FOREWORD

Since publication of the limited first edition of the same title in 1941 much new and interesting information has come to light about the early generations that ought to be recorded and preserved for posterity. The evidence and documentation appearing in the second edition should assist the amateur or professional genealogist who may be interested in further research in any of the many related branches of the Johnson family.

Great care has been exercised in the compilation of the information contained in the book but no claim is made of infallibility. The author will welcome receiving any corrections or additional information that should have been included had they been known.

The genealogical charts in the back of the book extend into the eleventh generation for some families. Many other names of today's generations will not be found, however- an omission that was not intentional but dictated by the urgency of time, of which man has a limited allocation in a lifetime. The compelling need was to record the past and forge a link of the past with the present and future generations. This has been done.

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PREFACE

Sarah (Cook) Johnson was an intrepid Quaker who, in widowhood, brought her five children from Isle of Wight County, Virginia to Henry County, Indiana in 1833. Three of her sons grew up to be successful farmers and community leaders in religious and educational activities. If you or any of your ancestors bear the name Johnson and live or lived in Indiana, you may be one of their many descendants.

Sarah Johnson's maiden name was Cook and she was born in 1788. She married Laban Johnson of Isle of Wight County, Virginia on August 26, 1809 when she was about twenty-one years of age. Laban died in 1827 leaving her with five children. One was just a baby.

After the death of her mother-in-law, Patience (Johnson) Johnson, in 1832 she made ready to move to Indiana where there was fertile land and opportunity. So, with her five children and some relatives and neighbors they began the long journey later in 1832 or early 1833 traveling by horse and wagon over The Wilderness Road and bringing their few possessions and supplies.

The trip required several weeks. After their arrival they were received in the Milford Friends Meeting, Henry County, Indiana on transfer from Western Branch Meeting, Nansemond County, Virginia on March 23, 1833.

The story in this book begins with Robert Johnson who brought twenty-three immigrants to Virginia in 1681 and continues through six generations. It includes genealogical charts into the eleventh and twelfth generations for some branches of the family.

The story before 1681 is waiting for you to write.

INTRODUCTION

When I was a boy on a farm near Decatur, Indiana, my father, Oliver T. Johnson, often told me of his father, Robert Cook Johnson and bits of family history and traditions. These stories completely fascinated me and aroused my curiosity and hunger for more information about the family history. In answer to my questions he could tell me much about his parents and close relatives. He also knew that his grandfather, Laban Johnson had died in Isle of Wight County, Virginia and that his grandmother, Sarah (Cook) Johnson then brought her children to Henry County, Indiana in the early eighteen hundreds.

We lived about eighty-five miles from father's brothers and sister. About every second year we would get on the Clover Leaf train to go for a visit with them. Despite the distance the members of my father's family were close in affection. They seemed to radiate a cheerfulness and friendliness which was perhaps inherited from their father who was a farmer and minister among Friends. I was impressed by the reverence with which they always spoke of him.

It has always been a source of regret that I did not ply them with the questions that I had then and those that have since arisen. Fortunately cousin, John Wilmer Johnson, had an inquiring mind and an interest in the family history. He has recorded current history well for the later generations. Any contribution I have been able to make about the earlier history is largely due to the initial work that he did and the inspiration that he provided.

During these intervening years the responsibility of making a living and rearing a family has not dampened my desire for further research but it did limit my time available until retirement in 1966.

Some progress was made during these many years. In 1936 my wife and I drove to Isle of Wight County, Virginia to do some exploratory work which proved to be quite fruitful although we could spend only two days there. First we visited Isle of Wight Courthouse, the county seat. The town consists of a courthouse, county clerk's office, jail, school, a small general store, a church and a few houses. The clerk's office, built in 1800, contains a vault in which the records are stored. Their records are the oldest and most complete of any in that part of the state as they escaped destruction during the Civil War by being buried underground.

Mr. Edwards, clerk, was accommodating and allowed us to examine all records. Those of births and deaths are incomplete and gave little information. The records of deeds and wills, however, yielded an enormous amount of information which made it possible to link back the family line definitely to the year 1681 when Robert Johnson was granted 2,150 acres of land for transporting 23 persons to Virginia. A copy of the grant appears in Part II of this book.

Since then, we have been able to corroborate much of the information from other sources and to add many points of detail and interesting facts and dates. The works of William Wade Hinshaw, Willard Heiss and others who have compiled digests of Quaker Meeting records have been especially helpful. In answer to specific questions, correspondents have helped immensely.

Even back in the seventeenth century there were many other Johnsons about whom much has been written and attempts made to connect some of them with our line. In the absence of substantial evidence of their connection with our line, none of these have been included. It is hoped that further research will provide the evidence necessary to carry the line back further.

Genealogical research can be a rewarding pursuit to him who has a feeling of kinship with the countless generations of which he is one in the infinite history of mankind.

Aside from any academic interest we may have in the family history, we should be interested in the Quaker heritage that for so many generations nurtured those qualities of character, faith and reverence for the divine that must leave its influence on your life and mine.

Living in accordance with the guidance of the inner light has not always been easy when persecution was suffered or when existed social customs, such as slavery, repugnant to the sense of decency among men of good will or when Mars strode over the land invoking the help and blessing of the Lord for the destruction of our fellowmen.

The chapters that follow will tell something of the history of six generations beginning in 1681 in the country of Captain John Smith and ending two hundred years later in Indiana. One hundred and fifty-five of these years was the length of their sojourn in Virginia.

PART I

QUEST INTO THE DIM MISTS OF THE PAST

CHAPTER I

SEARCH FOR THE FIRST JOHNSON (OF OUR LINE) IN AMERICA

A genealogical record ought to have a good beginning place. At least we would like to know who was our first ancestor in America. From that point we would, of course, want to work back to establish his antecedents and their native country. Unfortunately, the longer we work back, the more uncertainties and risky assumptions are likely to arise unless the family has been one for which reliable records were kept over the generations.

One of the difficulties in tracing our line has been the fact that there were so many Johnson who came to the Virginia colony from its founding by Captain John Smith in 1607. Another difficulty has been that Robert was such a favored first name with no assistance from middle names, the use of which was not common in those days. So when the name Robert Johnson is encountered we have to learn which Robert Johnson it was that we wish to identify.

The study of wills has been one of the most reliable means of identification because they usually mention the names of children, wife and sometimes parents, grandchildren or other relatives. Other helpful sources are early records of marriages, land deeds, abstracts of title, obituaries, and records of Friends meetings.

The first place to start looking for clues, though, is in the libraries. There are many publications that provide information derived from original records. Let's look at some of this information.

Our history books tell us that Captain John Smith founded a colony at Jamestown, Virginia in 1607. The remains of this site can still be seen on an island off the north bank of the James River about six miles from Williamsburg, James City County. Surry County lies across the river and further down the river, towards Portsmouth, lies Isle of Wight County.

Captain John Smith saw to it that records were kept and reports issued so that his superiors in England would be kept informed. John Rolfe was charged with the responsibility apparently. Several Johnsons were mentioned in the early accounts but we have found no evidence that any of those mentioned was an ancestor in our line. It is possible that more research may establish a connection which some authors have apparently stated as a fact but have offered no documentary evidence to substantiate their belief so far as is known. Some of the names mentioned in the colony's reports will be given as of interest but subject to the understanding that they are not a part of our line or related thereto insofar as known to this date.

In England, one Alderman Robert Johnson (son-in-law of Sir Thomas Smith who died 9-4-1625), later sheriff of London, held an interest of five shares in the Virginia Company. He was also a member of the Bermuda and other companies and was active in mercantile affairs. In 1609 he published a pamphlet, *Nova Britannia*, as a means of arousing interest in the Virginia Company. As a result of his petition to the king to take over the under-financed company, the king did so and on July 15, 1624, appointed a fifty-five member board, which included Alderman

Robert Johnson, to administer the colony. He also wrote about the laws of Virginia, directed the Virginia Magazine, favored self government for the colony and was influential in the Bermuda Company of which he was later made governor.

Apparently, Alderman Robert Johnson visited the Virginia Colony in 1619 as evidenced by the fact that John Rolfe, in his accounts of "Sailings to Virginia" reported that in 1619 the "Margaret and John," a vessel of 150 tons, arrived after being attacked by two Spanish ships near the Island of Gaudaloupe which were beaten off after fierce fighting. The passenger list included,

Sir Robert Johnson
Mr. Robert Johnson, Alderman
Thomas Johnson

Rolfe also reported that in 1619 eleven ships brought over 1,216 persons to Jamestown including,

William Johnson, labourer
William Johnson, goldsmith

On January 6, 1634 Abram Johnson, age 27, sailed for St. Chrystopers and the Barbadoes, it was reported.

On April 3, 1635, a Robert Johnson, age 26, sailed on the "Peter Bonaventure" bound for the Barbadoes.

In August 1635, the following persons were among those who sailed on the "Thomas" (Henry Taverner, Mr.) after having "been examined by the Minister of Gravesend touching their conformitie in our religion, etc.":

Robert Johnson, age 27
Alice Johnson, age 22
Eliza Johnson, age 18

It is possible that our Robert Johnson who settled in Isle of Wight County in 1681 could have been a son or grandson of one of the above. Or, he may have been a later arrival or descendant of one of the many Johnsons who arrived later. We do not know.

Much of the information about Robert Johnson, Alderman is found in Charles M. Andrews, The Colonial Period of American History, Vol. 1, The Settlements. According to Andrews, the early years of growth of the Virginia colony were erratic due to the ravages of disease, wars with the Indians and discouraged people who left the colony. Some figures (p. 134) as to population were:

The practice of granting land to men who would bring immigrants is interesting. Andrews (ibid.) reports that from 1619 to 1623 there were forty-four land patents issued to patentees who bound themselves to transport settlers and equipment to the colony. Many of these grants were never taken up.

The earliest such settlement was "Smith's Hundred" established in 1617. It was later renamed "Southampton Hundred" after the earl of Southampton. It consisted of 80,000 acres on the north side of the James River. Sir George Yeardley was its governor and captain.

Another large grant was in 1618 to Richard Martin for 7,000 acres seven miles down the north side of the James River.

In 1619, Berkeley Hundred was founded with thirty-five people. In the same year a grant was allocated for the Pilgrims consisting of a patent for land and also five hundred pounds of money to be used for the education of their children. When it was learned that they had, because of an error in navigation, landed in New England, the money was given to the Southampton company.

It was not until 1681 that the Robert Johnson, our ancestor, received title to 2,150 acres of land for transporting the twenty-three persons from overseas.

In the study of early Virginia records some trouble is encountered in identifying places because of name changes or boundary changes. Some of the major ones will be given.

In 1637, Warrosguyooke County became Isle of Wight County.

In 1749, Southampton County was carved out of a part of Isle of Wight County and Nottoway Parish.

Even more confusion will be encountered in attempting to identify pieces of real estate because it was quite common to give the metes and bounds in the legal description, measuring with reference to a white oak tree to a rock to somebody else's line and so forth. Possibly local surveyors or abstractors have a means of tracing such properties from their records.

OUR QUAKER HERITAGE

A history of the Johnsons of Isle of Wight County would not be complete without a chapter on Quakerism, the faith of many generations of Johnsons.

George Fox, founder of the Society of Friends was born July 1624 in Fenny-Drayton, Leicestershire, England. At the age of 19 he dedicated himself to meditation and the search for spiritual truth. In 1648 he began his missionary work. Despite many periods of imprisonment for his activities, the movement grew. In 1670 he journeyed to Jamaica and the American colonies. He died in 1691 and was buried in the Friends' burial grounds at Whitecross Street, London. He is said to have visited the Virginia colony in 1672 and attended Pagan Creek Meeting on November 5, 1672 and also Somerton Meeting at Box Elder near Holland, Va. and Chuckatuck Meeting, both in Nansemond County. Apparently his visit gave great stimulus to the movement that was already started, probably in 1656 and 1657. Elizabeth Harris is said to have been the first to preach Quakerism in Virginia in 1656. In 1657 Josiah Coole of Bristol and Thomas Thurston of Gloucestershire also preached and probably started the movement. (Ref. W. C. Dunlop-Quaker Education, 1936)

The records do not reveal whether the Johnsons embraced Quakerism before or after they settled in Virginia. If they came before 1648, they would not have come as Quakers; if they came after 1647 they might have been Quakers already. The more likelihood is that they or a later generation became converts in Virginia. A third generation (as designated in this book) Robert Johnson was evidently a member of the Society of Friends as he willed land for their meeting house. The records of Friends Meeting are replete with Johnson names from the third generation and later.

We also know they were Quakers at the time of their emigration to Indiana. Even to this day many have kept the faith while others have drifted away by reason of marriage into other denominations or for other reasons. In the early part of the twentieth century it was not uncommon to meet with older people in plain Quaker garb and to hear them converse in a simple language enriched by words such as thee, thy, thine, thou.

Simplicity in religious practice was also retained and it was with sorrow that they saw the younger generation adopt the use of musical instruments in their meetings. Gradually the old ways have passed away, but the principles and influence still live today.

Most of the Friends who settled in Indiana appear to have been of the Orthodox or Pastoral branch, the Hicksite faction with Unitarian learnings and insistence on doctrinal freedom for each individual having separated in 1827. Friends of both branches have much in common such as their historic opposition to slavery and war, their advocacy of fair treatment of the Indians, their humanitarian efforts during the Civil War and in relief work during and after the two World Wars. In outward appearance, the chief difference lies in their form of worship, the Hicksites adhering to the silent form without clergy; the Orthodox having pastors and a somewhat more formal order of worship similar to Protestant churches in general. In 1951 there were about 100,000 members in

the Orthodox branch and 17,800 in the Hicksite General Conference. (Ref: The American Peoples Encyclopedia)

William Wade Hinshaw, Encyclopedia of American Quaker Genealogy, Vol. VI, Virginia, contains a map of the early Quaker Meetings. The following list, taken from that map, shows the names of most of the meetings in Isle of Wight and adjacent counties south of the James River.

In 1936 the Somerton meeting house was visited by the author and his wife. Over the entrance appeared these words,

Somerton Friends Meeting
Established 1672

Beside the meeting house was a small cemetery with a few toombstones of fairly recent origin. Only one bore the name Johnson and it read,

Junius Johnson
October 6, 1862 - November 22, 1922
"He was loyal to his friends"

The meeting house was at a small place called Box Elder which was comprised mostly of a frame general store, a house, schoolhouse and the meeting house.

Mr. Raiford, owner of the general store and also clerk of the Friends Meeting, said that George Fox was said to have preached there. This is borne out by W. C. Dunlop, Quaker Education in Baltimore and Virginia Yearly Meetings, who states that George Fox visited Somerton in 1672.

Mr. Raiford also said that the old records of Somerton Meeting had been transferred to the Baltimore archives long ago.

During the course of an interview, Milton Johnson, a monument maker in Suffolk, in 1936 said there used to be a Quaker Meeting House known as the Johnson

meeting about 4½ miles south of Windsor and that many Johnsons had lived in that community. All traces of the meeting house seem to have disappeared. He also stated that he remembered his father, John Aikin Johnson (1818-1902) used to talk of Laban Joanson whose widow came to Indiana in 1833.

Mr. and Mrs. J. V. Hare, Quakers of Holland, Va. were also interviewed in 1936. Mrs. Hare's maiden name was Raiford. She was a Johnson descendant. She stated that a William Johnson left there in 1830 and settled near Carthage, Indiana where he married her aunt, Sarah Harris.

So, in this section of Virginia where so many Quaker families lived for several generations and meetings increased in numbers, there is now little tangible evidence that remains. Their buildings and meeting houses have suffered the ravages of time and change; their family or community burial lots unmarked and forgotten. The hundreds who left during the first part of the nineteenth century went to Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Iowa and other states to start new lives and to build for the future. They brought with them memories from the 151 years or more of life in Virginia but these, too, gradually faded into oblivion. If there were any written records, they must have perished during the pioneer years of hardship and toil. It is the aim of this book to bring to life that which has been forgotten insofar as that is possible.

The story we have to tell begins with the Robert Johnson who was granted 2,150 acres of land in 1681 for bringing over 23 settlers. Since there are so many Johnsons and Robert Johnsons it will help to use Roman numerals to denote to which generation each belongs. In the case of a son bearing the same given name as his father, an arabic number will be assigned. It should be understood that these numbers were not used by them as part of their names.

A separate chapter will follow for the first five generations who lived in Virginia. These five chapters are in Part II and are designated as follows:

CHAPTER I

ROBERT JOHNSON (1875) & 1814 & 1753 GENERATION I

This Robert Johnson is the first of our line that we have been able to trace with reasonable certainty as being an ancestor to our line of Johnsons. Indisputable evidence indicates that there may have been one or two earlier generations in the Virginia colony. He settled in Isle of Wight County, Virginia. Hugh S. Johnson, Jr. gives the year of birth as 1684 which means he could have been 22 or 29 at death in 1753. A long life for those times.

He married Katherine _____ and later Ann _____. To these unions were born the following children, according to his will.

Ref: Isle of Wight County Book of Wills, Vol. 1, page 345. Date of will September 4, 1732. Proved May 22, 1733. The marriages of the children are uncertain as to name and date, possibly belonging to other Johnsons of similar names in same place.

HISTORY

The Johnson family arrived in the seventeenth century. Robert Johnson received 2150 acres of land in 1681. He died in 1753 in which he named 3 or 4 sons and other children. The son James died in 1745 leaving sons, Robert and others. Captain James Johnson of the Revolution was of this family. Captain Johnson was a member of the House of Delegates in the Convention of 1788. A possible ancestor of the county clerk until 1845 and is said to have served on the bench of magistrates longer than any other person in the history of the county. He died August 20th, 1845 aged 81, the last survivor of the Revolution of 1783.

One of his descendants is Captain Albert S. Johnson who served in the Ninth U.S. Volunteer Infantry in the Spanish American War and was adjutant clerk for many years. (Great Britain, page 229)

CHAPTER 3

ROBERT JOHNSON (1ST) b. 1644 ? d. 1733 GENERATION 1

This Robert Johnson is the first of our line that we have been able to trace with reasonable certitude as being an ancestor to our line of Johnsons. Inconclusive evidence indicates that there may have been one or two earlier generations in the Virginia colony. He settled in Isle of Wight County, Virginia. Hugh B. Johnston, Jr. gives the year of birth as 1644 which means he would have been 88 or 89 at death, an unusually long life for those times.

He married Katherine _____ and later Ann _____. To these unions were born the following children, according to his will.

HISTORY

"The Johnson family arrived in the seventeenth century. Robert Johnson patented 2150 acres of land in 1681. He made his will in 1733 in which he named a son James and other children. The son James died in 1746 leaving sons James, Robert and others. Captain James Johnson of the Revolution was of this family. Captain Johnson was a member of the House of Delegates in the Convention of 1788, a presiding magistrate of the county court until 1843 and is said to have served on the bench of magistrates longer than any other person in the history of the county. He died August 16th, 1845 aged 91, the last survivor of the historic convention of 1788.

One of his descendants is Captain Albert S. Johnson who served in the Fourth U/S Volunteer Infantry in the Spanish American War and was county clerk for many years." (From Boddie, page 229)

"Robert (x) Johnson and wife Katherine sell to Wm. Bush pat. of 2150 acres, 12 Jan. 1692. Wm. Dull, Elmer Johnson" (From Boddie, page 607)

The 2150 acres of land mentioned above was situated near the head of Corowaugh Swamp and was given to him by the Deputy-governor in compensation for bringing over from England what is described in the deed as "twenty-three persons & c."

The following is a copy of the grant taken from a typed copy furnished by the Virginia Land Office to the author on February 10, 1940. It reads:

To all &c. Whereas &c. Now Know yee that I the sd. Sr. Henry Chichely Knt. Depty. Gouvernor &c. give & grant unto Robt. Johnson of the Isle of Wight County Two Thousand one hundred fivety Acres of Land scituate neer the head of Corowaugh Swamp in the County aforesd. bounded, Beginning at a live oake at the head of a branch being a Corner tree of Arth, Allen & Robt. Horneings land thence by their line south two hundred and fowerty Eight pole to a pine in the County line thence along the County line south west by West fower hundred & Eight pole to a white oake then North West by West fower hundred twenty fower pole to a smale saplin pine in Rich. Booths line & soe by Booths line North East two hundred & fivety pole to a pine & by Tho. Holders line the same Course three hundred & twenty pole to a lightwood stump & smale oake saplin thence East one hundred pole to a smale wight oake then North East one hundred & twenty pole to a white oake then North twenty nine degrees Westerly twenty six pole to a red oake thence East by North two hundred & fowerty pole to a red oake then South Twenty nine degrees Easterly one hundred & fowerty pole by Mr. John Bryan land to his old Corner tree then by his old lines West by South Two hundred & fowerty pole to a red oake South South East one hundred & Eight pole to a red oake & East North East Eighteen pole to the first station. The sd. land being due to the sd. Johnson by & for the Transporation of twenty three persons &c. To have & to hold &c. To be held &c. Yeilding & paying &c. provided &c. dated the 23th Aprill 1681.

Unexplained is the fact that the names listed in the deed actually total twenty-four. The land lies in Isle of Wight County Virginia which was called Warrosguyooke County prior to 1637.

The land was held only eleven years and then sold January 12, 1692 to Wm. Bush. The only other information yet available regarding Robert Johnson was that he died in 1733, it is believed, as that is the date of his will as hown by the Isle of Wight County Book of Wills, Vol. 3, page 345. The will was made September 4, 1732 and probated March 28, 1733. The names of his children appear in the will.

Sir Henry Chichely who made the foregoing grant served as acting governor of Virginia 1680-1681, succeeding Thomas, Lord Culpeper successor to Governor Berkeley. Sir Henry was a Royalist soldier of the English Civil War and was appointed by Governor Sir William _____ in 1676 to lead a punitive expedition against the Indians. The governor, however, made peace with the Indians. This information appears on pages 374 and 392 of "The Southern Colonies in the Seventeenth Century 1607-1689" by Wesley Frank Craven and published by Louisiana State University Press, The Littlefield Fund for Southern History of the University of Texas, 1949. Editors were Wendell Holmes Stephenson of Tulane University and E. Merton Coulter, University of Georgia.

The same source (pages 83,111,117) mentions a Robert Johnson who published a tract in 1681 entitled "New Life of Virginia, declaring the former succeesse and present estate of that plantation, being the second part of Nova Britannia - an exploration of renewed hope and faith" (William Welby,printer).

On page 83 appears a statement that a Robert Johnson was Deputy Governor of the Virginia Company while Sir Thomas Smith was Governor both of the Virginia and Bernuda Companies. Whether or not this Robert Johnson was the same who received the grant of 2,150 acres of land is subject to question. No evidence on this question has been found by the present writer.

CHAPTER 4

ROBERT JOHNSON, 2ND b. _____ d. _____ 1766 GENERATION II
(OUR LINEAGE)

Robert Johnson, 2nd was the son of Robert Johnson, 1st (1644-1733) and Katherine _____ Johnson, his father's first wife, it is believed, rather than the second wife, Ann _____.

In 1737 he married Martha Jones, daughter of Thomas Jones. After her death he married Prescilla _____. It is presumed the children were from the first marriage. He lived in Isle of Wight County, Virginia where the Book of Wills, Vol. 7, page 424, part 2 (1759-1769) records his will dated January 4, 1761, his estate inventoried November 6, 1766 and his will probated August 7, 1766. The children mentioned in his will were:

Robert, 3rd, Lazarus 1st and Jesse.

Lazarus Johnson 1st, of our line, married Mary Outland on August 15, 1747. He died in 1800. See the next chapter for his history.

COLLATERAL LINES

Robert Johnson 3rd married Christian Outland in 1744. He died in 1787. He is not in our line of descent. His children were Elijah b. 1747 (who married (1) Mary Winslow and later (2) Phoebe _____), Christian b. 1750 (married Joseph Duck in 1787), and Jean or Jane b. 1752.

Elijah had twelve children, one of whom was Zachariah whose wife (or widow) Susanna and daughter, Almeda, were received in Milford Monthly Meeting on May 28, 1831. Members of the family later transferred to Walnut Ridge Meeting, Sugar River and Salem Meetings. A son, Richard came from Sugar Creek, Ohio, Meeting.

No information has been found about Jesse.

CHAPTER 5

LAZARUS JOHNSON 1ST, b. _____ d. 1800 GENERATION III

Lazarus Johnson was the son of Robert and Martha (Jones) Johnson. He lived in Isle of Wight County, Virginia and married Mary Outland, on August 15, 1747, according to the Minutes Book of the Pagan Creek Quaker Meeting, page 11. His eight children were:

All these children were named in his will.

Lazarus lived in Isle of Wight County, Virginia. The text of his will recorded in the Isle of Wight County, Virginia Book of Wills, Volume II, page 243, definitely proves the lineal relationship between him, his son Robert and his grandson Laban, when read in connection with the will of his son Robert. Robert's will bequeathed "to my son Laban Johnson by the consent of my father Lazarus Johnson fifty acres of land on the West side of Carrywaugh Swamp joining of Johns Ducks line." The will of Lazarus bequeathed "to my son Lemuel Johnson to pay unto my grandson Laban Johnson the sum of fifteen pounds in lieu of fifty acres of land that his father gave him by my consent in his testament this land being my property." The son Robert died eleven years before the death of Lazarus, his father.

The will of Lazarus, as recorded, shows the executors of the will were Lazarus (probably a son), Elisha (probably a son), and May (or Mary, probably his widow). Witnesses were Abraham Johnson, John Johnson, Dempsey Johnson, and Zachariah Johnson. The will was dated 8/5/1798 and probated 4/7/1800 by his sons Lazarus and Elisha. The inventory of his estate was recorded July 3, 1800. Probably the son Joseph was the one mentioned as one of the executors in son Robert's will.

The First United States Census (1790) lists the name of Lazarus Johnson as having 7 whites and 7 blacks. Apparently the 7 whites were the living children, Robert having died in 1789. Elijah (probably Elisha) was listed as having 7 whites and 2 blacks, and Joseph as having 6 whites and 1 black.

Information about Robert, son of Lazarus and father of Laban Johnson appears in the next chapter.

COLLATERAL LINE

Lazarus' son, Joseph: not our lineage).

Joseph, another son of Lazarus Johnson married Martha _____.

The first United States Census (1790) shows that Joseph had six whites and one black.

According to Joseph's will (Vol. 14, page 80) dated February 28, 1815 and probated January 1, 1816, Joseph's children were,

The witnesses to his will were Lazarus Johnson (probably his brother), Lemuel (probably his brother) and Abel Johnson (probably the son of his deceased brother, Robert).

Executors named in the will were Timothy D. Johnson (son) and Martha Johnson (wife).

Lazarus 2nd (not in our lineage):

Lazarus 2nd, another son of Lazarus and Mary (Outland) Johnson married Mary Hunnicutt on November 17, 1787. The minutes of the Black Water Monthly Meeting of December 15, 1787 show that Lazarus produced a certificate from Western Branch Monthly Meeting, Nansemond County, Va. On January 19, 1788 Lazarus was reported married to Mary Hunnicutt. Apparently Lazarus and his wife returned to Western Branch Monthly Meeting where their names appear frequently.

On April 25, 1767, Lazarus 2nd and Robert (possibly his brother who died in 1789, eleven years before the death of their father) and their wives served on a committee. This is the first time their names appear in the Western Branch records.

The record of July 25, 1767 says that Lazarus 2nd of Isle of Wight County, Va. was granted a certificate excusing him from military service. Under date of September 26, 1767 appears a statement that Lazarus suffered for priests' demands.

The records from 1800 to 1803 indicate that Mary (widow of Lazarus, 1st or wife of Lazarus 2nd) was prominent in affairs of Lower Quarterly Meeting (Western Branch).

On October 25, 1806 Lazarus 2nd represented Somerton meeting at the Western Branch Monthly Meeting. On February 24, 1816 the record reads that Lazarus

Johnson and Joel Cook were to supervise an addition to the Johnson Meeting House. According to the map, the Johnson and Somerton Meeting Houses were a few miles apart.

Because of the refusal of Lazarus 2nd to report for muster in military activities he was penalized by fines and having his property seized by the Sheriff's office as recorded in the minutes for April 22, 1809.

On October 25, 1817 Lazarus 2nd received a certificate as an elder and on November 6, 1817 he and Wm. Porter are mentioned as being on a religious trip to North Carolina.

On September 22, 1832 Lazarus Johnson 2nd and his wife requested a certificate of removal to Milford Monthly Meeting, Wain County, Ohio. The certificate was forwarded in December 1832.

CHAPTER 6

ROBERT JOHNSON b. _____ d. 1789 (OUR LINEAGE) GENERATION IV

Robert Johnson was the son of Lazarus 1st and Mary (Outland) Johnson and the brother of Joseph, Jesse, Priscilla, Cornelius, Elisha, Lazarus 2nd and Lemuel. The date of his birth is not known. He was born in Isle of Wight County, Va. and married Patience Johnson, a daughter of Abraham Johnson, (Sr.) and sister of Abraham Johnson (Jr.). (Possibly Patience was a descendant of the Abraham Johnson who died in 1748 and was a brother of her husband's grandfather.)

To this union were born,

Abel

Laban b. 1788 d. 1827 m. Sarah Cook, 8/26/1809

Martha

Robert's will gives convincing proof that Lazarus Johnson 1st was the father and that Laban was his son. The inventory of his estate appears in Volume 10, page 162 of the Book of Wills as filed on September 17, 1789. His will which appears in the same place was dated January 1, 1789 and was probated September 3, 1789. The inventory of the estate was recorded September 17, 1789.

The records of Western Branch Monthly Meetings mentions the name, Robert Johnson, six times during 1767, 1768 and 1769. Some of the events may have applied to this Robert Johnson or, more likely to his uncle, Robert Johnson who lived until 1787. They are presented here as of general interest and without claim as to whom each event specifically applied.

4/25/1767 Robert and Lazarus Johnson & their wives served on comm. (First time their names appear in the minutes.)

Note: Robert probably the brother of Lazarus but possibly his son.

7/25/1767 Robert Johnson, Jr., Isle of Wight Co., Va. Granted certificate excusing him from military service.

Note: Unless there were other families of Johnsons, the "Jr." might have been used to indicate a younger Robert rather than the son of a father of the same name.

Thus: Robert, son of Lazarus, would be "junior" with respect to his uncle Robert.

11/2/1767 Robert Johnson reported his suffering for priests' demands and military fines.

Note: Here again there is no clue as to identity.

2/27/1768 Robert Johnson disowned for marrying out of unity.

Note: This reference does not seem applicable to either Robert, the son, or Robert the brother of Lazarus in view of their probable marriage dates.

11/26/1768 Robert Johnson, Sr. and wife served on committee to attend marriage of Robert Johnson, the younger.

Note: Identity unclear.

1/28/1769 Robert Johnson suffered seizure of tobacco for priests' demands.

Robert died in 1789, eleven years *before* the death of his father, Lazarus 1st. A copy of his will reads,

WILL OF ROBERT JOHNSON

In the name of God Amen. I Robert Johnson of the County of Isle of Wight am at present in a low state of health but of perfect sense and memory, thanks be to the Almighty for the same, and calling to mind the uncertainty of this life do make and Ordain this to be my last Will and Testament in manner and form as followeth- first- it is my Will that all my Just Debts should be paid and as for the remainder of my estate I give as followeth- Item I give and bequeath to my son, Abel Johnson, by the consent of my Father, Lazarus Johnson all the land and plantation whereon I live to him and his heirs and assigns forever, only I leave the use of one-third part of the said land and plantation to my loving wife, Patience Johnson, to her for life or widowhood. Item I give and bequeath to my son Laban Johnson by the consent of my father, Lazarus Johnson, fifty acres of land on the West side of Carrywaugh Swamp joining of John Ducks line, to him and his wives and Assigns for ever. Also one bed and one sheet, and one rug when he comes to lawful age and no more. Item. I also give unto son Abel Johnson one bed and two sheets when comes to lawful age and no more. Item I give unto my daughter Martha Johnson, one heifer with calf and 4 pounds cash at my death and no more. Item. I leave the use and rest and remainder part of all my estate, to my loving wife Patience Johnson, to her during her natural life or widowhood, and after her death or marriage. I give the same to be equally divided among all the rest of my Children. I also desire that there may be no appraisement of my estate, lastly, I do constitute and appoint my brother, Joseph Johnson, and brother-in-law, Abraham Johnson, and my loving wife, Patience Johnson my whole and sole executors of this my last will and testament making void all other wills and testaments made by me here to fore. In wittness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 1st day of January 1789

At court held for Isle of Wight County this 3rd day of Sept. 1789. This will was presented in court by Joseph Johnson one of the Executors therein named who made oath thereat according to law, and the same being proved by affirmation of Elijah Johnson, V Jesse Johnson two of the wittnesses thereto and arverso to be Recorded, and on the motion of the said executor who together with Patience Johnson and Abraham Johnson entered into and acknowledged their bond in the penalty of 1000 lbs. current money of Va. with condition as the law exacts certificate is granted him for obtaining a probate thereof in due form and liberty reserved Patience Johnson and Abraham Johnson, the other executors therein named to join in the probate when they shall see fit.

The estate of Patience Johnson, was closed on January 24, 1833 and references indicate that she died about June, 1832, and that her maiden name was also Johnson inasmuch as Robert's will mentioned "his brother-in-law, Abraham Johnson." The information regarding her estate appears in Volume 19, page 271 of the Book of Wills.

Not long after her death, it is believed, her daughter-in-law, Sarah (widow of Laban) prepared to move from Virginia to Indiana.

CHAPTER 7

LABAN JOHNSON 1788-1827 (OUR LINE) GENERATION V

Laban Johnson, the son of Robert Johnson and Patience (Johnson) Johnson and grandson of Lazarus 1st and Mary (Outland) Johnson, was born in Isle of Wight County, Virginia in 1788. He was the brother of Abel Johnson and Martha Johnson. According to some reports he was a hatter by trade and also owned and operated a grist mill.

On February 28, 1807 Laban Johnson represented Somerton Friends Meeting at Western Branch Monthly Meeting according to the latter's minute book as reported by Hugh B. Johnston, Jr.

On August 26, 1809 he married Sarah Cook. To this union were born:

They were members of the Western Branch Monthly Meeting of Friends in Nansemond County, Virginia, probably attending the Johnson Friends Weekly Meeting. According to the minutes of its monthly meeting on September 23, 1809 Laban and Sarah were reported married.

Hugh B. Johnston reports that, according to Isle of Wight County Deed Book 23, page 176, "On December 2, 1816, John Johnson, Patience (X) Denson, Ruth Johnson, and Tace Johnson sold Laban Johnson of Isle of Wight County for \$294.00 a tract of 147 acres on Beaver Dam Swamp in the counties of Isle of Wight and Nansemond adjoining Joshua Johnson, the heirs of Dempsey Carr, and John Darden, (being land that Amos Johnson purchased from John Darden, Obediah Johnson and Eley Johnson): witnessed by Allen (X) Johnson, Jordan (X) Johnson, and Elias (X) Daniel."

Any relationship of the sellers to buyer is not evident. Although a Tace Johnson was a daughter of Joseph Johnson, the son of Lazarus but the other sellers were not her brother and sisters. There is a possibility that "Tace" was Tacy Johnson, wife of Amos Johnson whose will dated December 4, 1815 was probated May 6, 1816. She was the executrix (Isle of Wight County, Book of Wills, Vol. 14, page 145).

Laban Johnson, along with the many others who suffered because of their conscientious opposition to war and physical force against their fellow men, was subjected to fines and seizure of his property many times. Such fines and seizures for refusal to muster were duly recorded in the records of Western Branch Monthly Meeting as follows:

April 27, 1811	April 26, 1817
April 25, 1812	January 20, 1818
April 24, 1813	April 24, 1819
April 23, 1814	April 27, 1822

It may well have been that these harassments helped to hasten his untimely death at the age of about thirty-nine years and accounts for the meager wealth left for the support of his widow and children.

Laban died in the latter part of 1826 or early in January, 1827 judging from the first entry in his administratrix's account which was January 11, 1827:

"On May 21, 1828, Sarah Johnson, Administratrix of the late Laban Johnson, released Robert Johnson from the mortgage that he had given her late husband on 100 acres adjoining Jesse Roberts, Jesse Edwards, and David Roberts, to secure a debt of \$87.50 dating from June 12, 1821, for which Benjamin Coggin had stood security; witnessed by Joel Johnson, William McClenney, and Anthony Person." Deed Book 28, page 1 as reported by Hugh B. Johnston, Jr.

Since there was no will, the division of the land that Laban bought on December 2, 1816 is not known but may be found in the records of deeds someday. The final accounting by the administratrix discloses a final cash balance of \$499.47 accounted for as follows:

Patience (Johnson) Johnson, the mother of Laban Johnson died about June, 1832. Her estate was closed January 24, 1833 according to Isle of Wight County, Book of Wills, Vol. 19, page 271.

The next chapter continues the story of the migration of Laban's widow and children to Indiana. It was during these early years of the Nineteenth century that so many Friends quit Virginia for the promise of greater freedom and opportunity in far away places such as Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and Iowa.

THE LONG TRIP TO INDIANA

Leban's estate was settled October 4, 1830, Patience, his mother, died about June 1831. On December 23, 1832 Sarah was issued a certificate of removal from Western Branch Monthly Meeting to Millard Monthly Meeting, Wayne County, Indiana. Arrangements were completed for the long journey.

The reason for their move has not been handed down to us but they came during the great Quaker migration westward where fertile land was abundant and free of the curse of slavery.

sometime during the middle of the winter of 1832-1833, the day of departure arrived for the company which included Sarah (Cook) Johnson, her five children and other families. According to John Wilmer Johnson, "Our line" the heads of the other families were,

- Samuel Binford
- Elwood Stanley
- Eliza Johnson, a kinship of Sarah (possibly Lebanon's sister)
- James Butler who would later be a founder of the Rich Square meetings

At the time, the ages of Sarah's children were, Eliza (20), Joel, nearly (18), Robert Cook (13) according to the records, Amos (11) and Elijah (6).

PART III

PIONEERS IN THE PROMISED LAND

Travel during the middle of the winter was by two considerations. First the crops would be in the ground and arrival in Indiana would be in time for spring planting; second, fording the many streams would be easier since the water should be more shallow when the ground was frozen.

Unfortunately we have no account, written or oral, of the route followed by Sarah (Cook) Johnson and family on that long journey from Isle of Wight County, Va. We only know they came by cart or wagon drawn by horses or oxen and over the mountains. Presumably they, as so many others were doing, followed the Wilderness Road, sometimes called the Boone Trail, through the mountains of Tennessee and Kentucky.

The trail was blazed in 1775 by Daniel Boone who had been employed by Col. Richard Henderson for his Transylvania Company to guide settlers to the Kentucky River. The route he laid out began at Long Island (Singapore, Tenn. 25 miles N.W. of present day Franklin) branching from the old trail that led down the Shenandoah Valley towards present day Knoxville, Tenn. and the Great Smoky Mountains.

The trail blazed by Boone went westward in Virginia along the Virginia-Tennessee border, through the Cumberland Gap, (near present-day Middlesboro, Ky.) about northward about 50 miles along the Harpers' Path to Pinecastle River (perhaps near W. Vernon, Ky.) and northward to Booneville, about 12 miles south of Middlesboro, Ky.

CHAPTER 8

THE LONG TREK TO INDIANA

Unfortunately we have no account, written or oral, of the route followed by Sarah (Cook) Johnson and family on that long journey from Isle of Wight County, Va. We only know they came by cart or wagon drawn by horses or oxen and over the mountains. Presumably they, as so many others were doing, followed the Wilderness Road, sometimes called the Boone Trace, through the mountains of Tennessee and Kentucky.

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The trail blazed by Boone went westward in Virginia along the Virginia-Tennessee border, through the Cumberland Gap, (near present-day Middlesboro, Ky.) thence northward about 50 miles along the Warriors' Path to Rockcastle River (perhaps near Mt. Vernon, Ky.) and northward to Boonesboro, about 12 miles south of Winchester, Ky.

From the Rockcastle River, one branch led off to present-day Louisville. From Boonesboro it was about 90 miles to Cincinnati, Ohio. U.S. 25 approximates the trail from Cumberland Gap to Boonesboro, and leads on to Cincinnati.

To reach Cumberland Gap, pioneers from Isle of Wight County, Va. possibly traveled present-day route U.S. 258 south to Franklin, Va; 58 westward to Abingdon, Va. and from there on route 11 to the Wilderness Road at Kingsport, Tenn.

It was not until 1796 that wagon travel was possible throughout the Wilderness Road and for many years thereafter it was difficult and hazardous. The history of the Wilderness Road is a fascinating story in itself. A bibliography appears in the back of this book for anyone who is interested in the subject. The book by Kincaid is particularly good.

For Sarah and company, the long and arduous journey took seven or eight weeks and was probably a distance of seven hundred miles or more, much of it through primitive country with poor roads or trails, and streams to ford. At the time, Robert Cook Johnson was only thirteen years of age but one of the memories passed down to his children was that they could sometimes see their previous night's campsite after having traveled all day through the mountains.

Among the worldly possessions brought from Virginia that we know of was an old Dutch oven and a kettle.

Upon arrival in Indiana the family settled in the Rich Square neighborhood in Henry County, southeast of New Castle and north of Lewisville. The Rich Square Friends meeting house lies adjacent to the present new interstate highway 70.

CHAPTER 9

EARLY DAYS IN INDIANA

Our information about their early years after their arrival in Indiana is sketchy. Apparently they lost no time in having their membership transferred to the local Friends meeting. On March 23, 1833 the records of the Milford Monthly Meeting show they were received on certificate issued by Western Branch Monthly Meeting, Nansemond County, Virginia on December 22, 1832 for Sarah Johnson and children, Eliza, Joel, Robert, Ansalem and Elijah.

On the same date others were received from Western Branch which leads us to believe that some of them, at least, were in the same company during the trip. The names of the others received on the same day were,

Daniel Johnson and his wife Maria

Lazarus Johnson and his wife Mary

Stanton Butler and wife, Elizabeth and children, John Chappel, Martha Ann,

Elizabeth Stanton, James, Robert Binford and Rebecca Jane

Lydia White

Exum White & family

Later, on June 22, 1833, Elizabeth Ann Hunnicutt was also received from Western Branch Meeting.

The Daniel Johnson mentioned above is now known to have been related to the Laban Johnson family. Lazarus Johnson is believed to have been the son of Lazarus 1st (d. 1800) and Mary (Outland) Johnson and the brother of Robert Johnson (d. 1789) who was the father of Laban Johnson. Therefore, Lazarus 2nd would have been an uncle of Laban, the deceased husband of Sarah (Cook) Johnson. Lazarus Johnson 2nd married Mary Hunnicutt, November 17, 1787. The dates of his birth and death are not known.

Stanton Butler is not known but may have been a son of _____ Butler & Priscilla, the sister of Laban's father, Robert Johnson (d. 1789).

It is assumed the Whites were not related.

An article that appeared in the Marion (Indiana) Chronicle-Tribune (December 9, 1964) in a column by Rose B. Marsh called "Marion the Mirror" states that "The heads of the different families were Samuel P. Binford, Elwood Stanley, Elisha Johnson, a kinsman of Sarah's, and James Butler, who became head of the new Quaker church known as Rich Square in Henry County." It is believed the author received this information in an interview with Elizabeth (Johnson) Rush, daughter of Barclay Johnson, in Fairmount, Indiana. The Elisha Johnson mentioned in the article may have been Laban Johnson's uncle and Lazarus Johnson 2nd's brother but there is no evidence to substantiate this supposition except for the fact that we know there was an uncle by that name for whom no other mention has been found.

The article in the Marion Chronicle-Tribune of December 9, 1964 also reported that Sarah (Cook) Johnson improved her eighty acre farm which she had entered soon

after arrival from Virginia. We do not have documentary proof that she entered a farm but a search of county records should verify the accuracy of the report. Most of the land had probably been entered soon after admission of the state to the union and later sold to settlers.

We can only assume the family accepted the hospitality of other Friends for a period. Doubtless the older boys went to work at once, either on a rented farm or for hire at first.

About three years later (October 10, 1835) Joel, age 21, bought a thirty acre farm near Rich Square Meeting House for \$150 according to a copy of the abstract of title. On October 31, 1837, at the age of 23, he married Elizabeth Davis. The records show he purchased an additional thirty acres on October 28, 1844 for \$210.

Ansaalem, at the age of thirty, married Rebecca Behl, age 21, on January 1, 1851. At about the same time he purchased the farm across the road from Joel's farm.

Both brothers are believed to have built the southern colonial type houses still standing there in 1967.

Robert C. Johnson, when 18 years of age married Elizabeth P. Dennis on May 21, 1845 at Hopewell Friends Meeting. In 1849 they moved to Clinton County, accompanied by his mother Sarah (Cook) Johnson, his sister, Eliza and probably his brother, Elijah. Sarah was about 62 years old when the move was made.

On March 10, 1849 New London Monthly Meeting received by transfer from Hopewell Monthly Meeting on certificate issued February 17, 1849 the following:

- (1) Robert C. Johnson and wife, Elizabeth C. (should have read Elizabeth P.) and children, Eliza C. and Lindley M. Johnson.
- (2) Elijah Johnson, the brother of Robert.

It was not until December 11, 1852 that Sarah (Cook) Johnson and her unmarried daughter, Eliza were received by New London Monthly Meeting on certificate issued by Hopewell Monthly Meeting on October 16, 1852. It can only be conjectured that Sarah and Eliza delayed their transfer so long with the thought in mind of possibly returning to Henry County.

Sarah, daughter Eliza and son Elijah settled in Russiaville which was about four miles from son Robert's new farm. For some years she and Eliza operated a tavern while Elijah operated a saleratus shop, making baking soda from wood ashes.

Sarah died October 18, 1855. She lies buried in the old Honey Creek (New London) cemetery back of the school house. A small marble headstone marks her grave.

In this old cemetery, dating from 1844 or earlier, lie buried many pioneers of well known names who were leaders in the community and the forefathers of many persons now living in the community or elsewhere in the state and nation. Some of the family names represented are Cosand, Carter, Davis, Rees, Haworth, Hadley, Rich, Coppock, McCool, Jones, Newlin, Stout, Butler, Newby, Hollingsworth, Wickersham, Talbert, Middleton, White, Johnson, Woody and others. All are now forgotten by their descendants. The cemetery lies long neglected, the few upright stones buried beneath a wilderness of vines, weeds and underbrush.

ELIZA JOHNSON 1811-1893 CHAPTER IV

Eliza Johnson was born October 2, 1811 to Laban and Sarah (Cook) Johnson in the town of High County, Virginia and she arrived in Iowa County, Indiana with her youngest sister and her mother early in 1836.

On March 25, 1837 she was received in the Baptist Church by preaching at the residence of her mother, Mrs. Sarah Johnson, near the town of High County, Indiana.

In 1840 Eliza moved to Clinton County, Indiana, where she met and married John Cook Johnson, her brother, who was then a farmer and was living and working on the farm. Eliza and her brother John were also in the party of the first settlers of Clinton County, Indiana, who came to the place of settlement in 1840. CHAPTER 10

ELIZA JOHNSON 1811-1893 GENERATION VI

Eliza Johnson was born October 2, 1811 to Laban and Sarah (Cook) Johnson in Isle of Wight County, Virginia and she arrived in Henry County, Indiana with her widowed mother and her brothers early in 1833.

On March 23, 1833 she was received in Milford Monthly Meeting on certificate issued by Western Branch Monthly Meeting (Va.) on December 22, 1832.

In 1849, Eliza moved to Clinton County, Indiana, accompanying her mother, Sarah (Cook) Johnson, her brother, Robert Cook Johnson and his family and her brother, Elijah. William Butler and Priscilla Butler were also in the party. Eliza and her mother operated a tavern in Russiaville, Indiana until the death of her mother on October 18, 1855 after which she sold the tavern.

She was received in New London Monthly Meeting December 11, 1852 on certificate from Hopewell Monthly Meeting dated October 16, 1852.

The New London Monthly Meeting minutes record that on November 14, 1855, she married James L. Butler of Henry County, Indiana. He lived less than a year after their marriage.

In 1857 she married Allen Middleton of Howard County, Indiana. Allen died in 1879. No children were born of either marriage.

After a brief illness, Eliza died December 11, 1893 at the home of her nephew, Barclay Johnson, near Fairmount, Indiana.

CHAPTER 11

JOEL JOHNSON 1814-1871 GENERATION VI

Joel Johnson, the eldest son of Laban and Sarah (Cook) Johnson was born in Isle of Wight County, Virginia on February 1, 1814. His father died in 1826 or early in 1827 leaving Joel, about thirteen, a daughter, Eliza about (16) and three younger sons, Robert C. (8), Ansalem (6) and Elijah (1).

About five years later after his father's estate was settled the family, late in 1832 or early in 1833, started on the long journey to Indiana, a trip by horse and wagon that took seven or eight weeks. Joel was then nearly nineteen.

The responsibilities must have fallen heavily upon his shoulders as top man of the family, a challenge that he accepted and fulfilled admirably.

On March 23, 1833 he was received into membership by the Milford Monthly Meeting along with his mother, sister and brothers by certificate issued by Western Branch Monthly Meeting, Nansemond County, Va. on December 22, 1832.

Two years later he bought a thirty acre farm from Asa Ellison for \$150. The deed was recorded October 10, 1835. The farm is near the Rich Square Friends Meeting House and the abstract of title reads, "30 acres off the south end of the west half of the southeast quarter of section seven (7), township sixteen (16) north range 11-E." It was part of an eighty acre tract originally entered by David Melburn on June 9, 1830 and patented to him April 17, 1833. Asa Ellison had purchased it for \$50 according to the deed recorded March 18, 1833.

A second thirty acres was purchased later from Edward Bond as evidenced by deed recorded October 28, 1844. According to the abstract of title the land was described as "30 acres off the south end of the east half of the southeast quarter of section 7, township 16, north, range 11 east."

A two story southern colonial type of farm house still stands on the farm and may have been built by Joel.

On October 31, 1837 Joel married Elizabeth Davis. To this union were born ten children whose names and marriages were as follows:

Joel must have been a stalwart man with clear aims of his mission in life, firm in his faith and blessed with the energy and determination to turn his part of the wilderness into a productive farm. He was a prominent and influential citizen in his community and a charter member and Trustee of the Rich Square Friends Meeting. For some years he was a trustee of White's Institute in Wabash County.

He died February 6, 1871 from injuries suffered when he was thrown from a sleigh. Elizabeth, his wife, died December 2, 1878. Both lie buried near the southwest corner of Rich Square Friends cemetery.

Since Joel did not leave a will, the homestead passed by law, 1/3 to his widow and 2/3 to his seven children. After the death of Elizabeth who did not leave a will, her share of the land passed to the children. Her son, John eventually acquired the interest of the other heirs. From John the farm passed on to his son Myrton Lewis Johnson and then to his widow and children who still owned it in 1967.

CHAPTER 12

ROBERT COOK JOHNSON 1819-1892 GENERATION VI (Chart No. 4)

Robert Cook Johnson, son of Laban and Sarah (Cook) Johnson was born July 19, 1819 in Isle of Wight County, Virginia. When he was about seven or eight years old (1826 or 1827) his father died.

Early in 1833, at the age of thirteen, he was brought to Henry County, Indiana by his mother together with his sister Eliza (21), brother Joel (19), Ansalem (11), and Elijah (6) and other relatives and friends. The 700 mile trip was by horse and wagon and took nearly two months over poor roads and through the mountains. Probably they came over the Wilderness Road.

The first news we have of Robert in Indiana was when his membership as a Friend was accepted March 23, 1833 by the Milford Monthly Meeting by transfer from Western Branch Monthly Meeting, Nansemond County, Va. according to transfer dated December 22, 1832. His mother, sister and brothers were also accepted on the same day.

The family settled in the Rich Square community a short distance from the meeting house. During the next several years he must have been accustomed to hard work in helping his older brother, Joel, clear the land and raise crops and live-stock to support the family.

On May 21, 1845 he married Elizabeth Peninah Dennis before the Hopewell Friend's Meeting. Apparently he attended that meeting after his marriage. A copy of their marriage certificate copied from the original in the hands of his son Robert Barclay Johnson, Russiaville, Indiana in 1938 reads as follows:

COPY OF MARRIAGE CERTIFICATE OF ROBERT COOK JOHNSON

Dated May 21, 1845

Whereas Robert C. Johnson of the County of Henry & State of Indiana Son of Laban Johnson of Isle of Wight County Virginia and Sarah his wife (the former deceased) and Elizabeth P. Dennis daughter of Benjamin Dennis of said County of Henry & State of Indiana (deceased) and Clarke his wife, having declared their intentions of marriage with each other, before a Monthly Meeting of the religious Society of Friends held at Hopewell and having consent of Parents their said proposals of marriage were allowed by said meeting. These are to certify whom it may concern, that for the full accomplishment of their said intentions this the 21st of the 5th month in the year of our Lord 1845, they the said Robert C. Johnson & Elizabeth P. Johnson appeared in a public meeting of said people held at Hopewell aforesaid; and the said Robert C. Johnson taking the said Elizabeth P. Dennis by the hand declared that he took her the said Elizabeth P. Dennis to be his wife promising with devine assistance to be unto her a loving and faithful husband until death should separate them; and then the said Elizabeth P. Dennis did in like manner declare that she took him the said Robert C. Johnson to be her husband promising with devine assistance to be unto him a loving & faithful wife until death should separate them- And moreover they the said Robert C. Johnson & Elizabeth P. Dennis (she according to the custom of marriage adopting the name of her husband) did as a further confirmation thereof, then & there to these presents set their hands

The foregoing certificate is a copy of the marriage certificate for the first marriage of Robert Cook Johnson.

The certificate was in the hands of Robert's son Barclay Johnson of Russiaville, Indiana. It will probably pass into the hands of his daughter Celia (Johnson) Coplen or to his son Everett Johnson.

Copied in 1938 by Eddis Johnson

Elizabeth Peninah Dennis, born December 25, 1827, was the daughter of Benjamin and Clarkey (Poole) Dennis. Her grandfather Poole was a veteran of the Revolutionary War and owned a thousand acres of land in Wayne and Henry Counties, Indiana. He had freed his slaves in 1820 and came from Randolph County, North Carolina.

It is said he brought five wagon loads of household goods and other possessions, each wagon pulled by two teams, on the move to Indiana. The night after they crossed the Ohio River into Ohio one of their horses was stolen so they substituted a cow in the double team and continued the trip to Dudley Township, Henry County, Indiana.

After their marriage in 1845 Robert and Elizabeth lived in Henry County until 1849. During these years, were born their first two children,

Eliza C. 3/17/1846

Lindley M. 6/19/1848

They were members of the Hopewell Monthly Meeting in Dudley Township, Henry County, Indiana.

In 1849 Robert and family, accompanied by his mother, Sarah (Cook) Johnson, his brother Elijah, his sister Eliza, and William Butler and Priscilla Butler, moved to Clinton County, Indiana. They took with them all their goods and livestock, the trip requiring twelve days. Their route was on the angling road from New Castle northwest toward Frankfort and north to Forest.

The minutes of the Honey Creek (later called New London) Friends Monthly Meeting record that, on March 10, 1849, Robert C. Johnson and wife, Elizabeth P. Johnson and minor children, Eliza C. and Lindley M. were received from Hopewell Monthly Meeting in Dudley Township, Henry County, Indiana on certificate issued February 17, 1849.

The purchase money for the farm they bought was a gift from Elizabeth's mother, Clarkey E. (Poole) Dennis. Robert C. hauled logs to Russiaville to have sawed into lumber for use in building an addition to the original log cabin. The addition consisted of a bedroom and a kitchen, the log part being retained as a living room. In the kitchen they installed the cast iron cookstove brought from Henry County. It had three levels of two lids each and was somewhat a novelty as it was the first in that part of the county. The house was at the end of a long lane, a considerable distance from the road. On this farm the following children were born:

While on a visit to Henry County, Elizabeth P. (Dennis) first wife of Robert Cook Johnson died on November 12, 1865 and was buried in the Rich Square Friends Meeting cemetery. The circumstances of her death and its impact on her family has been related often by some of her descendants. During the telling of the story from memory, various ages have been assigned to her surviving children. The story will be retold here with correction based on the actual dates on record for the dates of birth of the children who were as follows with approximate ages:

Eliza C., (19)	Clarkey Ellen, (11)
Lindley M., (17)	Albert T., (8)
William P., (14)	Robert Barclay, (4)

Elizabeth, the mother, had taken Albert, age 8, Barclay, almost 5 years old, and Ellen about eleven, from their home at Forest, Indiana to visit back in the Rich Square neighborhood.

Soon after their arrival, the mother became ill (attributed to "lung fever") and died suddenly. Ellen was left to help care for the two young brothers until the arrival of her father, Robert C. Johnson, and her 19 year old sister, Eliza who arrived by train, about a week later. The delay was because of the slowness of communications and travel in those early days. There was no direct train service and this slowed both the mails and travel.

After the burial of Elizabeth, Robert and his children returned home to Clinton County accompanied by his mother-in-law, Clarkey (Poole) Dennis who went along to help in holding the home together.

On March 19, 1868 Robert Cook Johnson married Abigail White in Lynn Friends Church three miles east of Russiaville, Indiana.

Abigail was born September 19, 1833 in Perquimans County, North Carolina to Thaddeus and Betsy (Pritchard) White. The White family had come to Raysville, Henry County, Indiana around 1843 according to a certificate of removal from Perquimans (N.C.) Monthly Meeting to Spiceland Monthly Meeting, Henry County, Indiana. They later moved to Howard County, Indiana about 1849. They were received by New London Monthly Meeting on January 11, 1850 on certificate from Spiceland dated November 21, 1849.

While Abigail took over management of the household, assisted by Clarkey Ellen, as Eliza was married on March 16, 1869, Robert and the boys managed the farming. Robert also was engaged in preaching in the surrounding communities. The family were members of Reserve Friends Church near Russiaville and Forest.

To this union were born two sons, one dying in infancy. The other, Oliver Thaddeus Johnson was born September 5, 1871.

At this point it seems appropriate to tell of some of the stories and impressions that have been handed down from Robert Cook Johnson and his children. One is the story of the family's trek from Virginia to Indiana. His father had died in Virginia in 1827. In 1832, according to Robert's obituary, Laban's

widow, her daughter, and the four sons started out with horse and cart for Indiana. It was a long and hazardous trip in those days and in coming over the mountains they would travel all day and look back and see their camp site of the previous night. The personal belongings which they must have been able to bring were probably few. In those days there were no roads or bridges. What a contrast with conditions today. Those were days of hardship and luxuries were few!

Another impression passed on from his early days was of the abundance of game, including deer and procupine, in the forests of Indiana. Often deer would dash across the path of the horse struggling through the mud and mire of the primitive roads and paths.

In the busy home of five sons and two daughters there was room for both the Quaker way of worship and devotion and also full and lively doings with, perhaps, a bit of mischief now and then.

Clarkey Ellen passed along to her grandchildren many stories of life in those pioneer days. As she described it, the house in Clinton County had the sitting room in the earlier log cabin section and it contained a large fire place, holding logs up to six feet in length. The logs were dragged into the living room by a horse until the boys were big enough to help.

In the house were three beds, a spinning wheel and two slat-back, splint-bottom rocking chairs. A bed was on either side of the door leading into the kitchen and under each was a trundle bed. The third bed was a "tester" bed (covered with a canopy from the ceiling to the floor).

Strange things happened sometimes. Once, when Barclay was a baby a rattle snake came up through the loose puncheons of the floor. Barclay's mother heard him cooing and jabbering about it. When big sister, Ellen, reported the situation, the mother ran into the room with a bucket of hot lye and threw the contents on the snake just in time to prevent it striking the baby.

One time when Ellen was four years old (about 1858) and playing "hide-and-go-seek," she rushed to hide under the tester bed. As she pushed back the curtains, she saw a black face and rolling dark eyes and ran screaming to her mother that, "Old Nick is under the bed." This was the first Negro she had ever seen. He was being helped by the Friends to escape to Canada.

Then there was the time their father decided to remarry and bring them a stepmother which must have been an important event in the lives of the children. It was on March 19, 1868 that he married Abigail White who lived at West Middleton, Howard County, Indiana. The night was dark when they arrived home and they found themselves attended by a group of neighbors intent on welcoming them by a shivaree in accordance with the time-honored tradition.

Now the Johnson boys decided to enter into the spirit of the event so Lindley (19) and William (17) tied a rope clothesline across the path at knee height and propped a soap barrel near the line. One end of the rope they held in the kitchen. Albert (9) poised upstairs with a bucket of water. As the visitors ran around, shooting their guns, down came the water, up came the rope. Considerable confusion resulted and one visitor landed in the soap barrel, head first.

But time went on, the children grew up and more serious things demanded their attention. Soon they would marry and have homes of their own. First there was sister Eliza who was married in 1869, then Clarkey Ellen and brother William in 1872, Lindley in 1874, Albert in 1880 and Barclay in 1881. The new half brother, Oliver, who had come into their lives in 1871 grew up and married in 1891. During all these years their father continued to farm and to preach the gospel.

In August 1891, as Robert Cook Johnson and Abigail, his wife, were driving to a tent meeting being held in Maris' woods, their horse took fright at a bicycle and they were thrown from their buggy near the home of Thomas C. Ratcliff. Both received injuries from which they never recovered. Robert died the following spring on March 9, 1892. Abigail survived with failing health until May 17, 1897.

In 1939 Dwight Johnson told the writer that his mother had told him that Robert was the most patient man she had ever known. This trait and others of his character may help to account for this reverence and great respect with which Robert's children have so often been heard to speak of him.

It is said that Johnson Township, in which he lived in Clinton County, was named for him.

The obituary of Robert Cook Johnson follows:

OBITUARY OF ROBERT COOK JOHNSON

The subject of this sketch has been a prominent resident of this vicinity for a number of years having moved to the farm where he died, in 1892.

He was born to Laban and Sarah Johnson in Isle-of-Wight county, Virginia, July 19th 1819. At the age of thirteen he came with his mother to Henry county, Ind. where he was married to Elizabeth P. Dennis, May 21, 1845. Soon after this marriage he came with his wife to the new county to make for them a home and settled upon the farm where he spent the remainder of his days. Six children were born to this union all of whom survive him. November 11, 1865 he suffered the loss of his companion and was again married March 19, 1868 to Abigail White who survives him. The result of this union was one son who is still living.

For near twenty years the deceased was a recorded minister among Friends of which church he was a life long member having been born into it. The gift of the ministry was not only acknowledged by the church but many have been edified and strengthened by his words of wisdom. As a servant of his Master he was true and faithful, ever ready to lend a kind word and a helping hand to aid in winning souls to Christ.

In his death the community has sustained a great loss. A wise counselor and a true friend has gone to his reward. His brother and sister have lost a true companion of their earliest recollections and his children and wife an indulgent father and faithful husband. He was stricken several months ago with a complication of diseases resulting in a giving way of the mental faculties and the system generally. Death followed March 9th 1892 after a successful life of almost 73 years. The funeral occurred from the Friends Church at New London on Saturday morning March 12. Interment in New London cemetery.

The above obituary was copied from a newspaper clipping owned by his son Oliver T. Johnson of Decatur, Indiana.

Robert Cook Johnson's funeral was preached by Abigail Holson, according to Oliver T. Johnson. Burial was in Lot no. 26, sec. 3 of the New London cemetery.

Reserve Church, near Russiaville, Indiana, has a stained glass window given as a memorial to Robert Cook Johnson and his two wives by Ellen (Johnson) Haworth, his daughter, Augnt Lide, and his son Albert who paid for their father's and mother's names and one of Abigail (White) Johnson's sisters who paid for her name. The church has since been disposed of.

Abigail (White) Johnson died May 17, 1897 and lies buried in the New London cemetery. After their death the farm was acquired by his son Albert who lived there until his death. Albert's widow continued to live there until her death, February 2, 1923, after which it was acquired by others outside the family. The farm lies about two miles east of Forest.

CHAPTER 13

ANSALEM JOHNSON 1821-1884 GENERATION VI (Chart No. 2)

Ansaalem Johnson, son of Laban and Sarah (Cook) Johnson was born _____ 1821 in Isle of Wight County, Virginia. His father died in 1826 or early 1827 when the boy was only about five years of age.

Early in 1833, when he was about ten or eleven years of age, he with his mother, sister Eliza (21), brother Joel (19), Robert (13) and Elijah (6) and other relatives and neighbors came by horses and wagons on the long trip to Henry County, Indiana.

On March 23, 1833 he was received into the Milford Monthly Meeting with his mother, sister and brothers by certificate from Western Branch Monthly Meeting, Nansemond County, Va. issued December 22, 1832.

Some years later he bought a farm across the road from his brother Joel's farm near Rich Square Friends Meeting House. The southern colonial house that still stands there may have been built by him but the date it was built is unknown.

On January 1, 1851 at the age of thirty, he married Rebecca Bell who was born in 1830. The names of their children appear below.

Ansaalem and his family were members of the Rich Square Friends Meeting. He died in 1884 and his wife died in 1909. Both are buried in the Rich Square burial ground.

CHAPTER 14

ELIJAH JOHNSON 1826-

GENERATION VI

Elijah was the youngest son of Laban and Sarah (Cook) Johnson. He was born in 1826 in Isle of Wight County, Virginia.

Early in 1833 he arrived in Henry County, Indiana with his widowed mother, sister and three brothers, and lived with them on a farm in the Rich Square neighborhood. In 1849 he moved with his mother, sister Eliza, and brother, Robert. With his mother and sister, he lived in Russiaville, Indiana where he operated a saleratus shop, making soda from wood ashes.

On March 10, 1849 he was received in New London Monthly Meeting on certificate from Hopewell Monthly Meeting dated February 17, 1849.

Sometime after the death of his mother on October 18, 1855, he went to Michigan where he engaged in business. Later he moved to Oklahoma where he met an untimely death, the circumstance of which were never learned. He never married.

CHAPTER 15

THE END OF AN EPOCH

The story of the six generations is ended. Once they lived and loved and had their being, labored, reared their families and solved their problems with faith in themselves and the guidance of the Inner Light. All of this has passed away.

It was a long story - more than two hundred years. Little did they of the sixth generation realize they were witnessing the end of an epoch and the dawn of an age of miracles in science and industry far beyond their power of imagination.

True, they knew of steam power, a little of electricity, the telephone, even the automobile but it was common knowledge that not much would become of most of these things except for railroads and steamships. They were sure nothing would ever replace the horse on the highways or on the farms.

They had done their work well according to their way of life. Sons and daughters of new generations were taking their rightful places in the march of time. There's is a story too long to tell in this book but the genealogical charts that follow the bibliography gives names and relationships, not only of the seventh generation, but also of many of their descendants even to the eleventh generation.

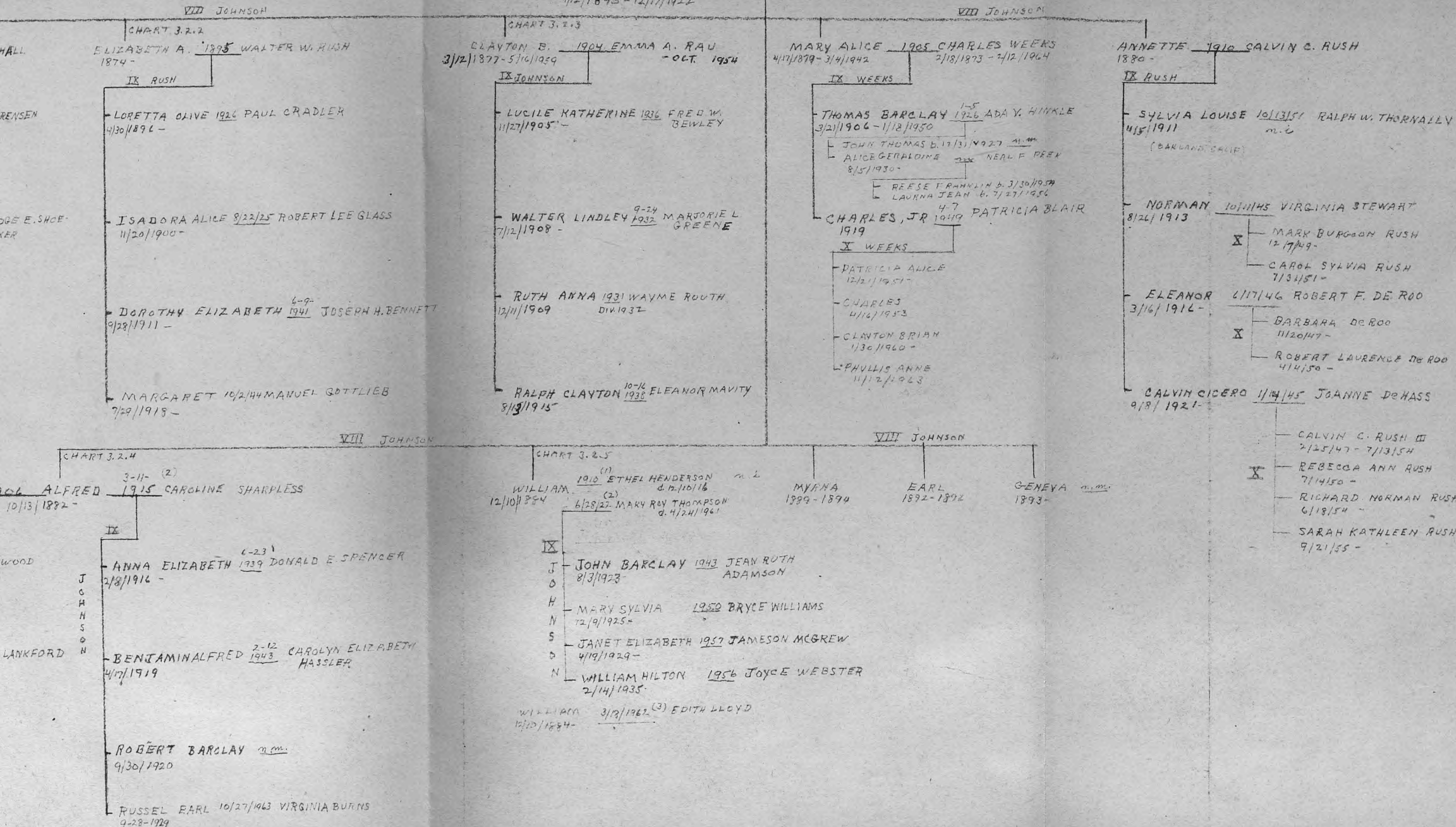
