bayes: of whom later.
- Judith Bayes Mary Bayes

Jane Bayes, daughter of Peter and Sarah (Bibb?) Bayes, was born in that part of Henrico County, Virginia, which later became Goochland. She was married to William Walker, who was born January 24, 1717, in New Kent County, Virginia, and who died on Wednesday, September 13, 1784, in Franklin County, North Carolina.10

William Walker removed as early as 1742 from Virginia to Edgecombe County, North Carolina,11 and received four royal land grants totaling 2,018 acres.12

On March 20, 1742/3 he received from George II a grant of 300 acres

of land on the north side of Rocky Swamp in Edgecombe County.

On March 14, 1760, he received a grant of 537 acres on the east side of Little Creek, adjoining his own line and that of Ancom and Bell, in Granville County.14

On December 2, 1760, he received a grant of 700 acres on a branch of Gunther's Creek, adjoining four of his own lines and the lines of Mangum and Weldon, in Granville County.<sup>1</sup>

For those who may wish to do research on the ancestry of Sarah Bayes, it may be mentioned that the evidence seems strong that her maiden name was Bibb.

Died 1769 in Goochland; grandfather of William Wyatt Bibb (1781-1820), only Governor of Alabama Territory and first Governor of the State, and of Thomas Bibb (1784-1839), second Governor of Alabama. During the Colonial period, the name was variously spelled Bybe, Bybbe, Bibe, Bibbe, and Bibb. The last-named spelling seems to be the most recent of all.

William Walker was a grantee in five deeds in Granville County: (1) Thomas Putnam to "each male member of the Baptist Church under the Rev. Mr. Walker, minister of the province and county aforesaid" two acres in Granville "on which Putnam now lives and on which the meeting house now stands," April 20, 1761;17 (2) Waugh Darnell to William Walker, both of Granville, 90 acres in Granville, May 12, 1762;18 (3) Solomon Williams of Halifax County to William Walker of Granville 300 acres on Sandy Creek in Granville, July 9, 1762;10 (4) Hezekiah Terrell to William Walker, both of Granville, land on Sandy Creek in Granville County adjoining William Walker's line, March 14, 1763;20 (5) Henry McCulloh of Turham Green in the County of Middlesex in the Kingdom of Great Britain to William Walker of Granville 449 acres in Granville, July 24, 1763.21

William Walker was a grantor in three deeds in Granville County: (1) William Walker to Peter Walker, both of Granville, April 23, 1763, land bought by William Walker from Solomon Williams; deed proved by oath of Joseph Person, one of the witnesses;<sup>22</sup> (2) William Walker to John Broome, both of Granville, 100 acres in Granville, May 3, 1763;<sup>23</sup> (3) William Walker, planter of Granville, to Eustace H. McCulloch of Halifax, August 16, 1763.<sup>24</sup>

William Walker was a grantee in five deeds in Warren County, North Carolina: (1) William Johnson, Sheriff, to William Walker of Bute, 537 acres on Little Creek, March 25, 1765;25 (2) Thomas Ownsby of Halifax to William Walker of Bute and his church, land in Bute, December 10, 1770;26 (3) Umphrey Ballard to William Walker and his church, land in Bute, May 15, 1771;27 (4) Gilbert Prince to William Walker, Sr., plantation on Sandy Creek in Bute, March 24, 1772, witnesses: James Walker, Peter Walker;<sup>28</sup> (5) James Walker to William Walker, Sr., 120 acres on Sandy Creek, January 3, 1777, witnesses: Peter Walker, John Walker, Lewis Walker.29

William Walker was a grantor in nine deeds in Warren County: (1) William Walker of Granville to James Nicholson, land on Little Creek, February 2, 1764<sup>30</sup> (2) William Walker, Sr., of Bute, to John Brown, 100 acres on Melton's Creek in Bute, April 13, 1765, witnesses: John Person, William Hudson;<sup>31</sup> (3) William Walker, Sr., to Chamberlain Hudson, both of Bute, 800 acres on Melton's

Creek in Bute, April 13, 1765; (4) William Walker to Jesse Walker, land on Pine Branch, June 24, 1772, witness: George Walker; (5) William Walker, Sr., to William Shearen, land on Little Creek, August 20, 1772; (6) William Walker, Sr., to Marsh Thornton, land on Little Creek, August 20, 1772; (7) William Walker to Richard Ellis, 145 acres on Hawtree Creek in Bute, originally granted to William Walker by "the Right Honorable John, Earl Granville, by deed bearing date 28 Oct. 1772," witness: George Walker; (8) William Walker to Edward Ellis, 300 acres on Pine Branch, 1772; (9) William Waker, 50 acres on Sandy Creek, 1778-1783.

William Walker was a witness to at least four deeds in Warren County, North Carolina: (1) Benjamin Holcom to William Walker, Jr., land on Sandy Creek in Bute, September 18, 1765, witnesses: William Walker, Peter Walker; (2) Thomas Putnam to Peter Walker, land on Sandy Creek, February 25, 1772, witnesses: William Walker, James Walker; (3) Zachariah Thompson of Brunswick County, Virginia, to James Walker of Bute, land on Sandy Creek, July 25, 1772, witnesses: William Walker, Peter Walker. (4) Peter Walker and Mary, his wife, to John Hoof, land on Hawley's Branch, February 14, 1774, witness: William Walker. (2)

William Walker also owned lands in Franklin County, North Carolina, on Sandy Creek, and his home was near the dividing line of the county on Fishing Creek.<sup>43</sup> Many of the early records of Franklin County have been destroyed, but at least two deeds in which William Walker was a grantee have been preserved: (1) Thomas Cooper to William Walker, 1781;<sup>44</sup> (2) Samuel Walker to William Walker, 1783.<sup>45</sup>

Among the purchasers at the sale of the estate of Peter Walker on February 24, 1778, were William Walker, John Persons, James Walker, and Theophilus Bass. 46

Although a minister,<sup>47</sup> William Walker served during the French and Indian War in Captain Daniel Harris's Company,<sup>48</sup> Granville County Regiment, under the command of Colonel William Eaton. His name appears on a muster roll

of the regiment taken October 8, 1754.43

In 1772 Morgan Edwards, a Baptist minister of Philadelphia, visited North Carolina, and spent several months gathering material for his history of the Baptists in America. His original manuscripts are now preserved in the library of the American Baptist Historical Society in Chester, Pennsylvania. He visited the various churches which he describes and recorded information concerning their ministers. The following is taken from pages 26 and 27 of Morgan Edwards' "Notebook" under the section on Fishing Creek church: 50

The present minister REV. WILLIAM WALKER

Born January 24, 1717, at New Kent county, Virginia. Bred a churchman, embraced the sentiments of the Baptists August 9, 1746, and had the ordinance administered by Wm. Surgenor at Quehooky. Ordained in 1748 by Josiah Hart and Deacon; embraced calvinism in the year 1752. Took care of the church about 1755. Married Jane Bays, by whom he has children: Peter, Sarah, William, Mary, Martha, James, John, Joel, Lydia, Mercy Hope. 2

The following details concerning him and the account of his death are given by Joseph Biggs: 53

. . . His labors in the ministry were not confined to Reedy Creek only, but he travelled and preached in a number of places. . . . He was never known to court the smiles, nor fear the frowns of any man. . . . He was loved and esteemed by all ranks of people. The labors of his life which closed his ministry here on earth were Saturday and Sunday... On Saturday he attended a funeral at Mr. Honorias Powell's, and preached from Deut. XXXII, 29, 'O! That they were wise!' In the first part of his discourse he seemed much engaged, but a sudden weakness affected his mortal frame, and he concluded the labors of the day after going through his second head of doctrine. He retired to the house of one of the brethren, dined heartily, but in conversation seemed incoherent, and at times inclined to be wild and startish. He rested but very little that night, and was in a great hurry to get to the meeting house next morning; more so than was ever known before; and said he wished to go and do what he had to do. He went to meeting and took his text in the 8th chapter of Paul's Epistle to the Romans; but could not distinctly read it, before he was stricken with the palsy, and fell in the pulpit, and was heard to say, "Blessed be God, I have fallen in a good cause." He was put into a chair and conveyed to the house where he lodged the night before. . . . He was carried to his house in Franklin County on Wednesday following. . . . A physician was consulted

who gave him a sleeping dose; it operated, and put him to sleep and he never awoke more in this world, but breathed out his soul into the bosom of his redeemer on Wednesday, the 13th of September, 1784, much lamented by all who knew him.

He was one of the leading ministers of the Revolution and Paschal<sup>54</sup> states that in Warren and Franklin the period of the Revolution saw no diminution in the zeal of Elder William Walker.

CHAPTER SEVEN

MANUSCRIPT OF

# EDWARD NORPHLET BROWN

(born 1830)

and Cynthia (Walker) Brown, was only four years old when his mother died in 1834. After that time, he was reared by his grandmother, Holly Berry (Persons) Walker, widow of Joel Walker. In view of this fact, his biographical manuscript, which gives details about his grandmother's family, is particularly significant.

Since Edward Norphlet Brown was sixteen years old when his grand-mother died in 1846, his recollections of her were quite vivid, and as long as he lived, he had an attitude of deep veneration whenever he spoke of her. He also knew personally his grandmother's brother, Jones Persons, (he was twenty years old when Jones died in 1850), and his grandmother's sister, Obedience (Persons) Bass, (he was twenty-five years old when Obedience died in 1855), so his statements in the manuscript are based upon intimate association and not upon tradition.

Although the entire manuscript is interesting, those parts of it which

Because it includes information about all five of the Persons brothers and sisters who settled in Georgia (and who are presented in separate chapters in this book), the manuscript is treated as a separate chapter. It does not mention the two brothers, Francis and Amos, since the former died in North Carolina and the latter in Kentucky.

contain philosophical observations or facts other than those of a genealogical nature are omitted here. The following are verbatim excerpts from the manuscript:

... The place of my birth is in the northern part of Warren County,

State of Georgia, about half a mile south of Williams Creek. . . .

About 1832 my father moved across Williams Creek into Taliaferro Co. to a farm . . . on Williams Creek. . . . The next year 1833 my father moved to a farm in Taliaferro Co. near Hardin's Creek, about one mile west of the present town of Sharon. . . . Here my mother died in 1834, and my father returned to Virginia, where he was raised. And my grandmother, Holly Berry Walker, née Persons, took me to her home near Camak in Warren Co., where I lived until her death in 1846. My mother was buried at Williams Creek Baptist Church, where lie buried her father and mother. In the days of Jesse Mercer and Billington M. Sanders that church was in a flourishing condition. Both these men preached there, and my parents and grandparents were members of that church. . . . After my grandmother's death, I went to school four years in Warren Co. near where I was born. In 1851 I entered Franklin College at Athens, Ga., and graduated in 1854 with 4th honor. I then went to teach school at Cowikee or Springhill in Barbour Co., Ala. In 1858 I married Frances Elizabeth Long, daughter of Col. Nimrod W. Long of Barbour Co., Ala. I continued to teach there until 1860, when I went to teach at Culverton, Hancock Co., Ga. In March 1862 I joined Company C, 45th Ala. Reg. Lowry's Brigade, Cleburne's Division, Hardee's Corps, Army of Tennessee, General Braxton Bragg commanding. I held the commission of Captain and Q.M. of the Reg. until the reorganization in North Carolina a short time before the surrender to Sherman. The new name of the reorganized Reg. was the 1st Ala. Reg. and I was its Q.M. Sergeant. .

I raised seven children, viz., Laura Nimphia, Edward Norphlet, Gatra, Nimrod Washington Long, Lucy, Frances Catherine and Margaret Mary. . . . I was the first Mayor of Hurtsboro and drew up the first code of laws for that town and I was for several years J.P. for Hurtsboro Beat. I represented the County of Russell in the legislature of Ala. for the years 1880 and 1881, and again for the years 1894 and 1895. I have been master of both the Masonic Lodges at Cowikee and Hurts-

boro, and have represented both in the grand lodge of Ala.

Appomattox River. His name was Washington Hardaway Brown. . . . My mother was Miss Cynthia Walker, daughter of Joel Walker and Holly Berry Persons. My mother's parents were reared in Franklin Co. North Carolina on Fishing Creek some forty miles west of the town of Halifax on Roanoke River. It was their market town. My grandfather was a soldier in Greene's Army during the Revolutionary War. He was in the Battle of Guilford Court House near Greensboro, N. C., where I surrendered to Sherman in 1865. Gen. Cornwallis retreated in Yorktown, Va. and there surrendered to Washington in 1781. This was virtually the end of the war. But there were hot times in Va. and N. C. after Cornwallis surrendered between Whig and Tory. . . . To get away from this continual fuss, the Persons, Walkers and others formed a colony and trekked away to Georgia in 1782² some five hun-

dred miles and entered lands from the authorities, . . . forty to fifty miles from Augusta, the head of navigation on Savannah River. My grandfather settled on Middle Creek one mile north of the present town Camak. . . . And Mr. Reddick Bass, who married my grandmother's sister, whose name was Obedience, settled on the opposite side of the Creek not more than a mile away. Here they lived to old age and here they died. . . .

Three of my grandmother's brothers came in this trekking crowd, viz., Jones Persons, Josiah Persons and Turner Persons. They all settled in Warren County and raised large and influential families. I will not attempt to follow them

up in this narration.

I had three brothers, viz. Thomas Marion, Lawrence Augustus and Felix Persons. Thomas M. married Mary Hall of Warren Co. . . . He died in 1895, July 29. Lawrence A. migrated to California in the "Gold Fever" days and never returned. He died in the West in 1899 leaving an only child whose name is Alfred Persons. He now lives in San Francisco. Brother Felix P. married a Miss Susan Kendrick of Taliaferro Co. Ga. and left two children viz. Mrs. Mary Moore, wife of a merchant of Atlanta, and Dr. Lawrence Brown of Sharon, Taliaferro Co., Ga.

1850 listed their place of birth as North Carolina in the census record. All of the brothers and sisters named in the manuscript except Obedience were in Georgia prior to 1790. From the records it appears that they made a number of trips back to North Carolina. The last of the group to migrate were Reddick and Obedience (Persons) Bass and the latter's brother, Amos Persons. Reddick Bass is listed in the 1790 Census of Franklin County, North Carolina. It is probable that Amos Persons went to Georgia at the same time as the family of his sister, Obedience. He died, however, in Kentucky.



### FRANCIS PERSON

(circa 1758-1815)

AND HIS DESCENDANTS

RANCIS PERSON, son of John and Prudence (Jones) Person(s), was born about 1758 in that part of Granville County, North Carolina, which later became Bute.

In an instrument dated June 19, 1786, reference is made to him as executor (jointly with Josiah Persons) of the estate of "John Persons, deceased." On May 24, 1789, Josiah Person and wife, Rachel, of Franklin County,

On May 24, 1789, Josiah Person and wife, Rachel, of Franklin County, North Carolina, sold to Robert Cooper land on Isinglass Creek. Witness was Francis Person.<sup>3</sup>

On September 22, 1789, Francis Person witnessed with Jones Person a deed made by Prudence Bass to her son, Amos Persons.

On the same date Francis Person witnessed with Jones Person a deed made by Prudence Bass to her son, Turner Persons.<sup>5</sup>

On October 31, 1791, Esper Kilby deeded to Francis Person, both of Franklin County, North Carolina, 130 acres adjoining Person's land. Witness was John Kilby.<sup>6</sup>

The will of Francis Person, dated April 26, 1815, was proved in the same

Person, (certain slaves, cattle, furniture, and lands on the Long Branch, so as to include the house and orchards), Turner Persons, not of age, (certain slaves, cattle, furniture, and the lands purchased of John Barnes and Lewis Wilhite), Polly Jones Person (certain slaves and furniture). Executors were Jack B. Person and Amos Jones. Witnesses were A. Jones and John B. Persons.

John Barnes Person: son of Francis and Sally Person; born 1789 in Franklin County, North Carolina; died April 6, 1854, in Shelby County, Tennessee; about 1820 removed to Tennessee, and with his brother, Turner Person, bought ten thousand acres of land, and founded the community of Pleasant Ridge in the northern part of Shelby County. The will of John Barnes Person, dated April 5, 1854, was recorded May 16, 1854. Soldier of the American Revolution

ones Persons, son of John and Prudence (Jones) Persons, was born in 1760<sup>2</sup> in that part of Granville County, North Carolina, which in 1764 became Bute. When Franklin and Warren Counties were formed from Bute in 1779, he lived in the northern part of Franklin County.

He served in Colonel Elijah Clarke's Regiment during the American Revolution, and received a land grant in Franklin County, Georgia, for his services. His sword has been preserved by the family, and at least twelve of his descendants hold membership in the Daughters of the American Revolution by right

of their descent from him.7

Although many of the early records of Franklin County, North Carolina, have been destroyed, at least four deeds have been preserved in which his name appears: (1) On November 12, 1787, Robert Cooper and Jones Person, both of Franklin County, sold to Benjamin Perry land adjoining that of John Huff, James Gant, Joshua Perry, Arthur Duley, and Benjamin Bell. Witness was Joshua Perry.<sup>8</sup> (2) On June 29, 1789, Jones Persons of Franklin County sold to Robert Cooper land on the south side of Isinglass Creek. Witnesses were John Johnston and Elisha Cary.<sup>9</sup> (3) On September 22, 1789, Prudence Bass deeded to her son, Turner Persons, a two-year-old slave named James. Witnesses were Jones Person and Francis Person.<sup>10</sup> (4) On September 22, 1789, Prudence Bass deeded to her son, Amos Persons, a plantation in Franklin County on the north side of Sandy Creek and several slaves. Witnesses were Francis Person and Jones Person.<sup>11</sup>

Between 1787 and 1790 Jones Persons removed to Georgia, and first

settled in that part of Wilkes County which in 1793 became Warren.12

In 1790 he married Diana Neal, 13 daughter of Thomas and Sarah Neal. 14

Jones Persons received two land grants in Georgia in addition to the bounty grant. One of these was for 287 1/2 acres of land in Franklin County, dated October 3, 1787, 15 and the other was for 12 1/2 acres in Wilkes County, dated October 17, 1798. 16

The Georgia Land Lottery of 1805<sup>17</sup> lists Jones Persons for Warren

County.18

He owned extensive holdings in the state, and had plantations in the counties of Wilkes, Warren, Jackson, Greene, Jasper, Hancock, Monroe, Franklin, Pike, Putnam, and Upson.<sup>19</sup>

He was Justice of the Inferior Court of Putnam County, 1813-1815, and was the first to hold this same office in Upson County after it was formed in 1824.20

Two examples of his original signature are preserved by the Georgia Department of Archives and History. The first is dated November 1, 1813, and was written on his taking the oath of office. The second is dated November 7, 1825, and was written on his administering an oath to Isaac Cooper. They are reproduced below:

An early account of Thomas Persons states that he was brilliantly educated, and was the author of a textbook on mathematics. He has been described as a man of much energy, zeal, and remarkable strength of character.

CHAPTER TEN

# JOSIAH PERSONS

(circa 1762-1806) Soldier of the American Revolution Planter of North Carolina and Georgia AND HIS DESCENDANTS

OSIAH PERSONS, son of John and Prudence (Jones) Persons,1 was born about 1762 in that part of Granville County, North Carolina ,which later became Bute.

In an instrument dated June 19, 1786, reference is made to him as executor (jointly with Francis Person) of the estate of "John Persons, deceased."

He married Rachel Wilhite, daughter of Philip and Rachel Wilhite of

Franklin County, North Carolina.3

On May 24, 1789, Josiah Person and wife, Rachel, of Franklin County, North Carolina, sold to Robert Cooper land on Isinglass Creek "whereon Josiah Person now lives." Witness was Francis Person.4

About 1789 Josiah Persons removed to Georgia, where four of his broth-

ers and sisters also settled.5

On February 15, 1796, Josiah Persons of Warren County, Georgia, purchased from Howell Jarrett of Wilkes County land in Warren County ("formerly Wilkes").

His name appears on the tax list for the year 1805,7 and in the 1805 Land

Lottery<sup>8</sup> for Warren County.<sup>6</sup>

On January 14, 1807, Thorton Sanford of Hancock County conveyed by deed to the heirs of "Josiah Persons, deceased," of Warren County, a plantation on Hart's Creek in Warren County.<sup>10</sup> Turner Persons declared on February 24, 1809, that he had seen the deed executed.

On December 28, 1816, the heirs of Josiah Persons sold to Isaac Castleberry land in Baldwin ("now Morgan") County, Georgia. Signatories of the deed were Thomas Persons, Jephtha Brantley (husband of Lucy Persons Brantley), John Persons, Turner Persons (brother of Josiah, who assisted in the administration of the estate), Henry Persons, and Charlotte Persons.<sup>11</sup>

On January 5, 1818, Thomas Persons, guardian of Henry and Charlotte Persons, "minors and orphans of Josiah Persons, late of Warren County, deceased," made bond. Other signatories of the bond were Turner Persons and Henry Peebles.<sup>12</sup>

The Land Lottery of Georgia for the year 1827 lists Rachel Persons as

the widow of a Revolutionary soldier.13

Rachel Persons was living as late as 1848, as on April 22nd of that year she deeded certain slaves to her "grandson, Thomas F. Persons, son of the late Thomas Persons."

In a division of the estate of John Persons in March, 1847, "Lucy Brantley, sister of John Persons, deceased," was one of the distributees. In a settlement, dated March 15, 1826, of the estate of her brother, Henry Persons, who died in 1824, she received her distributive share of the estate. Between 1820 and 1830 she and her husband removed to Monroe County, Georgia. County, Georgia.

Jephtha Brantley's will was probated July 4, 1836.<sup>21</sup> Devisees were his wife, Lucy; his daughters, Nancy Brantley and Frances Gibson; his grandchildren, who were the children of his daughter, Eliza Carter; his grandchildren, who were the children of his daughter, Louisa Carter. Legacy of the last mentioned was to be held in trust by Benjamin Brantley (his brother) and Churchill Gibson (his son-in-law).

The will of Lucy Brantley, dated June 29, 1854, was probated November 3, 1855.<sup>22</sup> Devisees were her grandson, Jephtha C. Carter, son of her daughter, Eliza Carter; her grandchildren, who were the children of her daughter, Frances,

wife of Wiley Hill; her daughters, Eliza and Frances.

Issue of Jephtha and Lucy (Persons) Brantley:

1. Nancy Brantley: born 1810-1815; never married. Her will, dated May 25, 1836, was probated September 27, 1836.<sup>23</sup> Devisees were her friend and neighbor, William B. Hill; her mother, Lucy Brantley; his sister, Frances Gibson; the children of her sister, Louisa Carter. Provisions were made that her brother-in-law, G. Washington Carter, was to receive nothing. Executors were Benjamin Brant-

ley and Churchill Gibson.

2. Frances Brantley: born 1811 in Warren County, Georgia. She was married first on December 24, 1835, in Monroe County to Churchill Gibson, and was the latter's second wife. He was first married on September 11, 1805, in Warren County to Mary Brantley, daughter of Philip (died 1824) and Mary Brantley. The will of Churchill Gibson, dated October 8, 1838, was probated November 19, 1838. Devisees were his wife, Frances; his children, Emily Frances Gibson, John Troup Gibson, Mary Antoinette Gibson, Frances Ann Gibson, Martha Ann Eliza Gibson, Thomas Jephtha Gibson, and Brantley Gibson. The will states that provisions have already been made for his sons, Henry Gibson and Allen Gibson, and his daughters, Epsey Reynolds and Elizabeth Randle. With the exception of Frances Ann and Thomas Jephtha, these were children of the first wife, Mary Brantley. Frances (Brantley) Gibson was married secondly on February 7, 1843, in Monroe County to Wiley Hill, born 1811. Issue of Churchill Gibson and his second wife, Frances Brantley:

# HOLLY BERRY PERSONS

(1765-1846)

and

### JOEL WALKER

(1756-1800)

Soldier of the American Revolution Planter of North Carolina and Georgia AND THEIR DESCENDANTS

DOEL WALKER, son of William and Jane (Bays) Walker, was born in 1756 in that part of Granville County, North Carolina, which in 1764 became Bute. When Warren and Franklin Counties were formed from Bute in 1779, his plantation was in Franklin County near the dividing line of the two counties. Also living in this area were his parents, Reverend William and Jane (Bays) Walker; his brother, Peter Walker; his wife's parents, John and Prudence (Jones) Persons; his wife's brothers, Francis, Jones, Josiah, Turner, and Amos Persons; Jacob Bass, Sr., whose son, Reddick Bass, married Obedience Persons; and Philip Wilhite, whose daughter, Rachel, married Josiah Persons.

Joel Walker served in General Greene's command in the American Revolution, and was in the Battle of Guilford Court House.<sup>3</sup>

In 1780 he married Holly Berry Persons, daughter of John and Prudence (Jones) Persons. She was born in Bute County, North Carolina, in 1765.

On July 27, 1787, Joel Walker sold to Benjamin Perry land "whereon

No. 378,000.

'It is believed that her given names were taken from surnames of ancestors, as were those of her brothers, Jones and Turner Persons.

Joel Walker now lives" on the south side of Great Shocco Creek in Franklin County, North Carolina. Witnesses were Jeremiah Perry and Charles Gant.

About 1788 Joel Walker and his family migrated to that part of Wilkes County, Georgia, which in 1793 became Warren, and it is possible that they spent a

short period in South Carolina.

On October 11, 1790, Joel Walker of Wilkes County, Georgia, purchased from Michael and Christiana Whatley 400 acres of land on Middle Creek in that part of Wilkes which later became Warren. Witnesses were Henry Peebles and Jones Persons. The deed was proved December 29, 1791, and recorded April 2, 1796.

Joel Walker is listed in the 1793 tax digest for Wilkes County, Georgia, 9

and in the 1794 tax digest for Warren.<sup>10</sup>

Joel Walker died in 1800, and Amos Persons is listed as administrator of his estate in the 1805 tax digest for Warren.<sup>11</sup>

Holly B. Walker is listed in the 1818 tax digest for Warren.<sup>12</sup> In all of these records the tax is for land on Middle Creek.

Holly Walker, widow, is listed in the Land Lottery of 1805<sup>13</sup> for Warren County.<sup>14</sup>

On April 21, 1819, Holly Berry Walker, and "Holly Berry Walker as guardian for Cynthia Walker, heiress of Joel Walker," deeded land to Persons Walker.<sup>15</sup>

On November 18, 1819, Robert A. Beal, Churchill Gibson, and Isaiah Tucker, as Commissioners appointed by the court, made a distribution of the personal estate of Joel Walker with the understanding that the residue of the estate would be divided at a later date. The distributees were Henry Hill, Jeremiah Perry, Joseph Wright, Persons Walker, Benjamin Brantley, Jr., Mrs. Holly Walker, Miss Nancy Walker, and Miss Cynthia Walker. 16

Holliberry Walker is listed in the 1820 Census of Warren County, in

which her age is given as over forty-five.<sup>17</sup>

Holly B. Walker is listed in the 1830 Census of Warren County, in which her age is given as between sixty and seventy. She is also listed in the 1845 State Census Returns for Warren County.

When her daughter, Cynthia (Walker) Brown, died in 1834, Holly Berry Walker took the former's children to live with her and reared them until her death, which occurred on November 26, 1846.

Both Joel and Holly Berry (Persons) Walker lie buried in the old Wil-

his family from Warren to Talbot County,<sup>25</sup> where he was a prominent planter, and his manner of living is said to have resembled that of a feudal lord. He owner simultaneously plantations in the counties of Warren, Early, Lee, Randolph, Stewart, Talbot, and Taylor.<sup>26</sup> He died "at half past eleven o'clock at night" on May 18, 1854, in Taylor County, and lies buried about ten miles from the town of Butler, where his grave, in accordance with the provisions of his last will and testament, is surrounded

by a stone wall enclosure sheltered by a shingle roof.

His will, dated March 16, 1850, was probated June 5, 1854, in Taylor County.<sup>27</sup> Devisees were his wife, Hannah Walker; his children, Freeman Walker, Nancy Cody, wife of Elias Cody, Persons Walker of Warren County, Amanda Caraker, Captain Lawrence Walker, Elizabeth Walker, Mary Walker, William Walker, George Washington Walker (under twenty-one years of age), and Philip Walker; his grand-children, Persons Williamson, William Allen Williamson, and Cary Walker, son of Allen Walker, deceased. Executors were his sons, Freeman Walker and Lawrence Walker, and his attorney, Allen T. Owen. Witnesses were Sanders W. Durham, William J. F. Mitchell, and Richard B. Rucker. Provisions were made "to support my family and educate my children in a proper manner suitable to their condition in life." Instructions were given for the distribution of lands in various counties, residences, slaves, stock, cattle, household goods, and money arising from the sale of crops.

Hannah Walker died February 20, 1860, and she lies buried beside her husband. Her will, dated July 13, 1859, was probated in March, 1860.28 Devisees were her children, Freeman Walker, Captain Lawrence Walker, Persons Walker, William Walker, George Walker, Mary Walker, Nancy Cody, Amanda Caraker, and Elizabeth Maxwell. Executor was her son-in-law, Daniel J. Caraker of the county of Talbot. Witnesses were C. R. Hays, John Howell, and W. W. Corbitt. Provisions were made

for the distribution of lands, slaves, money, stock, cattle, carriages, and crops.



AND HIS DESCENDANTS

URNER PERSONS, son of John and Prudence (Jones) Persons, was born April 26, 1766, in Bute County, North Carolina.

On September 22, 1789, Prudence Bass of Franklin County, North Carolina, deeded a two-year-old slave named James "to my son Turner Persons." Witnesses were Francis Person and Jones Person.<sup>3</sup>

During the decade following the Revolution, Turner Persons removed to that part of Wilkes County, Georgia, which in 1793 became Warren, and was one of the large land- and slave-owners of the area.

Between 1793 and 1818<sup>5</sup> he made twelve purchases of land in Warren County.<sup>6</sup> He was a grantor in two deeds of the same period.<sup>7</sup>

On November 28, 1793, he witnessed a deed for 231 acres in Greene County, Georgia, made by Drury and Martha Thompson to Jones Persons of Wilkes County. This deed was recorded June 8, 1795, in Hancock County.8

Turner Persons married on August 18, 1796, Sarah Williams, who was

born December 12, 1774, in North Carolina.

In the Georgia Land Lottery of 1805<sup>10</sup> Turner Persons (along with Jones,

Josiah, and Amos Persons) is listed for Warren County.11

When John Breed and William Dennis, residents of Warren County, moved farther westward, they had several of the leading citizens of Warren to sign a statement concerning their integrity and position in the community. Among the signatories was Turner Persons, Clerk of the Inferior Court. This document was dated December 20, 1806, and was made a part of their government passport to travel through Indian territory. 12

On March 15, 1815, Turner Persons of Warren County purchased from Jones Persons, Esquire, of Putnam County, 287½ acres in Jackson County (originally in Franklin County). The land was granted to Jones Persons by the State of Georgia on October 3, 1787,13 and was "bounded by land lately belonging to David Walker."

It was recorded December 17, 1815.14

Turner Persons assisted in the settlement of the estate of his brother, Josiah Persons.15

Turner Persons signed numerous instruments as Clerk of the Inferior Court of Warren County. Three of these are preserved at the Georgia Department of Archives and History, and bear the dates: November 18, 1794; November 17, 1797; October 21, 1799.

> On January 8, 1795, he signed an instrument as Justice of the Peace. From December 5, 1809, to October 22, 1813, he served as Justice of the

Inferior Court of Warren County.16

Two examples of his original signature (the first dated November 18, 1794, and the second dated April 18, 1811) are reproduced below:





His name appears on the early tax records of Warren County<sup>17</sup> and in the 1820 Census of the same county, in which his age is listed as over forty-five.<sup>18</sup>

Turner Persons died on his plantation in Warren County on October 11, 1827.<sup>19</sup> After his death, his widow removed to Alabama with her only unmarried daughter, Prudence, and settled in Russell County. She remained a woman of much wealth, even after plantations were distributed among her children. Her tombstone at Glennville, Alabama, bears the following inscription: "Mrs. Sarah Persons. Died Jan. 19, 1861. Age 86 years, 1 month and 7 days."

Anna Rebecca Persons,<sup>20</sup> a granddaughter of Sarah (Williams) Persons, wrote the following description of her: "She was about five feet, two inches tall, was inclined to be stout, and had snow-white hair, over which she wore a lace cap when I saw her. I visited Aunt Prudence when I was a small child. Aunt Prudence lived about

one mile from Grandma and I saw Grandma every day."

and served as Medical Director on General Bragg's Staff in the Army of Tennessee, Confederate States Army, from December 23, 1862, until February 13, 1864, when he was compelled to resign because of ill health; spent his last years at his home, "The Rock," where he died unmarried December 9, 1910.

Thomas N. Norwood,<sup>23</sup> writing of him, says in part: Robert T. Flewellen would have been a remarkable man in any community... Now and then, but rarely, a man appears with charming personal graces, ready wit, amiability, unblemished character, admired by all who see him, loved by all who know him ...—such was Bob Flewellen.

The following are excerpts from an obituary of Robert Turner Flewellen, published in a Houston newspaper (name and date not given) and now preserved by one of his descendants:

A well known and highly esteemed citizen of Houston died of pneumonia today. Dr. Flewellen had lived in Houston since 1875 and a few years after he represented this county [Harris County] in the legislature. He was a man of splendid in-

tegrity, great force of character, and was beloved by all who knew him . . .

Dr. R. T. Flewellen, Sr., was born Oct. 2, 1821 in Tuscaloosa, Ala., where his parents had moved in 1821. The following year his parents, James and Elizabeth Persons Flewellen, returned to Georgia, settling near the city of Macon, where his father died in 1829, leaving a wife and four children. The widow removed to Culloden in Monroe County, Georgia, where the deceased received his literary education and grew to manhood. He read medicine in the office of Dr. D. H. Hammond and Dr. John C. Drake of Thomaston, Ga. He attended a course of lectures in the Medical College of Charleston, S. C. and another in the Medical Department of the University of New York, graduating from the latter institution in the spring of 1845. Returning to Culloden he began the practice of medicine the following year, 1846, paying especial attention to orthopaedic surgery, then in its infancy as a branch of practice. In 1848, Dr. Flewellen was married to Miss Carrie Bivins and in 1850 he emigrated to California. In 1853 he removed to Texas and settled in Washington County as a planter; was elected to the House of Representatives from Washington County in 1859 and again in 1861 from the District of Washington and Fayette Counties. Having become a widower in 1854 he married in 1860 Miss Eugenia, second daughter of the late John D. and Eugenia Andrews of Houston. In 1872 he was elected to the Presidency of the Texas State Medical Association, of which body he long remained a member, and he presided at the Waco meeting in 1872. In 1875 he came to Houston and in 1878 was elected to represent Harris County in the legislature. It was he who introduced and secured the passage by the legislature of the first bill for the charter of a medical college in Texas; and he has ever advocated a high standard of professional character. . . .

James Persons Flewellen: son of James and Elizabeth (Persons) Flewellen; born March 1, 1828, in Warren County, Georgia; died April 21, 1909, in Charlottesville, Virginia. He entered the United States Military Academy at West Point. In his senior year, however, when he was loading a field cannon during practice, a classmate fired the cannon prematurely, causing him to be blind in one eye. No one conceived of his continuing at the Academy after such a disaster, but determined to complete his course, he learned his studies by having his classmates to read aloud to him, and on July 1, 1850, was graduated and commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant. Afterwards, he was on duty at Castle Pinckney and Fort Moultrie, South Carolina, at Fort McHenry, Maryland, and at Fort Monroe, Virginia. He was commissioned Major of Artillery, U. S. Army, was ordered to report to General Hebert at Galveston, Texas, and was placed in charge of conscript service with headquarters in Austin. He served under General Magruder, until bad health compelled him to resign on November 2, 1854.

Thomas M. Norton<sup>24</sup> says of him: James P. Flewellen had a strong, analytical mind. He went to West Point Academy. . . . He married a daughter of James

Everett of Houston County, the largest cotton planter in the state.

They will be long remembered for their numerous acts of philanthropy. These include the gift of the vocational school building to Monroe County, the first of its kind in the state, and generous contributions to the school system of Monroe County. The Mary Persons High School is named for their mother, and their liberality to Wesleyan College caused another building, Mary Persons Hall, to be named in her honor. Judge Persons, Forsyth Leader, Buried Monday.

Forsyth, Ga., Feb. 19—Judge George Ogden Persons, 78, one of Forsyth's foremost citizens, prominent in Georgia legal and political circles, extensive property owner and philanthropist, died Sunday at his residence here following an illness of several years.

... He served Monroe County for several terms and represented the 22nd Senatorial District, serving as President of the Senate. He was author of the Georgia parole law, the amendment to the State Constitution authorizing county taxation for general educational purposes and the Georgia "bone dry" law enacted in 1917.

He was appointed as Judge of the Superior Court of the Flint Judicial

He was appointed as Judge of the Superior Court of the Flint Judicial Circuit in 1923, serving in this capacity until 1946, when he resigned due to failing health.

With his brother, the late Robert T. Persons, he organized the Farmers Bank of Forsyth, and for years they were owners and operators of the Forsyth Cotton Mills.

The two brothers were generous in their gifts, especially in religious and

educational fields. They were vitally interested in the education and advancement of the youth of Monroe County, making possible the erection of the present high school, named for Mary Persons, their mother, herself a widely known educator. They built and gave to the school the present vocational educational building.

Judge Persons was a member of the Forsyth Methodist Church and served on the official boards of trustees and stewards. He was a Master Mason and a Knight of Malta.

Deeply interested in the Georgia Forestry Association, he especially supported the experiments of the late Dr. Charles H. Herty. He was a trustee of Wesle yan College. . . .

When General LaFayette made his triumphal return to America, he visited Georgia in 1825, and great honors were planned for him at the capital. The children were to scatter flowers in his path from the entrance-gate of the capitol grounds to the steps of the capitol building. The little boys were to form a line on one side of the walk, and the little girls on the other. Because of her unusual beauty, Ann Eliza Stanford, at that time eight years of age, was chosen to head the line. LaFayette arrived one Sunday during church services, and the news of his approach was greeted with much excitement. The entire congregation came out to give him an ovation, and the children formed lines along the walk, as had been planned. Lafayette seemed touched by this genuine welcome, and when he reached Ann Eliza Stanford, he was so overcome by her charm that he knelt and kissed her.

Thomas Stanford removed from Milledgeville to Culloden, Georgia, where his daughter, Ann Eliza, was married. The ceremony was performed by the bride's brother-in-law, Reverend Charles Hardy. The wedding was one of the most elaborate that had ever been seen in the state, and in the evening a formal dinner was served to more than three hundred guests. Descriptions of the numerous activities and of the bride's enormous trousseau have been preserved.

He graduated with high honors from both the Agricultural and Mechanical College (now Alabama Polytechnic Institute) and New York University, from which he received the M.D. degree. In a competitive examination for a commission as surgeon in the United States Navy, he ranked first in a group of sixty candidates. Not yet twenty-one years of age, he had to return home and wait several months before accepting the commission. After four months of training he was sent on his first tour of duty abroad, and was stationed for two years in Callao, Peru. 45 During the Spanish-American War he was Medical Director of Admiral Dewey's fleet at Manila. After the Battle of Santiago, he was in command of the Portsmouth Navy Yard, where his excellent treatment of the Spanish prisoners won the enduring gratitude of Admiral Cervera, commander of the Spanish fleet in Cuban waters. The latter made so favorable a report of the work of Dr. Persons that the Spanish government expressed its appreciation, and Maria Christina, Queen of Spain, 46 commanded that on a given Sunday prayers should be said in every church throughout Spain for the welfare of Dr. Persons and his family. Dr. Persons left Portsmouth to become Fleet Surgeon to Admiral Dewey in the Philippines, and established the first naval hospital at Cavite, the famous naval base guarding the approach to Manila. He remained on the islands as Fleet Surgeon to Admiral Remy, who succeeded Admiral Dewey in command of the Philippine Squadron, and served in the same capacity to the American Naval Detachment sent to China during the Boxer Rebellion. 47 After forty years of service, he retired from the Navy in 1912 with the rank of Rear Admiral. He died in Georgia, but was buried with military honors in Magnolia Cemetery at Auburn, Alabama. Dedience Persons, daughter of John and Prudence (Jones) Persons, was born in 1767<sup>2</sup> in Bute County, North Carolina, and died in 1855<sup>3</sup> in Warren County, Georgia.

She was married in Franklin County, North Carolina, to Reddick Bass, son of Jacob Bass, Sr., whose estate was settled in Franklin County, 1792-1796.

In 1795 Reddick Bass gave a receipt to Theophilus Bass for his share of the

estate of Jacob Bass, Sr. This receipt was witnessed by Prudence Bass.4

Some years following the Revolution, Obedience and Reddick Bass removed to Warren County, Georgia, where four of the former's brothers and sisters had already settled. They seem to have come slightly later than the other members of the group, since Reddick Bass is listed in the 1790 Census of Franklin County, North Carolina.

In the Georgia Land Lottery of 18056 Reddick Bass is listed for Warren

County.7

During the period of 1793 to 1817 Reddick Bass was a grantee in four deeds in Warren County, Georgia.8 His lands were on Middle Creek, adjoining those of the "Widow Walker."9

Reddick Bass is listed in the following tax records: 10

Wilkes County, 1793: 100 acres in Wilkes; Warren County, 1794: 100 acres in Washington;

Warren County, 1805: 356 acres on Middle Creek;

Warren County, 1818: more than 1,200 acres in Warren and adjoining

Reddick Bass is listed in the 1820 Census of Warren County, Georgia, in which his age is given as over forty-five.

Obedience Bass is listed in the 1830 Census of Warren County, Georgia, in which her age is given as between sixty and seventy.

The will of Reddick Bass, dated December 12, 1828, was recorded on March 21, 1829, in Warren County, Georgia. Devisees were "my beloved wife Obedience Bass" (the plantation on Middle Creek "whereon I now live," provisions having been made that it could not be sold until after her death, a list of furniture, cattle, and certain slaves); daughter, Nancy Bass, (money, certain slaves, furniture, cattle, and a mare named Chanteclair); granddaughter, Narcissa McTyeire, (certain furniture and a slave); grandson, Reddick McTyeire; son, Persons Bass; granddaughter, Nancy Fuller Bass; son, Buckner Bass; granddaughter Jane, the daughter of Buckner; daughter, Elizabeth McTyeire, (money and certain slaves); son, Larkin, (money and certain slaves). Executors were John Fontaine, Larkin Bass, and Kendal McTyeire. Witnesses were D. Dennis, Elijah Mallard, and John D. Gibson.

On October 18, 1854, Kendall McTyre requested a commission to determine whether or not Obedience Bass (at that time eighty-seven years old) was capable of managing her own affairs.

On December 9, 1854, Dr. A. J. Jones and a jury reported that Obedience Bass was not only of sound mind but that she had a better mind than most people of her age, and that she was quite capable of choosing an agent to attend to her business.

Persons Bass: son of Reddick and Obedience (Persons) Bass; born 1788<sup>14</sup> in Franklin County, North Carolina; removed, when a small child, with his parents to Warren County, Georgia; married Mary Ann Gibson, born 1798. She was the daughter of John Gibson, Revolutionary soldier of South Carolina, who removed to Georgia, and of his second wife, Susannah Fuller, widow of Spivey Fuller.

On January 6, 1823, Persons Bass made bond with Spivey Fuller, when the latter was appointed guardian of Elizabeth Gibson, orphan of John Gibson, "late

of Warren County, deceased."15

## AMOS PERSONS

(circa 1771-1815) Planter of North Carolina, Georgia, and Kentucky AND HIS DESCENDANTS

Mos Persons, son of John and Prudence (Jones) Persons, was born about 1771 in Bute County, North Carolina, and died in 1815 in Livingston County, Kentucky.

On September 22, 1789, Prudence Bass deeded to "my son Amos Persons" a plantation on the north side of Sandy Creek and several slaves with the provision that Amos Persons was "to have no authority, power or possession of either land or negroes till after my decease." Witnesses were Francis Person and Jones Person.3

Amos Persons removed to Georgia, and as early as 1798 was living in Warren County. He was a grantee in three deeds4 and a grantor in one deed5 in that county. On February 24, 1800, he was appointed a Justice of the Peace for Warren County.6 His name is written Amos Person in the appointment, but his original signature, reproduced below, bears the final s:

He is listed in the Georgia Land Lottery of 18057 for Warren County.8

His name appears on the tax records of 1805 for Warren County.º Immediately above his name on the tax list is that of Sterling Gardner (whose daughter he later married), and immediately below his own name he is listed again in his capacity as administrator of the estate of Joel Walker (his brother-in-law, who died in 1800).

Amos Persons married on April 8, 1806, in Warren County, Georgia, Mar-

Between 1808 and 1810 he removed with his family to Livingston County, Kentucky.<sup>10</sup>

The Livingston County tax books of 1813 show Amos Persons as owner of

540 acres of land on Byo Creek.

On January 16, 1815, Patsy Persons, widow of Amos Persons, was appointed administratrix of the estate of Amos Persons, and bond was fixed at twenty thousand dollars. In April, 1815, the court appointed a committee to survey 300 acres off of the Amos Persons estate for his widow, Patsy Persons, as her dower.

On August 21, 1815, the Livingston County Court appointed David Fort guardian for James Persons, Henry Persons, Cynthia Persons, and Betsy Persons, in-

fant children of Amos Persons, deceased.12

The will of Sterling Gardner, dated March 24, 1843, was recorded in 1848. Among the devisees were James T. Persons, Cynthia Joiner, and Elizabeth Hodge, heirs of "my daughter, Martha Persons." His wife, Sarah Moss, mentioned in the will, is not believed to be the mother of his children.<sup>14</sup>

born August 13, 1813, in Smithland, Kentucky, died August 8, 1878, in Cleburne, Texas.<sup>17</sup>

He is listed in numerous deeds both as a grantor and as a grantee in Livingston County, Kentucky. On January 30, 1836, he purchased from Richard Carrington two adjoining tracts of land, one containing 200 acres lying between Long Pond and Long Lake and the Ohio River, and the other containing 530 acres on the Ohio River.<sup>18</sup>

On June 30, 1840, James T. Persons was appointed a Justice of the Peace in Livingston County.<sup>19</sup>

In 1856 he removed with his family to Navarro County, Texas. On May 27, 1858, he purchased land from C. M. Winkler, who had secured it from the estate

of David B. Mitchell as the highest bidder on December 3, 1855.20

James Turner Persons died intestate on October 6, 1861.<sup>21</sup> On December 9, 1861, his widow, Catherine Persons, petitioned for power of administratix, and his heirs were listed as follows: Cynthia Phillips (formerly Cynthia Persons), widow of R. M. Phillips; Robert Persons; Sallie Berry, only child and representative of Sallie A. Berry (formerly Sallie Persons); Henry Persons; Martha Talley (formerly Martha Persons), wife of W. D. ## WILLIAM PERSON

Justice, Vestryman, Commissioner
Sheriff of Granville County
Lieutenant Colonel of Colonial Militia
AND HIS DESCENDANTS

WILLIAM PERSON, son of John and Mary (Partridge) Person, was born in 1700 in Isle of Wight County, Virginia, later lived in Surry County, migrated to North Carolina, and died November 11, 1770. In 1746 on the organization of Granville County, he became its first Sheriff. He was a Justice, County Commissioner, Vestryman, and Lt. Colonel of a Regiment of Granville Militia, of which William Eaton was Colonel. His name appears on a muster roll of the organization taken on October 8, 1754.

There are numerous deeds in his name in Granville County, and during the period from 1749 to 1760 he received in that county seven royal grants through Lord Granville.<sup>8</sup>

His will, dated October 22, 1764, was proved in May, 1771. Devisees were

his son, Benjamin Person, (certain slaves, horses, cattle, hogs, sheep, furniture, plantation materials, all money due him from any one, "all the lands I now possess on Stonehouse Creek or the branches thereof," including the manor plantation, two other tracts of land on Butterwood Creek containing 900 acres, part in Halifax and part in Bute); his son, William Person, (a tract of 500 acres of land on Ford Creek in Granville County); his daughter, Patty Person, (certain slaves and furniture); his daughter, Mary Anne Little, (certain slaves); his son, Thomas Person, (certain slaves, stock, plantation materials, and the plantation on Tar River in Granville County containing 640 acres, "being the land whereon he now lives"); his wife, Anne Person, (certain slaves and furniture). Executors and executrix were his sons, Thomas Person, William Person, and Benjamin Person, and his wife, Anne Person. Witnesses were John Edwards and Giles Duberry.

The will of Ann Person, dated April 10, 1781, was proved in August, 1781, in Warren County. Devisees were her son, Thomas Person, ("all that I was entitled to of my husband's estate"); her daughter, Martha Thorp, (certain slaves, horses, stock, furniture, and money); her daughter, Mary Little. Executor and executrix were her son, Thomas Person, and her daughter, Martha Thorp. Witnesses were Sam-

uel Thompson and John Mallard.

ciples of liberty and the magnamity of his character.

The will of William Person, dated March 21, 1778, with a codicil dated March 25, 1778, was proved in May, 1778, in Bute County, North Carolina. Devisees were his wife, Martha Person, (700 acres on Spanish Branch "whereon I now live," cer-

William Person: son of William and Eliabezth (Holman) Person; born February 24, 1794, in Warren County, North Carolina; died in January, 1865, in Shelby County, Tennessee, and is buried in Elmwood Cemetery. He brought to Shelby County the first cotton seed ever planted within its limits. This event has been considered important because it is said that the county has greater wealth grown exclusively from the seed in question than perhaps any equal area of country on the globe. With his father and brothers, William Person built the first grist mill that crushed corn in Shelby County. The historic building was located on Nonconnah Creek four hundred yards below the Hernando Road. William Person made sixty-five trips on horseback to and from his old home in North Carolina. His remaining time was devoted almost exclusively to research and reading, particularly in the field of botany. He had a deep love for trees of rare symmetry, of towering branches and rich foliage. He has been quoted as saying, while wandering over his broad acres, that in his eyes, there was more beauty, poetry and value in the grand old oaks that bent their boughs above his homestead than in the costliest abode. On the five thousand acres, which he owned in a single tract, he lived in a deep solitude upon which intrusions were rarely made except by servants. He gave generously to the poor and to numerous worthy causes. Toward the end of his life he was expelled from his home, which was plundered by Federal soldiers, and never recovered from the effects of personal maltreatment then endured.

Elizabeth Person:<sup>21</sup> daughter of William and Elizabeth (Holman) Person; born April 5, 1797, at her father's home, "The Oaks," about two miles from Warrenton, North Carolina; was educated at the old Plunkett School, where she was instructed in foreign languages, music and other esthetic subjects; on the death of her mother in 1813, went to live with a relative, the wife of Governor James Turner, where her education was continued under the guidance of a governess. She married Peter Mitchel, a Scotchman, and her father settled upon her (or rather entailed upon her future son<sup>22</sup>) a 3,000-acre plantation as a marriage gift. Here her husband built an attractive home, which he called "Elgin" in memory of his Scotch associations. His will, dated September 22, 1845, was recorded in Warren County, North Carolina.<sup>23</sup>

Thomas Person (a nephew of the General of the same name) and others over the estate of General Thomas Person.<sup>37</sup> This document is particularly valuable, since it states the exact relationships of the individuals concerned. The following are verbatim excerpts from that part of it which would be of genealogical interest:

Humbly complaining showeth unto your honor your oratrix Patty Taylor of the county aforesaid, sister and one of the heirs at law of the late General Thomas Person, decd. . . .

Your oratrix further shows that the said General Thomas Person died intestate and without issue in the year 1800, leaving two sisters Mary Anne Little and your oratrix, and the issue of a brother William, his heirs at law. That the issue of the said William are William Person, Thomas Person, Patty the wife of William Johnson, who are the children of the said William; Sarah, the wife of Benjamin Walker, and William Vaughan, the children of Sally daughter of said William; Patsy the wife of John Brodie, Polly the wife of Blount Hunter, and William P. Williams, children of Mary daughter of said William. That Mary Anne Little has died since the death of the said Thomas, leaving a son William P. Little, and William, George, and Jacob Blount, children of her daughter Penelope, her heirs at law. That some short time after the death of the said General Thomas Person, William Person his administrator . . . delivered to Benjamin E. Person, brother of the said William and Thomas, those [warrants] made in the name of Charles R. Éaton. . . . That the said Benjamin E. Person is since dead, leaving as his heirs at law two brothers the said William and Thomas, a sister Patty the wife of William Johnson, and the issue of two other sisters, towit, Sarah the wife of Benjamin Walker, and William Vaughan, children of his sister Sally; and Patty the wife of John Brodie, Polly the wife of Blount Hunter, and William P. Williams, who are children of his sister Mary.

Your oratrix further shows that she was covert of Major Francis Taylor, at the time of the death of the said General Thomas Person, and continued so until April 1816. That she has frequently called on the said Thomas to assign to the heirs

CHAPTER SIXTEEN

## THOMAS PERSON

(1733-1800)

Sheriff of Granville County Surveyor and Landed Proprietor of North Carolina Member, General Assembly and Provincial Congress Brigadier General, American Revolution

HOMAS PERSON, son of William and Ann Person, was born on January 19, 1733, in Surry County, Virginia, and removed with his parents to North Carolina, where he became a planter of Granville County and a surveyor for Lord Granville.

He married in Granville County on June 24, 1765, Joanna Thomas, who

was born on September 15, 1739.

Between the year 1761 and the end of the American Revolution, there are records of sixty-nine deeds in Granville County alone by which he acquired lands, among which are fourteen grants from Lord Granville. Following the Revolution, the grants to him from the State of North Carolina and the other deeds in his name are even more numerous. In the year 1788 he was by far the largest owner of land in Granville County, and had additional holdings in Warren, Franklin, Caswell, and Halifax Counties, North Carolina, and in Sumner and Greene Counties "on the Western Waters." In that year he was listed as owner of 82,358 acres of land, and probably had additional lands in other states.

<sup>1</sup>The career of General Thomas Person was one of such prominence, variety, and length that only the briefest summary of it can be given in this chapter. In view of their voluminous nature, it would be impractical to list all the documentary and published references to him that have been collected. The Colonial and State Records of North Carolina alone, for example, contain more than 1,300 references to him, and almost any history of North Carolina containing much detail about the eighteenth century tells something of Thomas Person.

He was Sheriff of Granville County in 1762, and represented the same county in the General Assembly and the Provincial Congress almost continuously from 17**64** to 1794.

When British abuse of the American colonies led to the Regulator Movement in North Carolina, Thomas Person was one of the leaders in this effort to secure a redress of grievances from the government. Although he did not participate in the Battle of Alamance, he was seized on the orders of Lord Tryon, the Royal Governor, and was imprisoned in Orange. One account states that he was placed in the custody of the Reverend George Micklejohn. Realizing that many of his valuables at his home were exposed to marauders and that certain papers would prove incriminating if found by Lord Tryon, Person promised his jailer that he would return by daybreak, if he would permit him to leave during the night. He was considered a man of such honor that his jailer consented, and Thomas Person rode a fast horse to "Goshen," his home in Granville. There he secured many bonds and much money in a brick kiln, removed from his desk stacks of papers, which he burned, and managed to return to Orange in time to keep his promise. On the following morning, when Lord Tryon's troops invaded his estate, they hacked open the desk,4 which was now devoid of any evidence, and in their further search found only the ashes of the papers they had hoped to seize. Tryon's officers then hastened to Hillsboro, where they demanded of Reverend Micklejohn whether or not General Person had left his prison bonds the night before. "I supped and breakfasted with the General," the minister replied.

Person is said to have been among those whom Tryon most feared, and when the latter offered amnesty to all the Regulators who would take the oath of allegiance to the king, he excepted Thomas Person and a few others. Person was in irons at Hillsboro for three weeks, and during that period when the executions were

taking place, he was marched under guard to the gallows and back again.

He survived this experience to become one of the early leaders in the American Revolution, and was appointed on April 22, 1776, Brigadier General.

Ten days preceding this appointment, North Carolina was the first of the colonies to make a formal proposal for a declaration of independence. Stephen B. Weeks<sup>5</sup> states that by sheer weight of character alone, General Person made himself a necessity to the colony and that this proposal was as much the work of Thomas Person as of any other man: No student of our history will dare claim that such an honor could belong by right of work done to any other man more than to Person or that any other citizen of our state was more worthy of this great and signal honor.

From this time forward, General Person's services to the state were almost incalculable. In 1775 he became a member of the Provincial Council, which body was the executive head of the state. He was appointed a delegate to confer with the Committee of Safety of Virginia, was a member of every important committee during the period of his service in the Provincial Congress from the beginning of the Revolution to the end, and was usually chairman of the committee. He was Chairman of the powerful Committee of the Whole, of the Legislative Committee, of the Committee on Privileges and Elections, and of the Committee to form a Bill of Rights and Con-

stitution for the State of North Carolina; was Commissioner on Building, on Capitol, on Certificates, on Navigation, and on Schools; was Referee on Fees, and nominee for the Federal Convention and for the United States Senate.

In the Convention of 1788, General Person was a leader of the anti-Federal party. Like Jefferson, he favored a federal government of limited powers, in order to protect the rights of the individual and the interests of the states. He was opposed to the Federal Constitution in the form which was proposed and finally adopted, because he feared that some day the government might abuse its power to tax. When the weight of numbers, however, caused it to pass, Person, "true to his convictions and game to the last, voted nay."

When the State of North Carolina was in need of money, he generously came forward with \$50,000, and his liberality toward the State University caused a hall to be erected at Chapel Hill (with the exception of Old East, the oldest on the


campus), which still bears his name.6

He had previously assisted in securing a charter for the University of North Carolina in 1789, and was a member of its first Board of Trustees from 1789 to 1795.

Two streets, one in Raleigh and one in Fayetteville, were named for him. In 1791 when a new county was formed from Caswell, it too was named in his honor. He died without issue on November 16, 1800,7 while on his return from Raleigh to "Goshen," his place in Granville, and was buried, at his request, at "Per-

His obituary was published in the Raleigh Register, November 25, 1800. The following description of "Goshen" was furnished a number of years ago by Mrs. Joseph Jonathan Davis (née M. Camilla Webb), a descendant of General Thomas Person's sister, Martha, whose branch of the family eventually owned this property: "Goshen" was a beautiful old homestead. It was a large wooden house with beautiful grounds and magnificent trees. Large sycamore trees were on each side of a long avenue of approach. The front yard proper was laid off in brick walks edged with boxwood on both sides. Quite recently the manor house was completely destroyed by fire. The family cemetery is nearby. The sycamore trees are all gone. Only a few large magnolias are still standing and watch faithfully over the family graves.



sonton," another of his estates near Littleton in Warren County.

His will was written by his friend, Justice Henderson of the North Carolina

Supreme Court, but was never found after his death.9

Much praise of his character has been written by his acquaintances and by later historians.

John Hill Wheeler<sup>10</sup> writes: Thomas Person is a name remarkable in our history for his indomitable resistance to tyranny and his devoted life of liberty.

Stephen B. Weeks<sup>11</sup> declares that he was always an argus-eyed guardian of the rights of the people, and that no form of what he thought injustice, illegality

or graft could escape his quick eye or pass without a protest.

Colonel William L. Saunders<sup>12</sup> says of him: He was one of the most remarkable men of the times... was a Church of England man, a generous friend of education, a man of strong sense, the owner of large estates, and of the highest social position... And today North Carolina bears in her bosom the bones of no purer patriot than those of Thomas Person.
